Inside workers invited to hear CUPE benefits

Several members of the non-unionized "inside workers" at the Town of Aurora were expected to attend a CUPE (Canadian Union of Public Employees) Local 905 meeting this week, to learn more about the organization.

Chair of Local 905, the Aurora unit of CUPE's Town "outside workers", Sara Tiencamp, told The Auroran there were "disgruntled" employees on the staff and the meeting would inform them of union benefits.

"This is a directive from CUPE National," she said. "And

it's offered to any group that is not unionized."

Information, in the form of an 11 x 14 notice, was distributed to more than 100 inside workers about the meeting.

"Please drop by any time during the information meeting and meet with CUPE organizers who will be able to answer any questions you have about CUPE and the process of joining a union," the notice said.

Slated for late Tuesday afternoon at the Aurora Legion, meeting results were too late for

The Auroran's deadlines.

Inside workers of the Town staff have been "quite content" for the past 15 years, The Auroran was told by an unnamed source.

"It appears the new regime is having an effect," the source said.

However, a union employee pointed out there were waves of discontent over the last 15 years.

"But management seemed to know how to handle it," the employee said.



Poor Richard

Bill 51 allows us some control

*Planning applications were a gamble,
When the OMB ruled the roost;
But Bill 51 provides some controls,
That will give municipalities a boost.*

- Poor Richard's Scrapbook

An issue of concern to most municipalities is the increasing number of Ontario Municipal Board hearings and the resultant expense to the taxpayers, as more and more developers appeal councils' planning decisions.

During the period 1996 to 2001, municipalities in the Greater Toronto Area spent more than \$20 million on OMB hearings as the developers appealed council's decisions to the OMB.

In 2000, Aurora spent \$500,000 on OMB hearings.

In the old days, councils were able to take their time with planning applications. They held a public meeting, studied traffic, environmental and technical reports and then made a decision in what they believed was in the best interests of the municipality.

Possibly some municipalities took too long arriving at a decision resulting in the developers through the Urban Development Institute and Home Builders Association petitioning the provincial government for help in speeding up the planning approval process.

In 1995, the Mike Harris Progressive Conservative government, who supported development, was quick to impose a 90-day rule.

If a developer did not receive a response to his application within 90 days, he could launch an immediate appeal to the OMB and the clock started ticking when the application was filed.

In many cases the application did not contain all the background information required, such as traffic or environmental reports so that council could make an informed decision and as soon as the 90 days were up the appeal to the OMB was launched.

In one case in Aurora shortly after the rule had gone into effect, planning staff were unable to obtain enough background information to prepare a report for council or hold a public planning meeting before the appeal was launched under the 90-day rule.

In a more recent case where there were several environmental concerns, the need to follow the Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation guidelines and comments from the Toronto Region Conservation Authority, that staff members recommended the application be considered premature, but an appeal was launched.

But help may be at hand for municipalities as Bill 51, the Planning and Conservation Land Statute Amendment Act, received Royal Assent in October, 2006, and came into force in January.

Municipalities will now be able to establish in their official plan additional information that will be required as part of a development application.

When enacted, this will allow municipalities to ensure that all aspects that need to be considered are included so that more informed decisions can be made.

Until the required information is provided, council may refuse to accept or consider an application and the statutory time period for council to make a decision does not kick in until a complete application as defined in the official plan has been received.


To implement the legislation, the town's official plan must be amended, administrative procedures changed and application notices revised.

The legislation also requires planning staff to meet with the applicant at the applicant's request prior to the submission of an official plan amendment, site plan, draft plan of subdivision/condominium or zoning bylaw amendment applications.

Currently, Aurora planning staff has encouraged all applicants to meet and consult with staff prior to submitting an application.

The staff report listed the various reports required including planning studies, environmental studies, servicing reports, traffic reports, studies to address nuisance and hazard matters, economic analysis and cultural and design matters to be included in the official plan.

Although well advertised there was no public in attendance at a recent public planning meeting resulting in council adopting the staff report and directing that the official plan amendment be prepared and enacted.



Front Porch Perspective

There are a number of individuals, since deceased, whom I would have liked to meet.

The range, depth and limits of their unique personal qualities are illustrative of the full continuum of the human spirit and the way in which these individuals dealt with circumstances - ranging from the "trying kind" to outright terrorizing - is fascinating.

These people may not all necessarily be my heroes, but I have either watched television programs about them or read about their exploits and they both intrigue and interest me.

My list would include individuals like John Diefenbaker, Robert Stanfield, Sir John A. Macdonald, George C. Marshall, Terry Fox, General George Patton and St. Maximilian Kolbe.

On a test I would imagine that many people could identify five of the seven people noted above, but George Marshall and St. Maximilian Kolbe might represent a bit of a problem.

George C. Marshall was a five star general who was head of the U.S. Army in World War II.

His plan for the reconstruction of Europe after the Second World War (called the Marshall Plan) garnered him the Nobel Peace Prize in 1953.

He was also head of the American National Red Cross as well as having served as both a U.S. Secretary of State and a Secretary of Defense.

What about St. Maximilian Kolbe, you ask?

About two weeks back I read an interesting article in another local newspaper.

The story concerned the new Catholic high school that is being built in Aurora, on Wellington Street, between Yonge Street and Bayview Avenue.

The school is to be opened for the fall of 2009.

The York Catholic District School Board trustees approved naming the school St. Maximilian Kolbe Catholic High School.

This piqued my interest.

The story then goes on to explain that "St. Maximilian Kolbe (1894 - 1941) was born in Poland and became a Franciscan who founded the Immaculate Movement, also known as the Militia Immaculatae, Crusade of Mary Immaculate, which was devoted to the conversion of sinners, opposition to free masonry and commitment to Our Lady and the path to Christ."

It then went on that "He built a monastery in Japan and went to India where he furthered the movement...He was canonized by Pope John Paul II in 1981 and declared a martyr of charity."

The article answered the basic journalistic questions of who, when, what, why and where, but did not spell out the specific reason for his canonization.

And I believe this does a large disservice to his memory because it omits both his work to shelter Jews during the war and his awe-inspiring self-sacrifice.

My apologies in advance here for using the internet's Wikipedia, but it provides a very good and succinct overview of the things that were left out in the newspaper article.

"During the Second World War, in the friary, Kolbe provided shelter to refugees from Greater Poland, including 2,000 Jews whom he hid from Nazi persecution in his friary in Niepokalanow." Wikipedia said. "On February 17, 1941, he was arrested by the German Gestapo and imprisoned in the Pawiak prison, and, on May 25, was transferred to Auschwitz I as prisoner #16670.

"In July, 1941, a man from Kolbe's barracks had vanished, prompt-

ing SS-Hauptsturmführer Karl Fritzsch, the Lagerführer (i.e., the camp commander), to pick 10 men from the same barracks to be starved to death in Block 11 (notorious for torture), in order to deter further escape attempts. (The man who had disappeared was later found drowned in the camp latrine.)

"One of the selected men, Franciszek Gajowniczek, cried out, lamenting his family, and Kolbe volunteered to take his place.

"During the time in the cell, he led the men in songs and prayer. After three weeks of dehydration and starvation, only Kolbe and three others were still alive. Finally, he was executed with an injection of carbolic acid so that the Nazis could make more room in their holding cells.

"Kolbe is one of ten 20th-century martyrs from across the world who are depicted in statues above the Great West Door of Westminster Abbey, London. He was canonized by Pope John Paul II on 10 October 1982, in the presence of Gajowniczek."

I believe that the naming of the school after this Saint is a tremendous tribute to the man.

However, unlike say, the Lester B. Pearson Public School in town - which everyone knows (or should know) is named after a former prime minister of Canada, and a former resident of Aurora - most people may not know all the facts about Mr. Kolbe.

That is why I hope, that when this place of learning is officially opened in September of 2009, that there will be a small plaque somewhere in the building that briefly outlines all the reasons for the school being named after him.

As you can see on the signs as you drive into town, Aurora's population is now 48,000.

Or 41,000.

Or maybe 44,000.

It actually depends on which way you're entering town, because the figure is different on each sign.

So, either officials are not sure how many of us there are, or they're being really accurate, and counting people that are actually within the town borders at any one time.

Off to the Upper Canada Mall? No problem - we'll reduce the figure from 44,000 to 43,999. Just give us a ring when you're back.

The bottom line is that the population totals on Aurora signs increase regularly, if inconsistently, which is a sure indication that our town is growing quickly.

For now, at approximately 50,000, you could fit everyone in Aurora in the Rogers Centre.

I'm not sure how or why you'd do it, but if you did, it might slightly improve your chances of finding a parking spot at the library or GO train station.

But that opportunity won't last much longer, because whether it's the appeal of a quiet community, the opportunity to read the best newspaper in York Region (yes, The Auroran), or the promise of the GTA's lowest annual property tax increases (okay, maybe not that last one), people are moving to Aurora in droves.

And we're running out of places to put them.

It may look like there's still a lot of development room northeast of Bayview and Wellington, but take out the parks and environmentally sensitive lands, the areas set aside for corporate and retail establishments, and space for another 37 doughnut shops (at least), and there's not much left to work with.

The developers are doing their bit to help, with townhomes being packed onto lots so small you can cut the entire front lawn without moving from one spot.

But even these space savings are just a drop in the bucket.

And looking elsewhere within our borders, the rest of town is pretty much settled, so there are limited opportunities for infill.

The most promising potential infill property, from a developer's perspective, anyway, was the current site of Dr. G.W. Williams Secondary School.

But since the Board deferred the school's relocation, at least for now, this is no longer an option.

So with that chunk of real estate off the market, where else can the new houses go?

Well, unless they start squeezing them into people's backyards, which is less far-fetched than it sounds, the only other way to grow is up.

But Aurora has an aversion to heights.

Growing Pains

Look how many years it took to build the condo at Wellington and Industrial.

And since then, every time there's been a new proposal for any sort of multi-story structure, be it residential, commercial, or industrial, neighbours have been united in their opposition.

They've even tilted at windmills and water towers.

And besides, people moving to Aurora don't want to live in vertical high rises. If they did, they wouldn't have come up here. They would have stayed downtown in one of the many condominium buildings that form canyons along Toronto's main streets.

No, people are moving to Aurora in the thousands each year, because they want open space.

But they better hurry, because there's not much left.

In fact, if this rapid growth continues, it won't be long before neither the Rogers Centre, nor Aurora itself, will be able to hold us all.

And when that happens, once again it'll be time to change the wording on the signs on our borders.

And not to "Aurora: Population: XX,000", but to something much more appropriate, like:

"Aurora: No Vacancy".

BOUQUETS to the Aurora Barbarians Rugby Team for bringing the McCormick Cup back to Aurora after 51 years by edging Balmy Beach 18-14, after being down 14-3 at half time. The McCormick Cup is Ontario rugby's greatest prize.

BRICKBATS to Aurora hockey fans for failing to support the Aurora Tigers by not attending home games in the Community Centre when the Tigers are fighting their hearts out. Attendance rarely tops 300 fans, and the Community Centre will hold 1,400.

BOUQUETS to the Ultramar gas station on Yonge Street, north of Mulock, in Newmarket, for being a Full-Service station. It is likely the closest "We Serve" station for Aurora seniors and handicapped drivers who have difficulty with the Self-Serve stations.

BRICKBATS to Aurora's bylaw enforcement officers for not being pro-active in removing A-type signs from street boulevards located near the exit of a shopping plaza as they effectively block the vision of vehicles travelling in the curb lane.

This never should have happened

The debt we owe to those who fought for our freedom can never be re-paid. But with certainty, we must never forget the enormous price they paid, with their lives, the injuries they sustained, and the broken hearts that will never mend over the loss of comrades.

What we must at least do in return, is to care like we've never cared before -- about those who cared enough to serve in past wars and those who continue to stand on guard for us all.

That caring must extend past each Remembrance Day and throughout the year. It must be extended to those who returned from battle and now need our help - the veterans who served, and those who find themselves side-by-side with veterans in long-term facilities.

They should never have to worry about neglect or harm in provincially regulated institutions, but serious matters of this nature continue year after year as reported by the media and this year has been no exception.

One would think that what happened to WWII Veteran, John Wilson, would be example enough.

His death was horrific in the extreme.

It should have said, 'never again,' to everyone from government on down who are responsible for the well-being and safety of all veterans and all residents of nursing homes in this province.

It's apparent that lessons of the past have not been learned given the ongoing accounts of abuse and neg-

lect and standards not met documented in government compliance inspection reports.

It means Mr. Wilson's story can't be told enough times.

The details of this story came from two Toronto newspapers in 2002 and 2003. It's the story about John Wilson.

He was one of thousands of teenagers who served our country during World War II. According to his notebook, Mr. Wilson fought in Norway.

Mr. Wilson was trapped in a smoking room in a downtown Toronto nursing home.

His cigarette had dropped on his lap and his upper body was engulfed in flames while he sat in his wheelchair.

Mr. Wilson was 78.

He was partially paralyzed, nearly blind and he burned to death as a resident of a provincially regulated long-term facility.

One of the investigating detectives said, "Nobody should die that way, especially not someone who risked his life fighting for his country".

Only because of the determination of the two detectives was a public inquest ordered, and it took two years before that happened.

The police photographs were so disturbing, a decision was made not to make them an exhibit in the inquest.

No criminal charges were ever laid. No one was ever held responsible for what happened to Mr. Wilson.

He and one other wheelchair bound resident were left alone in a room they could not escape from.

Testimony indicated staff had no idea how the men got

there.

One of the detectives said, "I'm deeply saddened and angry that a man left in the care of the state was left in a position that this could happen to him".

We should all be.





Crohn's Disease, Ulcerative Colitis, & Irritable Bowel Syndrome

PART II

Two weeks ago, I mentioned that your body is a self-healing and self-regulating organism. It is designed to heal itself and regulate its own internal functions. In the case of Crohn's disease, for example, cells in the intestine die and are not necessarily replaced by new healthy cells. This is why the intestine eventually deteriorates and ulcerates. This can be life-threatening.

One must also remember that your nervous system runs your whole body and all of its functions: your immune system, your heart, your healing ability, even your digestive sys-

tem. All these function under direct orders from your nervous system. It therefore stands to reason that if there is an interference with the normal function of your nervous system, your body will not work the way it should. A number of studies have actually shown that this is exactly the case with Crohn's, Ulcerative Colitis, and IBS; that these conditions are neurologically based. 7. Calcium and Magnesium, at least 2,000mg daily.
8. Vitamin C, in very high doses combined with bioflavonoids, is essential as it minimizes inflammation.
9. Garlic is known for preventing free radicals from attacking the intestinal lining.
10. Vitamin B12 and Folic acid.
11. N-acetylg glucosamine (NAG), protects intestinal lining from enzymes that could damage it. Drinking lots of fluids, herbal teas, cabbage juice, papaya seeds, and avoiding stress, chocolate, alcohol, and soft drinks are all essential.

pesticides that can irritate your intestine. Vitamin A should not be taken in high doses for prolonged periods of time.






At the last meeting of the

The committee agreed to receive her comments and an accompanying letter was circulated to all members of council.

The comments and the accompanying letter were not attached to the report nor made available to the media.

Members of the general

committee Tuesday noted the minutes didn't reflect what went on at the meeting as it appeared there was some dissatisfaction on the part of the delegate.

Councillor Evelyn Buck said she wasn't satisfied with the minutes as they didn't make sense as she hadn't seen the letter and it should have been included with the report.

Councillor Evelina MacEachern explained that a two-page memo had been

prepared about the Special Events Sub-Committee and the Leisure Services Advisory Committee had made a decision.

She also noted that some citizen committee members were offended by the contents of the memo, which was not made public, and the referenced letter outlined their concerns.

When the Director of Leisure Service suggested the minutes be deleted, Councillor MacEachern said she did not appreciate staff suggesting a change in the minutes, although she had been critical of another council for making comments about staff earlier in the meeting.

Finally the minutes were adopted as presented and the media and the public are left wondering what went on and why the documents were not made public.



of births and deaths and the issuance of burial permits that occur in the municipality.

In addition to registration, staff also provides a letter to parents of newborns for the purpose of travelling outside of Canada if a birth certificate has not received at the time of departure.

In 2002 there were nine birth registrations, 10 in 2003, eight in 2004, seven in 2005 and 12 in 2006.

Burial permits issued

include 214 in 2002, 263 in 2003, 239 in 2004, 185 in 2005 and 183 in 2006.

The Clerk processes all requests for information under the Municipal Freedom of Information and Protection Privacy Act. This Act gives the public the right to request access to government held information.

The Act also protects personal information held by government organizations and provides individuals with a right of access to their personal

information.

In 2002 there were four requests for Freedom of Information, six in 2003, five in 2004, 10 in 2005 and seven in 2006.

Under a provincial Order in Council, a municipality has the authority to license lotteries such as raffles and bingo events.

In addition, the Marriage Licensing Act provides for the appointment of the Town Clerk and designated staff such

as the town's licensing officer to administer the issuance of Marriage Licenses.

In 2002 there were 164 marriage licences issued, 171 in 2003, 179 in 2004, 180 in 2005 and 163 in 2006.

There were 90 bingo licenses, eight raffle ticket and 13 break open ticket requests filled in 2002, 90/16/12 in 2003, 94/11/7 in 2004, 73/11/3 in 2005 and 84/4/4 in 2006.

done with a two-thirds vote of council.

As a result the general committee meeting was recessed and the special council was convened on an 8-1 council vote.

The mayor asked for authority to investigate the leak to the media as it was council's duty to uphold the laws and suggested George Rust-D'Eye, a solicitor well versed in municipal law, be retained to carry out the investigation.

A motion to proceed with the investigation was moved by Councillor Evelina MacEachern.

Councillor Evelyn Buck questioned the motion on the basis about lack of information as to cost and lack of specifics as to what was to be investigated.

Mayor Morris refused to answer Councillor Buck's question regarding the specifics of the investigation.

Although Mayor Morris wouldn't provide details of the leak, it is believed to be the front page Auroran story reporting councillors had rejected the idea of York Regional Police headquarters moving to the Leslie Street property in Aurora, where approval

has been given to construct a building for the technical divisions.

It was reported that the decision was made in private session on a defeated 4-4 vote with one member absent.

No report has been made in public and according to the procedural bylaw, votes and decisions are not to be made in private session; only through a report to a public session.

Auroran editor Ron Wallace said he would not reveal where the information originated.





Graystones an Aurora institution

Hundreds of Aurora residents and area patrons visited the Graystones Restaurant to celebrate the Wiedemann family's 40th anniversary last week.

As Aurora citizens were starting to prepare for Christmas and rest up from a hectic Centennial Year, on November 25, 1967, big things were happening at the corner of Royal Road and Yonge Street.

The Graystones Restaurant and Tavern reopened under the new ownership of Hans Comboush of Oshawa and Max Wiedemann of Ajax. The partnership didn't last and Wiedemann assumed full control five weeks later.

For many Aurora young people, now with children of their own, the Graystones, or the "Gallstones" as they called it, represented a milestone in their lives. It was the place where many tasted their first legal alcoholic drink.

Even the more mature met at the Graystones to enjoy a business lunch or a quiet drink at the bar after a rough day at work.

It was the neighbourhood pub and a meeting place for a growing clientele to catch up on what was happening in Aurora.

Much of the tavern's appeal can be attributed to Max and Anita Wiedemann. The restaurant made headlines in January, 1970.

During a council debate about taking out a business membership in the Aurora Highlands Golf Club, then Reeve Evelyn Buck said she would be embarrassed to take official town visitors to some of the town's eating establishments.

Her statements upset Wiedemann and the owner of La Colony (now the Filly and Firkin) across the street and they invited councillors to visit their establishments and offer constructive criticism as to

how they could improve service.

Councillors who accepted the invitation to have dinner at the Graystones included Pete Miller, Norm Stewart and Illyd Harris. Deputy-Clerk Cam Duncan also attended. After eating, the group assured the Wiedemanns that they had excellent facilities and food.

In June, 1973, then Mayor Evelyn Buck was invited to officially open their new Bavarian Garden, an outdoor patio in front of the restaurant.

Before coming to Canada, Anita Brandstaetter, a native of Austria, had been an accountant. After a year in Canada, she married Max, a widower with two children, Dec. 31, 1964.

With her business skills and Max's knowledge of catering, they started to look for a licenced restaurant and purchased the Graystones in November, 1967.

The restaurant became a big part of their lives. In 1976

when Max became ill and died, Anita continued to run the restaurant in spite of Max's recommendation that she sell it.

Instead she closed for more than three months for extensive renovations and a rebirth of the business with the assistance of Max's daughter, Petra, and son Randy.

Her original plans were to relocate the washrooms, add carpeting and extend the air conditioning system at a cost of about \$45,000.

But \$150,000 later, she had knocked down walls, improved the electrical system, installed new windows, added an office and bought new drapes and furniture to provide a complete make-over for the restaurant.

The re-opening took place April 13, 1978.

The ultra-modern, yet comfortable pub was decorated in dark brown colours with beige designs on the walls.

In 1984, the outdoor patio was enclosed with a 6,000-square-foot addition to the dining room.

The dining room accommodates 92 with an additional 40 seats in the fireplace lounge. There is also room for 101 in the disco area.

For Anita, the Graystones was home. She has since died but the Graystones continues to provide the best in Austrian food in comfortable surroundings with Petra and Randy carrying on the family tradition.

Noon crossing guard removed from corner

The noon hour crossing guard at Murray and Seaton Drives will disappear.

In 2005, Aurora's Traffic Safety Advisory Committee considered removing all crossing guards during the noon hour as many schools had different lunch times and it was difficult to obtain guards.

At the time some council members suggested school boards should be responsible for the crossing guards, but it was pointed out that such requests had been made in the past but had been refused by the school boards on the basis they are only responsible for students on school property.

Last month, staff members presented the Annual School Crossing Guard Report to the Advisory Committee for information.

It reported that staff had conducted crossing guard gap studies to determine if existing crossing guards were still warranted for the new school year.

The results indicated that the existing 10 school crossing guards remain in place. Also due to the high traffic volumes the lunch hour crossing guards remain in place at the Allenvale and McClellan Way and Murray Drive and Glass Drive intersections.

The study also noted the Murray/Seaton intersection during lunch hour showed low pedestrian and traffic volumes and there were sufficient gaps for pedestrians to cross safely.

The information was forwarded to the affected schools and the Parent Council for St. Joseph Catholic School objected to the removal of the noon hour crossing guard at the intersection.

The Traffic Safety Advisory Committee reviewed the report and agreed with its recommendations and confirmed them to the town's general committee last week.

The committee also

Plaque acknowledges history of Armouries

History was made at the Aurora Armouries last week in a colourful ceremony by the Ontario Heritage Trust and the Queen's York Rangers when a provincial plaque was unveiled to commemorate the facility.

It was a night of pageantry as soldiers in vintage uniforms joined members of the Queen's York Rangers who had just returned from Afghanistan and Bosnia.

The many guests were welcomed by Richard Moorhouse, executive director of the Ontario Heritage Trust. He introduced Wayne Kelly of the Ontario Trust who provided a brief history of the building.

The Aurora Armoury was built as a Drill Shed in 1874 and is the oldest purpose-built armoury still used by the military in Ontario.

In 1873 the Aurora Township Council informed Canadian military authorities that it would grant land for and build a battalion drill shed according to military standards providing it received the grant allowed for that purpose.

He also spoke about Edward's Blake's famous "Aurora Speech" in the Drill Shed in 1874 a few months after it was opened.

He also listed the various militia units using the Drill Shed over the years leading up to its use today as home for the Queen's York Rangers.

Neville Poy, Honorary Colonel of the Queen's York Rangers, recalled the close relationship between the regiment and the town dating back to 1866 when the Village of Aurora presented a bugle to the York Volunteers and in 1966 when the Town granted the Rangers the "Freedom of the Town".

Lieutenant Colonel Bruce McCullough, Commanding Officer of the

Queen's York Rangers, also spoke about the friendly relationship with the municipality.

Mayor Phyllis Morris brought greetings from council and the citizens, Newmarket/Aurora MPP Frank Klees brought greetings from the province and former Aurora Mayor Tim Jones read a message from MP Belinda Stronach. Former Aurora Mayors Dick Illingworth and George Timpson were also recognized.

Dawn Bennett, a Board Member of the Ontario Heritage Trust, brought greetings from the Honourable Lincoln Alexander, Chairman of the Board, who was unable to attend.

The unveiling of the plaque was the highlight of the evening. It is the third such plaque in Aurora, with the others at the Church Street School and the railway station.

Although the unveiling took place inside the building the plaque will be moved to the front of the Armouries at Larmont and Mosley Streets in the spring.

RUMOURS AND RAMBLINGS

The start of recycling in Aurora

Today recycling in the Blue Box program and the Green Bin program are major alternate waste disposal requirements to reduce the amount of waste going to landfill.

Back in April, 1978, recycling was not a big issue when it started in Aurora. Three large bins were placed around the community, one at the Aurora Shopping Centre, one at the plaza at Yonge and Wellington and a third at the Aurora Community Centre.

Residents were asked to deposit tins, glass and newspapers in the proper container.

The attempt to make citizens aware of the need for recycling was a pilot project by the Ministry of the Environment.

The Ministry had worked with Etobicoke, North Toronto and Aurora in setting up a collection system to be maintained by the municipalities.

Ministry officials said Aurora was selected for the pilot project because it had a good history of participating in community projects.

The items collected were sold and a new source of revenue for the municipalities was found once the cost of collection had been paid.

After one week of the Divide and Conquer program in Aurora, works staff reported the response had been excellent, as more than two tons of paper, a ton of glass and a half-ton of tin had been collected.

The heaviest response was at the Aurora Shopping Centre depot followed by the IGA plaza and the Community Centre locations.

The works department was kept busy making trips to empty the containers as each pickup took about three hours for the collection and distribution of the refuse for recycling.

The town sold all the paper to Arctic Insulation on Mosley Street for an undisclosed price while two Toronto firms purchased the other items; Inland Iron and Metal taking the tin and Dominion Glass taking the glass.

But even with the excellent response by citizens, staff predicted the town would just break even financially on the program.

ENDING THE YEAR WITH A SURPLUS

In June, 1987, Aurora taxpayers narrowly missed out on receiving an unexpected windfall as Councillors Evelyn Buck, Norm Weller and Martin Paivio wanted council to give back the town's 1986 surplus of \$1,139,820 to the taxpayers.

But the other six councillors agreed with Treasurer Kelly Cerswell's recommendation to allocate the surplus to seven reserve funds for future spending including one for new vehicles, the Leisure Complex, the proposed seniors' centre and staff sick leave payments.

The unexpected surplus was primarily accumulated with higher than anticipated building permits and other fees from

Aurora's booming development.

EDUCATION BOARD REJECTS COLLIS

In November, 1990, Aurora School Trustee Ron Wallace proposed that Aurora's old Tannery building (Collis Leather) on Tyler Street be renovated to accommodate the York Region Board of Education.

He suggested the Board swap its Wellington Street land for the old Collis building and invest about \$13 million to expand and renovate the location, but trustees weren't interested and wouldn't even consider temporarily renting space in the building for \$30,000 a year.

He then pitched the former Sterling Drug building at Yonge and Murray, saying it was so big, then Director of Education Bob Cressman could land a small plane inside it.

Instead, trustees preferred buying land on Industrial Parkway and built a small office to meet the immediate need for additional space, which came with a \$2.5 million price tag and would alleviate the board's need for office space until trustees decided on plans to expand the existing facilities.

Finally, the Board approved the purchase of a building in Newmarket as an annex to the Aurora Education Centre.

WHAT HAPPENED?

In April, 2006, the Youth Action Committee was investigating the creation of a youth councillor position for Aurora who would become involved in the political process.

It was pointed out there was one in Vaughan who would be invited to attend a future Aurora Youth Action Committee meeting to explain the process.

Members of the Leisure Services Advisory Committee suggested they be invited to the Youth Action Committee meeting to hear the presentation.
