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

## Colour Yonge red and white

Probably never in the 213-year history of Yonge Street, has the historic road seen so much red and white as it did last Tuesday.

For almost an hour at any given point, Aurora's newly renovated Canada Day parade flashed the colours of the country.

Watched by an estimated 10,000 people, the Canada Day Parade – after an absence of one year – returned to the main street of Aurora with a vengeance.

It proved that a parade was a necessary part of Aurora's July First celebrations, a two-day party that started here in 1969, and gave Aurora the new title of "Canada's Birthday Town".

Included in the lengthy parade were more than 50 entries, from floats to horses to clowns.

After the parade was cancelled last year, Snowball resident (Snowball is on Wellington Street West at Dufferin Street in King Township) Sher St. Kitts decided the parade was a necessary part of the Canada Day festivities.

She convinced the Town of Aurora to advertise for committee members, and before long, the Canada Day Parade Sub-Committee was formed.

It met on a weekly basis, putting together a show that won't soon be forgotten in Aurora.

Besides the parade, the committee organized a show at the Aurora Cenotaph, and arranged to have small Canadian flags placed in front of several Aurora homes.

"We would have done the whole community," Sher said, "but the federal government only sent us 5,000 flags when we had ordered 10,000."

In addition to the return of the parade, the dance held a night earlier, came back to the Town

Park after an absence of three years, and it, too, was attended by thousands of people.

It had been moved from the Park to the Recreation Complex in 2005, and attendance there left something to be desired.

Originally, the pre-holiday dance was held at the Aurora Community Centre, and a huge cake was brought in for those attending.

The first party, in 1969, had the late Bobby Gimby in attendance. He sang his number one hit "Ca-na-da", which led to the birth of Aurora's motto.

That year, and several after, the parade formed up in the parking lot of Sterling Drug at Yonge and Murray and headed north to the Community Centre where activities, including a huge beer garden, took place for the rest of the day.

Fireworks were set off in nearby parks, announcing the end of festivities for another year.

The fireworks show still attracts thousands of people, and this year was no exception.

Held near the Leisure Complex, the event caused the usual traffic jam when it ended.

This year's parade marshal, Ron Wallace, hopes that next year, the Canada Day Parade will go from south to north along Yonge Street.

"If we can convince the town to move some of its festivities back to the Community Centre, there will be good reason to have the parade go in that direction," he said. "Once the parade gets to its end, participants will be able to enjoy other activities instead of having the get in their cars and driving to other events."

## BizPal may become an Aurora reality

At a recent meeting of the Economic Development Advisory Committee, the Economic Development Officer provided an audio-visual overview of the BizPal Business Permits and Licences Interactive software package which is currently being researched as a new service to be offered by the town.

BizPal is a Canada-wide permit and licensing web-based online access system run by Industry Canada in partnership with provincial governments and territories, regional and municipal governments.

It is designed to assist any interested party wishing to start a business, by helping them access and complete necessary forms, permits, requirements and approvals to get started.

The software also provides ongoing assistance and resources to the client throughout the start-up process as well as additional follow-up support

within the first year of operation.

The committee was advised that funding for the project would be provided by higher levels of government and start-up time for the project would be about eight to 10 weeks.

A series of questions regarding their business guides entrepreneurs through the business permit and licence process and provides a list of all licences and permits showing requirements from each level of government.

Implementation of BizPal in York Region will serve mainly as a portal to the nine municipalities as most licensing needs are through municipal governments.

York Regional Council has approved the implementation of the BizPal online permit and licensing information system and a copy of the regional report has been circulated to local Economic Development Offices for their use and analysis in relation to the program.

### Back to its roots

Hot Spot Youth Club, the organization founded for kids, started life on Friday, the 13th.

It was created 17 years ago and officially opened at the Aurora Community Centre on Friday the 13th, 1991.

This Friday, it returns to its roots. It has survived all these years because of dedicated volunteers, senior youth staff, oldest being 29, and all who used to come to Hot Spot.

The Temple Family, who have been involved for 15 years, have also played a major role in the group's success, said organizer Wendy Gaertner.

The Town, the Optimists and Opti-Mrs. Clubs supported the idea of a pre- and young teen drop-in and provided seed money and an initial operating grant.

It provides supervised leisure time for anyone in Grades 6,7 and 8, with those going into Grade 6 welcomed as of July. The children have a great time socializing, listening to music, playing non-electronic games, participating in contests and sometimes even dancing.

When the organization needed to find a regular weekly location for the children, the Lions Club stepped in to host and the group has used the Lions facility for the last 11 years.

Admission was originally \$2 and has been \$5 for the last five years. It will increase to \$6 in the Fall.

### Sisters moved

The Mortgage Sisters & Company, representing Northwood Mortgage Ltd., forced from their location adjacent to Park Place Manor, have moved.

Kelly Malehmir, one of the sisters, told The Auroran, the business is now located on Yonge Street near the intersection of Aurora Heights Drive.

The business had been operating from a trailer on Yonge Street but was apparently not zoned to do so.

A sign, advertising the business, was covered and the operation was forced to move to a new site.

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
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# Wellington sign issue finally being approved

The long outstanding issue of the gateway signage at Wellington Street East and Highway 404 has finally been approved by council for one gateway sign to be located within the loop on the northbound lane of Highway 404 at Wellington Street East.

The sign will be lit with a standard electrical hookup at an estimated cost of \$77,099.

Aurora Council has had a problem deciding what to do with the \$80,000 offered by Whitwell Developments in May, 2005, for a gateway feature at the intersection.

Wellington Street was considered as a

primary gateway to the municipality, and in March, 2001, the Economic Development Advisory Committee was asked to prepare cost estimates and details for the gateway feature with funds to be provided in the 2002 budget.

In December, 2002, council endorsed a recommendation from the Advisory Committee and for funds to be included in the 2003 budget, but nothing happened.

Then in May, 2005, the Whitwell offer was received and the issue was referred back to the Economic Development Advisory Committee

and staff to prepare the design of the feature, the cost and other details including installation.

In March, 2007, the Advisory Committee washed their hands of the issue and referred it back to council as the cost estimates were in excess of the \$80,000 with the recommendation that council make a decision pertaining to the additional funds required.

Councillors expressed concern about the proposed cost and the requirement for additional funding and suggested that alternatives be considered.

In June, 2007, council appointed Mayor Phyllis Morris and Councillors Al Wilson and Stephen Granger to an Ad Hoc Committee with a mandate to develop some alternative recommendations regarding gateway signage to bring closure to the long outstanding issue.

At a recent general committee meeting, the

report of the Ad Hoc Committee was adopted without question or comment recommending the gateway feature be two signs with the town logo, but without the tag line as it was decided it would be too difficult to read at high speed.

One sign will be for southbound traffic on Highway 404 and the other for northbound traffic and a consultant will be engaged to prepare the plans and site specifications as required by the Ministry of Transportation.

When approval has been received from the Ministry, three Requests for Proposals will be issued, for the sign, the solar lighting and landscaping and once contractors have been selected, work will begin with the entire project not to exceed the \$80,000 donated by Whitwell Developments.

Due to revised cost estimates, council has now given approval for one sign as identified in the staff report.

# Council handled town's affairs back in 1971

*Modern-day municipal politics is hectic, As councillors meet for hours and hours; It was quite different in the old days, Work was done with time to smell the flowers.*

While the town was much smaller in the old days, there were still problems facing members of council with the rapid growth during the early 1960s as the construction of Regency Acres and Aurora Heights subdivisions took place.

Council then had no professional planning staff to advise them.

Aurora Heights was the town's first subdivision, while Regency became a reality after Sterling Drug - manufacturers of Aspirin - moved its operation from Windsor to Aurora, and opened a huge manufacturing plant at the southwest corner of Yonge and Murray Drive.

But the work got done without the necessity of the long and numerous meetings of the current council as council members had to make all the decisions.

They didn't have the staff to refer issues to but they still had time to travel around the town and meet the people.

One of the most puzzling parts of any tour of the town was the difference in population as shown on the highway signs at the different entrances to the town.

Over the years nothing much has changed.

In October, 1971, according to the population sign on Wellington Street, Aurora had 12,500 people, but if you entered the town via Yonge Street the population was only 11,000.

Today, signs at Aurora's entrances suggest population anywhere between 40,000 and 50,000.

Our journey begins in 1971.

As we travel east on Wellington Street from Bathurst, there are some large homes set back from the roadway on the south side and on the north is the pretty Lutheran Church.

A side trip up Hilldale Road into a small subdivision. The subdivision was originally arranged by King Township and was assumed by the town as a result of regional government.

The town had just received a copy of the subdivision agreement from King Township and it was being reviewed by town staff to determine Aurora's responsibilities in completing the project.

There was a small park in the subdivision but no decision had been made at that time as to what would be done with it.

Proceeding north on MacDonald Drive we visit the Whitestrip subdivision which is another nice area with neat homes and uncluttered streetscape giving a feeling of open space.

The town was having some problems with the developer in fixing up some of the sidewalks and the issue could end up in the courts as there was no way the town could accept the services in their present condition.

Back on Wellington Street we stop at the Gateway Plaza, at the corner of Haida Drive.

The plaza had just been purchased by John Kaptyn and improvements were planned.

Bell Telephone had been carrying out considerable work on Wellington Street laying underground cables and the roadway, sidewalks and grass were left in poor condition.

York Region and Aurora were putting on the pressure to get the area cleaned up.

A left turn on Machell Avenue brought us to the end of the street where the Pollution Control Centre was located. We visited with Carl Quantz, who was on duty.

Back along Machell for a stop at the apartment building under construction!


Council tried to stop its development as the basement apartment was in the flood plain with a potential danger of flooding. The developer took the town to court and he was granted a writ of mandamus and the town had to issue the building permit.

Some of the residents on the west side of Machell were having a tough time with flooding as every time there was a heavy rain, the rain water rushed from the IGA, now an empty store parking lot onto their property.

The Toronto Dominion property at Yonge and Wellington looked like a bombed-out area with the demolition of the Queen's Hotel for the construction of a bank.

The owners of the adjacent properties contacted T-D officials to propose a joint commercial complex for the corner, which never materialized but the construction of the bank was delayed pending the negotiations.

That was a brief picture of what Aurora looked like back in October, 1971.



These two views of a six-inch ruler from John's Groceteria came from e-Bay, and when we liberated them, the bid was \$6 for the item. So, where was John's Groceteria located. What was John's last name? What happened to him? Anyone know?

# Bicycling across the country brings Aurora woman success

To the editor,

A few final thoughts...on the Sears National Kids Cancer Ride.

It's awfully hard to come down from this ride and go back to life before the Sears National Kids Cancer Ride....before I got that phone call at the end of November last year inviting me to be a national rider.

Every single day since then was focused on fundraising, training, and planning for the ride across Canada.

As many of my fellow national riders have expressed, it will take some time still for each of us to process our thoughts and emotions about all that we experienced during those incredible 19 days...truly a life changing experience for everyone involved.

Did I really cycle all the way across Canada?

Did I actually manage

to raise almost \$16,000? It doesn't seem enough. I wish I could do more...

The physical challenge of each team member cycling more than 3,000 kilometres was for me, manageable...thankfully no days off due to fatigue or injuries to keep me off the road.

The longest day's ride was 281 kilometres.

The biggest climbing challenge we encountered was not in the Rockies or in northern Ontario, but surprisingly in New Brunswick, where we encountered grades of 19 and 20 per cent in two days of ascending almost 2,000 metres.

The emotional challenges we faced on the ride, however, were difficult, and often, overwhelming. We met children and their families at children's hospitals and Sears locations every day whose stories ripped at our hearts.

Brave little soldiers of this dreaded disease called cancer, that robs them every day of the innocence of their childhood.

They cheered and smiled...and posed for pictures and thanked us, the cyclists, for being strong and courageous to undertake to cycle across Canada.

But they are the courageous ones, the children and their families, who live each day with such strength and hope...and who are the incredible inspiration for us who rode.

The President and CEO of Sears Canada, Dene Rogers, who is not a cyclist, trained for months and cycled 100 kilometres with us from Hamilton to Toronto.

Within days of that ride he announced to us that Sears has committed to doubling its financial contribution for next year's ride!

And so the Coast to Coast Against Cancer Foundation met its goal of this, the inaugural Sears National Kids Cancer Ride.

We brought children's cancer to the attention of Canadians from coast to coast. We let the children and families who suffer from cancer know that we hear their suffering, and we care, and we raised a heck of a lot of money to be shared amongst the 17 pediatric oncology centres across Canada, for programs and research.

Our goal was to raise \$1.5 million...and when the final tally is done, I have a feeling we will have more than surpassed that amount!

I would like to thank everyone who supported my efforts in this ride, by making donations, hosting and participating in fundraising events,

children suffering with cancer.

Next stop...The Tour for Kids ride August 14-17 to raise funds for Camp Trillium, Camp Quality, and Camp Ochegeas in Ontario.

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

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## Front Porch Perspective

As I wrote last week, I attended the provincial Progressive Conservative policy town hall meeting at the St. George campus of the University of Toronto a little while ago.

More than 220 people attended, and Aurora was well represented by a good-sized contingent, led by MPP, Frank Klees.

I was in attendance, in my capacity as first vice president (responsible for policy and fundraising) of the local riding association.

This policy conference was for the GTA East and GTA West riding associations and it was the first of five such regional policy gatherings that will be held during the year.

We spent that Saturday identifying what we believe are the key issues within each of the portfolios. No suggestions were offered as the party leadership, at this point, simply wants to determine what individual party volunteers feel is important and to identify policy priority areas.

Over the next three years party members will be shaping and developing policy resolutions on a wide range of issues so that by the time the 2011 election rolls around, the party will have a policy platform that has been debated, and vetted by the ordinary volunteer members.

The policy discussions were split up into two sessions during the day. In the morning, delegates could pick from energy, or the environment, to name a few, while in the afternoon, people could choose to attend the sessions on health, economic development, or rural affairs.

I chose to attend the energy forum in the morning and then the health session in the afternoon.

There were about 25 people in the health care session, and they represented quite a cross section. We had a doctor, a couple of nurses, a pharmacist, some health care administrators, and a management consultant who works in the industry.

The gentlemen chairing the session went around the room and asked each of us to identify ourselves and the key issues as we saw them.

When it came to my turn, I said something to the effect that, "Unlike many of you, I don't have any expertise in this area, but my interest is based on two things: First, a column in the Globe and Mail some time back by Jeffrey Simpson about the sustainability of health care given that this portfolio continues to eat up so much of the spending envelope and second, as someone who has had to interface with the health care system on behalf of a number of family members, I am worried about the quality and delivery of those services."

I then sat back and listened for most of the next two hours or so, only offering one or two inconsequential remarks.

Without breaking the confidentiality of these discussions, I came out of this session with a couple of things to think about.

First, the enormity of this ministry. Health care is by far the largest budget item that we have. The total annual Ontario budget is close to \$100 billion and health care spending is about 40 per cent of this.

Second, the annual, year over year, spending increase in this envelope is not sustainable.

Health care spending (seven per cent-plus per year) is increasing at a rate faster than government revenue growth.

Third, we need to (in my opinion at least) reframe the arguments surrounding health care.

The system developed in the early 1960's was put in place to do a different job.

It was basically for insulin, antibiotics and x-rays, while today, it is for hip replacements, MRIs and new drugs, which costs more every year.

Fourth, a reasoned and rational debate is needed on this issue.

It is not good enough today to say that medicare is a "sacred trust" that must be preserved and protected.

We can't let these simple bromides represent our full thinking on health care; this file is too important for that.

But while I am convinced that as a country and province that we need to have this debate, I am worried that it won't happen because any kind of discussion will quickly deteriorate into a taxonomy of the right vs. left.

Remember when local MPP Frank Klees simply mused about charging \$5 per person each time they used a hospital.

Everyone was quick to condemn him, even though the provincial government introduced the \$900 per family health levy a couple of years ago.

All in all it was an interesting session that left me with many questions.

I hope to explore some of these in the coming weeks.

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

One of the most devastating problems facing many couples today is not being able to have a child - infertility. I see this in many patients that I have had the good fortune to meet. For many, the anguish is nothing short of heart-breaking. Many such couples have been everywhere - fertility clinics, have had fertility enhancing drugs, vitamin injections, counseling, etc. - all to no avail.

In my own experience, I have found most cases of fertility to be fairly one-sided. In other words, I have found that it is usually women that seem to be at fault and unable to achieve pregnancy. Now, do not get me wrong, I am not blaming women for this difficulty in any way, and this is not a sexist remark, but the problem, I have observed, seems to be more with women than with men. Let me explain.

Women are much more familiar with this function whereas most men are not. For you who are not all that aware of exactly how this all takes place, let's look at the following. When a woman ovulates, the egg goes down one fallopian tube

one month and then down the other fallopian tube the next month. In other words, it tends to alternate to give one or the other a break. The egg starts at one end of the fallopian tube and ends up at the uterus or womb at the other. The egg does not swim or have any flippers, arms, or legs, and so it is carried along by what we call passive transport. In other words, it is simply a bystander going for a ride; much like a ride in a convoluted water tube of a water park. The reason this takes place is because of a very exact function of the different muscles that make up the walls of the Fallopian tubes. They literally "squeeze" the egg from one end of the tube to the other. The purpose of this function is to meet the sperm at the other end so that fertilization can take place and a baby starts to develop. In other words, the egg starts at one end of the fallopian tube and the muscles of the tube gently squeeze it from one end to the other. This process is called peristalsis and is very similar to swallowing while you eat; the muscles in your esophagus, the tube which you swallow food through, literally guide what you have just swallowed, all the way down into your stomach. The

same goes with the Fallopian tube.

Let's look at this from the perspective of a couple not being able to achieve pregnancy:

In most couples who are labeled "INFERTILE" (and you know how much I detest labels) it seems that the egg is not able to make it through the Fallopian tube to meet the sperm. Unless that union is allowed to take place, there is no pregnancy, hence no baby. Not a good thing.

Let's look at this even closer for a moment:

As I mentioned, the function of the muscles of the fallopian tubes is to propel the egg from one end to the other, in order to meet the sperm. In some cases of infertility, however, this does not take place. Why would the muscles that are designed and programmed to perform that very special function every month, decide suddenly that they simply won't do it? Well, the answer is quite simple - it is not their decision. The muscles

of your body do not decide, on their own, what to do. They are literally ordered or not ordered to do their job. In cases of infertility, I have found that the muscles are simply not able to take the egg from one end of the Fallopian tube to the other. In most cases, it is the fault of the nervous system which controls that very function. I have found that the culprit is often a vertebral subluxation, generally in the lower part of the spine, which interferes with the manner in which the Fallopian tubes would normally function. By correcting the subluxation, and allowing the nervous system to be able to control the function of those Fallopian tubes normally, couples, in many cases, can achieve pregnancy.

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# Church St. Culture Centre close to reality

At the May 2008 meeting of the Arts and Culture Advisory Committee a presentation was made by Ariana Moscote Freire of Novita Interparas Limited regarding the Aurora Arts and Culture Centre Strategic Plan and Business Planning Study.

In a report to a recent general committee meeting, the Advisory Committee noted that members held a lengthy work session and discussed both documents on a page-by-page basis.

Ms Freire advised that she will prepare the Implementation Plan as the next step in the process taking into account the changes and amendments as agreed upon and will highlight the changes in the final Implementation Plan document.

The Advisory Committee received the report and approved it in principle for the purpose of moving forward to the Implementation Plan for the project.

The general committee received the Advisory Committee report and requested that a presentation be made to council.

In providing an overview the consultants recommended that for the identity of the facility, the new arts and cultural centre be named the Church Street School Cultural Centre based on the scope of activities to occur within it.

The Business Plan describes the recommended relationship to be established between the town and the Church Street Cultural Centre, which will be a separately incorporated organization with close ties to the town.

An Occupancy Agreement will allow the Cultural Centre to operate within the town-owned Church Street School property.

A Services Provision Agreement between the

two corporations whereby the Centre agrees to offer services on the town's behalf will outline the responsibilities of each party in the relationship.

Core funding from the town will provide stability to the Centre and guarantee its ability to run programs.

This core funding will be provided in exchange for services offered to town residents.

An Asset Management Agreement will also be struck through which the town will take responsibility for base facility management costs such as heating, lighting and insurance.

By allowing a separately incorporated organization to run the Centre, the ability is provided for the Cultural Centre Corporation to generate revenues which would not be available to the town were it to run through a town department.

The strength of this model is that it will allow the Centre a measure of flexibility and the advantages of independence

while the close ties with the town will ensure accountability of the project to the residents of Aurora.

The Strategic Plan was based on a review of the documentation relating to the physical building, review of the past history of the project and a review of town strategies and policies relevant to the project.

The goals for the project were set out in the application which was made by the town to the Cultural Spaces Canada program.

They include providing a space for artistic creativity and innovation, providing a central venue for cultural expression, multi-disciplinary activities and increased and improved access to performing arts, visual arts, media arts, museum collections, heritage displays and exhibitions.

Although the Arts and Cultural Centre already has its building in the Church Street School it is otherwise an entirely new venture and the consultant has listed 15 strategies which need to be mobilized as work

proceeds toward the public launch of the Arts and Cultural Centre.

The Business Plan part of the report provides a framework for the operation of the Cultural Centre and includes 18 items and even though there may be pressure to get the program up and running sooner, the consultant recommended that the sequence of organizational development be followed.

The key goal of the business plan is to create the organization which will fund and deliver programming.

The Strategic and Business Plan makes 11 overall recommendations including the various agreements, base funding and for the town to ensure the Cultural Centre has the highest level of leadership asset out in the plan.

Church Street School is located at the corner of Church Street and Victoria Street.

## Unique Aurora gardens featured at Doors Open

The third article in the Doors Open series features some of Aurora's unique private gardens that can be seen at this year's event which takes place Saturday, August 16 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

#### Merlin's Hollow

New to Doors Open Aurora this year is Aurora's most famous garden, Merlin's Hollow, located at 181 Centre Crescent.

Owners of the property, David and Dierdre Tomlinson, have generously offered to open the doors to their three quarter-acre English flower garden, which is sure to be an inspiration to anyone with an interest in gardening.

Designed and started in 1981 by David Tomlinson, a landscape architect, the layout of the garden is based on traditional English Flower Gardens and follows the philosophy of Gertrude Jekyll (1843-1932).

Gertrude Jekyll was an influential British garden designer, writer, and artist. She created more than 400 gardens in the UK, Europe and the USA.

Jekyll was one of the first of her profession to take into account the colour, texture, and experience of gardens as the prominent authorities in her designs, and she was a life-long fan of plants of all genres.

Her theory of how to design with colour was influenced by painter JMW Turner and by Impressionism.

Merlin's Hollow is not one but a series of gardens within a garden.

Enclosed by high cedar hedges, each garden has its own distinct character and a series of arches invite the visitor from one garden to the next.

Features within the garden include woodland beds, a fern walk alpine garden, bog beds and a frog pond.

The garden now contains more than 2,500 different plants, including many rare ones.

Although Merlin's Hollow is open to the public by the Tomlinsons a few weekends each year, often in support of local charitable causes, visitors typically only see the garden from May to the beginning of July.

Doors Open Aurora 2008 provides gardening enthusi-

asts with a rare - mid-August glimpse of what is surely one of York Region's most beautiful spaces, and the colours that are on show at that time of year.

#### The Pines

Another new Aurora garden on this year's tour is one known as "The Pines", located at 78 Wells Street, across from the Town Park.

The distinctive feature of the Pines is the large stand of pine trees, some of which are thought to date as far back as the 1820s.

The property was historically part of the garden of the 19th Century house located to the north, but after the Second World War a lot was created at the corner of Wells and Mosley and a new house built among the majestic pine trees.

The owners of the house for the past 24 years have been Robert Leonard and Susan Morton-Leonard and family.

They have dedicated much of their time to preserving the historic pine trees and building one of Aurora's most beautiful gardens among them.

Because of their status as some of Aurora's oldest trees and the visual landmark that they have provided for generations in old Aurora, The Pines became the first trees in Aurora to be designated under the Ontario Heritage Act earlier this year.

Robert and Susan will be on hand to describe some of the landscape works that they have undertaken, and how they maintain the legacy of these historic pine trees, some of which date from the days of the earliest settlement in Aurora.

When I learned this past week that an Ontario Cabinet Minister had made a formal request to the federal government to amend the criminal code to allow Ontario's casinos to take bets on sporting events, I was once again struck by the misplaced priorities of the McGuinty government.

Expanding gaming will attract more gambling activity, especially at border locations, saving jobs and enhancing tourism.

What you won't hear from Mr. McGuinty or his ministers, is that their government coffers are experiencing withdrawal from gambling revenues and they need their fix.

(And they also won't admit that they'll be skimming much of this additional take from people who can least afford it).

An observer of the legislature over this past session would be aware that the government rejected repeated proposals by the Official Opposition that would have stimulated Ontario's tourism sector with a meaningful economic plan.

Instead, we are faced with yet another

numerous requests in the closing days of the parliamentary session to legislate mandatory reporting by school officials of student on student assaults.

Yet expanding gambling was apparently more important, and merits a special appeal to the federal cabinet.

The justification for

transforming Ontario into Vegas North is that Ontario's casino revenues are down and the tourism sector is suffering.

Rather than expanding gambling, the government should be launching a comprehensive review of the effects of the current gambling policies on individuals and families.

Rather than ignoring reports of illegal activities by organized crime in our casinos they should be vigorously pursued.

And rather than pretending the personal tragedies resulting from problem gambling don't exist, the government should be assuming its responsibilities and ensure the proper safeguards and support programs are in place.

While for many, Ontario's casinos are seen as a places of fun and entertainment, but for too many they have come to represent personal ruin.

While we can't legislate responsibility, we ARE responsible for

what we legislate.

To that end, I will oppose the McGuinty government's proposal to expand gambling and I welcome your comments and opinions on

this or any other issue of importance to you.

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# OMA opposes government plan

Last March the Ontario government budget included \$38 million to create nurse-only clinics in the province.

In a letter to Aurora Council recently the Ontario Medical Association pointed out that this presented a marked departure from the government's long standing commitment to collaborative, integrated primary care models that serve the best interests of patients.

The OMA requested council as the representative voice of the community to continue to promote collaborative care models so that the provincial government takes whatever steps

necessary to ensure that all citizens have ready access to the care that only a family physician can provide.

With the implementation of the pilot nurse practitioner clinic in Sudbury, Ontario's doctors raised concerns with the Ministry of Health that a nurse-only approach was inconsis-

tent with the goal of integrating health providers.

Aurora Council received the correspondence as information.

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

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
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
