Public input sought on ward system question

Aurora Councillors have opted for a three-step consultation process with the public before making a final decision about putting the question of a ward boundary system to voters on the October 25 municipal election bal-

The process, outlined in a motion by Councillor Wendy

Gaertner, would first require an informal public meeting with Councillors where information regarding the merits and disadvantages of a ward system could be presented to the public.

This would be followed by a town hall meeting where Aurorans would have an opportunity to their opinions with Councillors.

The process would culminate in a Special General Committee

Meeting for discussion on the findings from the two public meetings and a decision on whether this should become a referendum question on the October 25th bal-

Getting relevant information out to the public to help make an informed decision was important to Councillors and remained the focus of the discussion at the February 9 Council meeting.

I was convinced, after visiting the bingo hall, that, when all the licenses were in place, the hall would stop carrying out regular bingo games and become a casino for slot machines.

Certainly, that was the impression one got when entering the hall on Industry Street South.

Because the place didn't look like a bingo parlour (even though I don't know what a bingo parlour is supposed to look like). It just looked like the managers had bigger ideas for the place.

At any rate, many charities and service clubs depended on the regular bingo games.

Including Hot Spot.

So, for 17 years, every Friday night, Hot Spot would provide a sort-of youth centre for Aurora, something the town has been threatening to start for years, but never seems to get around to it.

That's why I'm amazed that the effort behind Hot Spot comes from Aurora Councillor Wendy Gaertner. If she couldn't convince the town, who could?

When Hot Spot started, it opened in the second floor room of the Aurora Community Centre, then moved to the Lions' Hall on Mosley Street, before going back to the same room at the Community Centre...

And paying rent to use the facility.

Small wonder it went out of business.

Anyhow, I, for one, am sad to see the end of Hot (9 a.m. start). Spot.

To all those who worked so hard to provide a safe thought of separating sibplace for our children to hang out on Friday nights, thank you.

Parent believes the board "dropped the ball" re LBP

To the editor,

I recently had the misfortune of spending five hours last Monday waiting in line at Lester B. Pearson school in order to register my daughter for Grade 1 this fall.

More specifically, I waited in order to obtain a number (as you would at a butcher shop counter) that would then allow me to register my daughter later that evening.

I wasn't alone.

Dozens of other parents were in the same predicament.

Wednesday, January 3rd, principal Veronique O'Malley announced at the French Information Immersion Night that due to near overcapacity at Lester B. Pearson there would be only three Grade 1 classcoming September, a reduction from six.

The other three classes would be moved to Mazo Roche la Newmarket.

This announcement went over like the proverbial lead balloon and precipitated a flurry of phone calls between parents, not to mention several days of stress.

Mazo is located in the Davis Drive and Leslie Street area and operates on school hours (8 a.m. start) that are different than Lester B. Pearson's

For many parents the lings, having children on different schedules and

was distressing.

As I waited in line, talking with other parents, there were two common threads among many of us. Clearly, most of the parents who were waiting already had one or more children in the school. Secondly, other parents were very local, living close to the school itself.

My situation combined the two: I already have a child in the school and I live a five-minute walk

Many of us were left wondering whether the school board could have handled this better.

The short notice given to parents about the upcoming changes in the number of Grade 1 classes at Pearson, coupled with situations where siblings would potentially be separated, suggests an acute degree of bureaucratic thoughtlessness.

I don't think I am alone in feeling that the school board really dropped the ball in the way the situation was dealt with.

Many questions come

Why was Lester B. Pearson allowed to reach near capacity in the first place?

Why was there no public consultation?

Why was no consideration given to children who already had siblings in the school?

Why was there also no consideration given to local children within walking distance to the school? What about

going to different schools changing the bus catchment areas?

As it turned out, the parents who lined up on Monday morning already had an answer to these questions.

Like me, many took

time off work, got up early and waited for hours to ensure that their child was registered at the school.

What a fiasco!

Parasport Galore

Toast Master

As the Vancouver 2010 Winter Olympics and Paralympics X begin, like most Canadians, I will be glued to my television set.

I am especially looking forward to the Canada -U.S. men's preliminary round hockey game. As someone who works with a number of Americans I have been repeatedly reminded that our Junior National men's hockey team lost to our southern friends a few weeks ago in Saskatoon. Here's hoping for a different

These games should hold more than just an opportunity to view. It should bring thoughts of moving from the sidelines to participation - to develop a healthy lifestyle, wellness and fun!

And that should hold true for all of us, whether disabled or able bodied

A family friend told me about a wonderful program run out of the Magna Centre in Newmarket that promotes participation and exercise for the disabled.

The program is called Parasport Galore.

This new, registered program offers a weekly experience of Paralympic sports including, sitting volleyball, sledge hockey, wheelchair basketball, bocci, wheelchair curling and more.

The program is a godsend to parents of children with disabilities.

These parents have an especially busy schedule

each day with care, school, and many appointments that may involve driving long distances. In the recent past, to access programs, many participants have had to travel to Toronto, for specialized sports. But that is no longer the case.

Parasport Galore attracts participants from all around the GTA, including Aurora.

Considering a new activity can seem daunting and parents may be hesitant to invest in expensive equipment. However, a large capital outlay is not required here. Equipment is provided through the support of ParaSport Ontario and Ontario Wheelchair Sports Association.

As with all parasport and adaptive activities, everyone can play - the program is not exclusive for individuals with disabilities!

The Sunday afternoon program from 1 p.m. to 2.30 p.m. has developed into a time when family and friends enjoy playing together.

This program is the newest of truly inclusive programs developed since the opening of the Magna Centre in 2007.

The initial programs began with Children/Youth in Motion through the support of Variety Village.

On receipt of a grant through Bell Community Sport, ice sledges and sport wheelchairs were then purchased to support new program development.

Working with guidance from ParaSport Ontario and Ontario Sledge Hockey Association, various community members came together in the fall of 2008 to develop a Parasport Club.

The Newmarket Shredders Sledge Hockey team began, growing from three to ten persons (disabled and able bodied).

The summer of 2009 piloted the first Inclusion Camps - designed with adapted sports and activities - open to all to participate.

In the fall of 2009, programs were expanded to include the Play without Borders programs for Children & Youth, cooking, and art and music programs.

Parasport Galore began this past January.

This summer there will also be four weeks of Inclusion camps.

Inside Aurora

I received a new toaster for Christmas.

Yes, I know what you're thinking; I wish my life was half as exciting as Scott's.

Anyway, when I took it out of the box, it appeared to be a pretty basic appliance, which was all I really wanted. It only had a few buttons and levers, so I was surprised to see the list of instructions included with

And I don't just mean a folded over page that was mostly illustration, and maybe a warrantee card. This was a booklet that, while not quite as weighty as "War and Peace", would still have provided bedside reading for at least several nights.

It even had chapters.

I would have expected such a document with the purchase of say ... a scanning electron microscope, but not for a common kitchen device. And up until now, as far as I knew, you couldn't get much more simple, appliance-wise, than a toaster.

Just slip in some type of bread, slide down the switch, so the slice was fully submerged in the slots, and wait for it to pop up - or for the smoke detector to go off, if you like your toast as well-done as I do.

But according to my User Guide, there's much more to it than that.

Apparently, according to Chapter 3, and brace yourself if you've been having this problem at home; you have to plug in the toaster for it to work.

Amazing.

There was also extensive discussion about the correct placement of the unit on an even surface, such as counter. In case you're wondering, the proper way is in the upright position, and not sideways, or even upside-down. I know that because of the three illustrations that accompanied this advice.

As for actually inserting food into the unit, the advice was not to stuff in anything that was significantly wider than the slots.

In other words; single halves of a bagel - yes. Entire loaves of bread - no.

You can pause here to write down some of these notes, if they're news to you.

All of this, and other equally useful instructions, filled several pages.

And this didn't even include all the safety hints. There were the obvious ones, such as not to stick in a knife or hand while it's plugged in.

But there were also a number I was not expecting. For example, evidently, you're not supposed to run your toaster through a cycle in the dishwasher.

Now, I like to think I have a fairly vivid imagination, but even I never would have thought of that. And even if I had, I doubt a toaster would even fit in our dish-

By this time I was beginning to wonder why such an apparently complicated piece of electronics didn't come with an extended warrantee option.

The instructions also noted that you shouldn't store your toaster by hanging it from the power cord.

I have a hard time grasping how tall one would have to be to make that a convenient form of storage, but I can just envision a kitchen full of blenders, food processors, and coffee makers all hanging from the ceiling like a bunch of appliance piñatas.

And perhaps best of all, this timely warning; the toaster may become hot.

Having made it through all seventy-six pages of the User Guide, I think I've got this thing mastered. If fact, I expect I'm now qualified for a degree in Toasterology.

But I daren't get too overconfident. After all, I still have to read the manual that came with the new kettle.

Arena seats - refurbish or replace?

A final decision on the fate of the 44-year-old spectator seats at the Aurora Community Centre's Rink 1 has been delayed a month after Council voted to obtain further information on the practicality of maintaining and refurbishing them.

As reported last week in The Auoran, Council was mulling over the use of funds allocated to the town Recreational Infrastructure Canada (RInC), to replace or refur-

bish the seats.

Mayor Phyllis Morris and some Councillors initially balked at the idea of replacing the seats as they held both heritage and sentimental value for members of the community. But comfort and practicality seemed to be the predominant theme at last week's Council meeting.

"At the same time, those seats were never comfortable. We saved money by putting the rows closer together, and your shins are up against the back of the seat in front of you all the time. That is not conducive to comfort when you are watching a hockey game."







"A lot of us thought in order for the public to make an informed decision, a decision that wasn't based just on how they felt emotionally about a ward system, we needed to get information out to the public," said Councillor Gaertner.

"[A public] meeting would be, in my mind, the first step to invite any members of the public interested in discussing this to come and hear the pros, the cons, the history, the background, and perhaps some experiences of other municipalities to get a good grounding in the whole idea of a ward sys-

Councillor Alison Collins-Mrakas said she agreed with Councillor Gaertner's assessment.

"What would they be providing their input on if they're not aware of the criteria?" she asked.

While Councillor Evelina MacEachern agreed that information is essential, she said implementing a ward system is a decision that will face two distinct groups of voters.

"Part of the problem is a ward system, in my mind, could be a very political decision for some people, and for some people it's what they believe to be the best governance," she said.

"I think for Aurora (that) a representation-at-large serves Aurora best. Having said that, I'm prepared to provide the public a full, open process so they can provide their views. This is a decision that would have an impact on our town not only today, but tomorrow. I think that at the very least our responsibility is to ensure that a structure is provided to allow open discussion and the sharing of information."

While dates have yet to be set for the three meetings, the final meeting would need to take place before April 28, the deadline to pass a bylaw allowing any ballot question.

Although planning for the meetings is in the works, Mayor Phyllis Morris was keen to stress that public input would not be limited to these three sessions.

"We could have questions put on the website, solicitation through the notice board advertisements, we can do a lot to sense and gauge what the town is feeling," she said.

"At the end of the day it will be this council that makes the decision (on putting the guestion on the ballot), but we must cast the net as far as we possibly can to get public input."

"It went to the Minister Education who reviewed it, and she granted our request and she appointed a facilitator to conduct an administrative review of the board's decision to close Wells Street Public School."

The Ministry appointed former Minister Education, David Cook as facilitator.

Members of CAWS, along with Councillor John Gallo, will be at the table with Mr. Cook to discuss the York Region District School Board's decision to close the school.

"In this round, there isn't an opportunity to say whether or not the decision to close Wells Street was good or bad -- it's just did the board follow its process?" explained Mr. Revington. "One of the concerns about this process is that the power of the facilitator is simply to review and report to the minister.

"We asked that this facilitator be given extra powers because we want him to be able to do more than just make a recommendation. We don't want to go through the ARC process again."

"It almost sounds like the actual review process has a bit of a flaw in it," said Mayor Phyllis Morris at the council meeting. "As you know, I called the minister's office before the appeal was granted and I'm prepared to do that again to ask questions about this appeal process itself."

Where is Town's climate change plan, EAC asks?

The Town of Aurora's Environmental Advisory (EAC) encouraging Councillors and the Town to adopt environmental action plans to combat emissions and global warming.

In a presentation made to Council last week by Peter Piersol, chairperson of EAC, he reiterated the affects of climate change and outlined to Council resources available to help implement a municipal action plan.

"On the local level and municipal level, 190 municipalities across Canada have said we're going to be taking this into our own hands and have action plans," said Mr. Piersol.

"In Canada, you have the Partners for Climate Protection [to help imple-
