Phyllis Morris to seek re-election

Aurora Mayor Phyllis Morris has thrown her hat in the ring.

She filed to seek re-election last

Mavor Morris told The Auroran several weeks ago that she would be running again, but did not register until Wednesday.

"I am excited about the future of Aurora, pleased about the progress we have made, and looking forward to continuing the agenda Aurora voters set for council nearly four years ago," said Mayor Morris.

"With our hardworking team of councillors and town staff, supported by many active volunteers, we have achieved a lot for Aurora in this past term, and we will accomplish more in the future."

The Mayor said Aurorans have told her they want to enjoy the good summer weather with their families before turning their attention to the election.

"Council and staff are working on some ongoing and important town business, which will still allow time for the campaign season to begin," she said.

The incumbent is currently opposed by three people: former councillor Nigel Kean, former president of the Aurora Chamber of Commerce Geoffrey Dawe and Roger Clowater.

For Kean, the news was not a surprise.

"I'd been expecting it," he said.

Meanwhile a rumour which appeared on Councillor Evelyn Buck's blog was hotly disputed this week.

It was mentioned that Councillor Evelina MacEachren would wait until the final day before she declared she would run for mayor.

She denied the rumour.

"I am not and have not been considering putting my name in for the mayor's seat." she told The Auroran.

New OP could help Aurora's OMB cases

Following a special meeting Thursday, councillors made yet another step towards approving a new official plan for The Town of Aurora, a plan which may have the added benefit of lending the Town stronger support with cases at the Ontario Municipal Board.

The comments came from Ron Palmer of The Planning Partnership, whose company has been asked to draft the new Official Plan.

The plan, he said, is an extension of both provincial policies and York

Region's draft official plan, but is also a "Made-In-Aurora approach to all of those directives and policies."

"We feel that its interconnectivity with all of those policies will certainly help the Town implement the policies of this plan the vision and the principles that were established at the beginning of the process," he said.

The plan will also eliminate grey areas in the current official plan that can

Aurora resident Paul Pirri entered the race.

The 23-year-old Mr. Pirri is a political science and philosophy student at the University of Western Ontario.

He joins one incumbent, Wendy Gaertner and six

other newcomers - Jim Abram, John Abel, Milton Hart, Roy Cohen, James Lill and Chris Ballard.

Meanwhile, Councillor Evelina MacEachren did not answer when asked if she would seek re-election, although she did say she would not run for the mayor's

Councillor Evelyn Buck Geoffrey Dawe and Roger has also said she would seek re-election, but had not registered at press time.

Four members are running for the mayor's chair in Aurora, including incumbent Phyllis Morris.

She is being challenged by former councillor Nigel newcomers

Taxi cab infractions raise this driver's ire

Aurora's Bylaw Services will be more "proactive" in ticketing illegal taxi cabs picking up passengers in the Town of Aurora, according to Mayor Phyllis Morris, with relevant fines set to increase.

The issue was brought to the table at a recent council meeting after local taxi driver Ajoy Dhanda came forward to express his ongoing frustration with the situation, and what he said he saw as the Town's lack of interest in the issue.

"On numerous occasions, we have brought forward the issue of illegal cars working in the Town of Aurora with no results," Mr. Dhanda said. "There are no rules or regulations. [Some] taxis are not supposed to work here, they shouldn't be working here. They come from different towns."

Mayor Morris said she understood in the past illegal taxis had "not been ticketed effectively", but said Bylaw Services staff, under the direction of Techa Van Leeuwen. Director of Bylaw Services, and Jon Popple, "are now actively ticketing... when staffing permits."

"We agree with you that if our licensed cab drivers, who are getting tested for mechanics, their insurance, their health, all of the things that are being checked, we agree that when this council has a licence that bylaws are to be upheld." she

because that is what council does through bylaw."

The issue was also discussed at a recent meeting between the Town and the taxi said Ms. Van industry, Leeuwen.

"Jon Popple, the Manager of Bylaw Services, and myself [have committed] to developing an enforcement strategy, which is already underway," she said. "It includes actively ticketing of illegal cabs. We're going to apply to the courts to increase

"We have adjusted some of our shifts so we can cover evenings and overnights, because we understand that is when a lot of illegal activity occurs, and we are partnering with York Regional Police to deal with this as well."

Taxis from other jurisdictions such as Newmarket and Whitchurch-Stouffville are currently allowed to drop off pasbut are prevented from picking up new customers within Town

The same evening, councillors also approved a new hike in taxi fares for the first 200 metres of travel to reflect the introduction of Ontario's Harmonized Sales Tax (HST).

According to a report by Ms. Van Leeuwen, fares had not been reviewed or increased since 2007.

The first 200 metres of travel. which was scheduled for \$2.75, is now \$3 following council approval.

"The approval of increased taxicab fare for the first 200 metres of travel by 8 per cent to \$3 would mirror the provincial portion of tax and reduce financial implications on the taxicab operators due to the implementation of the new tax and increased operational costs associated with taxicabs," she

Reader not amused by Sher's behaviour

To the editor,

Saturday, July 31st, at the Aurora Farmer's Market was an interesting one.

While navigating through the maze of displaced vendors, and taking in the sight of all the chainlink fencing that now closed off Aurora Town Park, there was a strange event occurring in and around the one section of fencing left open allowing limited access to the park while the market was in operation.

Several folks stood and watched as Sher St. Kitts made her way around inside the park, going from one picnic table to the next, telling folks they had to leave her park (oops, I meant "Aurora Town Park").

One by one, the folks had to scoop up their breakfasts, and head for the exit.

After making rounds, Sher and a security guard placed barricades at the exit, denying access to anyone else who dared enter.

Over the next 10 min-



Being Opposition Leader is tough —

Tim Hudak probably feels like the Maytag repairman or someone in a witness protection program because his is a lonely task.

Although he is hard at work touring the province, rallying the troops, and raising funds, generating any type of sustained media excitement at this time of year is very difficult.

However, the strategic decisions regarding the policy path that Mr. Hudak takes will have serious ramifications whether or not he and his party gain the seals of high office in 2011.

Let's have a quick look at the alternatives.

It has been said that the first and only job of the opposition leader is to oppose the government of the day.

Mr. Hudak could do that for the next 14 months and then just before the election unveil his platform, based upon the input of the rank and file party members.

This is known as keeping your "powder dry" and possibly taking a page from the Federal Tories - unveiling the campaign platform during the election campaign.

Another approach is to introduce the Tory Blue Book months prior to the election as Mike Harris did before the 1995 election.

He could also try the hybrid approach; lay out a few markers now on issues that may or may not be central to his governing agenda, but that shows that the party is not bereft of ideas or taking a hard stand on controversial issues.

One such issue would be health care. This issue does merit serious discussion.

First, health care is by far the largest budget item.

The total annual Ontario budget is just over \$100 billion and health care spending is about 40 per cent of that.

Second, the annual, year over year, spending increase in this envelope is not sustainable. Health care spending is increasing at a rate faster (7 per cent-plus per year) than government revenue growth.

This cannot continue.

The only problem with this approach is that it is too early and the party volunteers have not been consulted.

A fourth way, and one that would not interrupt the policy development process that has just begun, is that the party could develop a set of first principles. These would be the foundation upon which PC policy would be built.

For instance on energy policy, a group that I am involved in, The Association of Power Producers of Ontario, have come up with the following set of principles that they developed and adopted in order to be consistent in their approach to dealing with issues and in their advocacy work.

a.) Electricity prices should reflect the true cost/value of produc-

b.) Robust competition among generators is a critical factor in achieving the optimal electricity cost for Ontario consumers. c.) Public and private sector entities should compete on a level

plaving field. d.) Markets with multiple sellers and buyers are the most effec-

tive way to harness the benefits of competition. e.) Stable and predictable public policy is critical to efficient

investment and effective markets. The PC Party of Ontario could do the same thing.

What I will be watching most closely for though is the type of platform that is ultimately introduced to the electorate.

Will the party be "gun shy" from introducing a platform that addresses some controversial topics because of what took place in the fall of 2007; the PC electoral disaster because of the "faith based" issue.

Or will it be a small "c" conservative platform. Or still, a policy document that is focused on the centre of the political spectrum?

It will be an interesting process for the voters to watch and for the party volunteers in Aurora to participate in.

On a different note, this is column number 200 for me. It is very much a pleasure and privilege writing for the good citizens of Aurora on a weekly basis.

I thank the editor for both giving me the opportunity to pen this column and also allowing me to write about anything that has a local flavour to it.

I have not confined my written offerings to just politics and public affairs; I have also written about people and the various events in our community.

My columns are simply intended to stimulate debate and discussion on some of the issues and also to promote the good work that goes on in our wonderful community.

Over the past four years, I have received numerous e-mails regarding this column; I have responded to all of them. In fact, I welcome any readers comments/criticisms/suggestions at any time.

I look forward to continuing my efforts and I especially look forward to covering the municipal election this fall; I hope to do some profiles of the would-be mayoralty candidates.

I will also - in salute to the late local television host and newspaper columnist, Dick Illingworth - offer some Bouquets and Brickbats.

I pulled my dog off the path so she would not step in the glass and possibly injure her


I wonder if this gentleman's dog even noticed the glass!



Doors Open tour happens Saturday

This is the last article in the Doors Open series before the day of the event.

This Saturday, August 21st, all participating sites in Doors Open will have their doors open to welcome visitors to a unique and memorable day.

Start your Doors Open day with a visit to the Aurora Farmers' Market.

Come early, as the Aurora Farmer's Market is only open from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m.

While at the market, visit the Doors Open booth and pick up your maps, brochures and other printed materials for all sites.

Volunteers at the Doors Open booth will help you plan your day and answer any questions you might have.

Don't forget to pick up information about the Aurora Heritage Advisory Committee's coming workshop "The Energy Efficient Old Home Workshop".

If you are an owner of a heritage home and would like to learn how to keep your home warm this winter; or if you have thought of replacing heritage windows or doors to save on energy costs, then this workshop is for you.

Tickets are available for sale at the Planning and Development Services, 3rd floor, Town Hall. Tickets will also be available for purchase at Doors Open booth.

RISING SUN MASONIC LODGE

Located at the corner of Mosley and Wells Streets, this building served as Methodist Episcopal Church from the time of its construction in 1877 until it was sold to the Masons in 1885.

The Rising Sun Masonic Lodge is a fine example of Gothic Revival style. It is of a rectangular plan, with its entranceway through a small wooden porch.

Its gable roof is covered with pressed metal sheets that give the appearance of slate shingles.

While much of the church is constructed out of yellow brick, red bricks are visible for decorative purposes.

The structure sits on a rough stone foundation that provides a basement. There are five, twotier buttresses along the north and south façade with red bricks used to accent each one.

The windows are lancetshaped with red brick decorating each surround head. While most of the windows have been filled with cement in the 1950s, some of the remaining ones possess 12 panes of glass.

Once inside, you will be treated with an exceptional example of Masonic architecture in Ontario.

The floor area, referred as the Masonic pavement, has contrasting colours that symbolize the uncertainty of life.

The Rising Sun Masonic Lodge is one of the oldest, if not the oldest, fraternal organization currently in its 150th year.

AURORA

UNITED CHURCH

The Aurora United Church congregation is the oldest in Aurora.

The church is still used as a place of worship having stood on the corner of Yonge and Tyler

Streets, since 1818.

The church has a long and interesting history, beginning with the earliest settlers to this area in 1817.

Initially, early meetings took place in private homes. In 1818, a log cabin was built for worship and served the congregation until 1855 when a new frame church was built on site. The latest was partially gutted by fire in 1877

The current church was built in 1878 of brick with a stone foundation.

It boasted two spires, the taller of which rose to a staggering 146 feet, and provided a prominent landmark in the Town of Aurora.

In 1893 a cyclone struck the church, destroying the stained glass windows on the south side, and the great spire.

The spire was replaced with a shorter steeple. However, both steeples were removed in 1943 after being struck by lightning several times.

The Church was designed by Architect H. Langley in the Gothic Revival style. It demonstrates an abundance of stylistic elements due to the renovations made over several decades that have altered its original state.

Visit this important site, and allocate enough time to visit the sanctuary that was modified in 2009. This was the first significant redesign of the building in more than 100 years.

VICTORIA HALL

Right at the corner of Mosley and Victoria Streets stands this fine example of a simple Gothic Revival church of the late 19th century

The building is one of only two surviving examples of this sort of structure in Aurora, the other being the Aurora Rising Sun Masonic Lodge.

In 1883 the structure was built to house the Disciples of Christ Church.

In 1922 the building was sold to the Town of Aurora for \$3,500. It became known as "Health Hall", the headquarters for the nurse who served the school and who also offered public health services.

By 1945, the building once again changed its use and became the Public Library until 1963. However, the library lacked several amenities such as a toilet and a telephone, and was described as dark and dismal.

In 1965, the building was named Victoria Hall, and has since been used for community programs, and as a rental space.

Outstanding features of the building are its yellow buff brick exterior with stone foundation; arched windows; the buttresses; front gable; steeply pitched roof ornamented by the exposed ends of the roof rafters; and the 1883 date stone over the main entrance.

Doors Open visitors will not only enjoy the historical and architectural features of this historic building, but can also bring their children to have a great day at this Kids' Arts and Heritage site.

Special activities are planned to engage children in learning about local history and

heritage.

Through play, kids will have the opportunity to enjoy colour sketches of known heritage buildings in Aurora; an exhibition of historical photos of Aurora's kids; having their faces painted; learning how kids dressed in the 1800s and 1900s; making dolls; having their photos taken in period clothing; and jewelry making by Carrie Eastwood, a local artisan.

WALKING TOUR

The tour will take you on a wonderful journey to explore Northeast Old Aurora Heritage Conservation District.

The tour will be led by Jacqueline Stuart, a local history expert and the winner of the 2007 Lieutenant Governor's Ontario Heritage Award for Lifetime Achievement.

The Northeast Old Aurora neighbourhood was designated as a Heritage Conservation District in 2006; it is characterized by a wealth of heritage buildings, historic sites, and unique landscape.

This walking tour with Ms Stuart is an opportunity to learn about the rich history of this part of town and to enjoy the variety of architectural styles dating back to the mid 1800s.

The tour leaves from the Doors Open booth at the Aurora Farmers' Market at 10 a.m.

WALKING TOUR TWO

Local history enthusiast and storyteller David Heard will be your guide.

This tour will make special stops at selected significant buildings, where stories will be brought to life.

Some of these locations are: "Poplar Villa," "The Clock Tower," and much more.

This opportunity is not to be missed; walking Aurora's streets with Mr. Heard is re-living its past in the best way possible.

You will walk away reflecting on our proud men and women of Aurora and the community they built by unselfish acts and sacrifice.

You will rediscover Aurora like never before and...you will love it even more.

The tour leaves from the Doors Open booth at the Aurora Farmers' Market at 11.30 a.m.

WALKING TOURS THREE AND FOUR

Two walking tours are planned so visitors can experience Aurora's natural heritage.

They will focus on ecological features in the forested valley lands.

Both tours start at Sheppard's Bush Conservation Area and go to Vandorf Road. Each tour is about two hours

long.



All in all, an enjoyable summer evening of love, humour and mayhem.



be open to interpretation.

"We feel it is more comprehensive than the current Official Plan." he continued. "We think that Council will now, through this plan, have much more certainty in what they are reviewing and how they are to review it in terms of conformity of this document.

"The whole idea of this official plan is to make sure that the Town Council can utilize all of the provincial legislation, the regional policy support, and your own official plan to help you make decisions that will be supportable and winnable at the Ontario Municipal Board."

The plan will appear again at a special meeting September 8 at 7 p.m. where comments, ideas, and input will be received.

Based on "fundamental principles" such as the promotion of "responsible growth management", "Building a Greener Community", providing "a range and mix of housing", the protection of "stable neighbourhoods", the development of "vibrant new neighbourhoods", advancing the economy, and establishing a linked Greenlands System, the

plan covers a wide range of issues from tracking economic progress to establishing a public art policy.

Policies have been added within the plan, which are targeted to attracting what Mr. Palmer described as "prestige office uses in certain locations", as well as identifying key areas of economic growth, including manufacturing and research and development.

"To understand how the Town is doing on their economic development strategy, we've promoted a policy that establishes the requirement to track down the town's progress on an annual basis," he said.

"These economic development policies are intended to underpin the objectives and policies of land use framework for both the Aurora Promenade and for the employment lands and major institutional and commercial areas of the Town. '

The plan also identifies the creation of public art as "an important part of the public realm" which "contributes to an overall sense of place and community".

have Council promote the creation of public art through initiatives under the Town, encouraging the inclusion of public art in "all significant public and provide sector developments", and "actively solicit" gifts and gifts inkind to the Town for these initia-

These policies garnered some concern from Councillor John Gallo, who argued in favour of putting a percentage on "any significant public or private sector

developments" to put these initiatives in motion.

"That percentage of the total budget would go towards public art," said Councillor Gallo. "The original [draft plan] had two per cent to it and I am amenable to increasing or decreasing that. I realize that we are not going to do this tonight, but I wanted to bring it up as it was a concern of mine and something that is very important.

"I would like that discussion to continue."

In fact, the invention of printing by Johannes Guttenberg dates back only to about 600 years ago and resulted in books and newspapers available to the public; to this day, the excitement of the written word persists in a tradition, which is unlikely to bow before newer technology.

No matter how present day technology advances, the ASA Book Club continues serenely with what Guttenberg invented and those who followed refined.
