#### Internet voting approved for 2018 in "hybrid" system

Aurorans will be able to go to the polls from the comfort of their own homes in the 2018 Municipal Election.

Following a Council decision last week, Aurora will adopt a "hybrid" voting system which will allow eligible voters to cast their ballots online in advanced polls while giving people the option of coming out on Election Day itself to physically cast their vote.

It was a decision that was hardly

## Saturday's Powwow is about moving forward towards a New Beginning: Indigenous community

Footprints often show where we've been but this Saturday footprints will show where we're going as Indigenous Leaders converge on Aurora to usher in a new beginning.

As Indigenous elders, dancers and singers prepare to make their Grand Entrance at 12 noon for the New Beginnings Powwow at Lambert Wilson Park, youngsters will be putting their creativity to work creating their own set of footprints. For Powwow organizer Rod Nettagog, it is symbolic of walking together and a way forward on a healing journey that is long overdue.

The June 3 Powwow, a hallmark of Aurora's Canada 150 Celebrations, was initially proposed to mark the sesquicentennial of Canada's celebration, but it has taken on a much deeper meaning, one of Truth and Reconciliation led by Canada's First Nations.

"It is a dark past and this powwow is about moving forward," he explains of New Beginning. "Now it is time to move forward with reconciliation and bringing that understanding and awareness about our people and to learn and appreciate who we are as First Nations because this is Canada. I think everyone needs to know the true history of this country before European contact. Part of that is the powwow.

"It is a celebration, a time of singing and dancing and expressing who we are as indigenous people and welcome people into the circle to dance with us, to celebrate with us. That is what this time represents: a time to move forward. We can't forget about the past, but we need to move forward and to learn to forgive. We need to accept each other as brothers and sisters on Mother Earth."

When asked what Canada 150 means to him, Mr. Nettagog answers the question with a question: 150 years of what?

Canada, he says, was founded on genocide and the forced removal of their land and trees. Now, he says, they are left with about two per cent of the land with boil water advisories in their own communities.

"Where is the equity in that?" he asks. "These issues need to be addressed and talked about [so] Canada has an understanding of where indigenous people are and still being treated today."

Fostering this understanding is a key component stemming from the report of the Truth & Reconciliation Commission, which was intended to be a comprehensive response to address the Residential School system, the effects of which are still being felt today. One such effect was the attempted suppression of indigenous culture, forbidding traditional languages, traditions and celebrations.

Since then, there has been a concerted effort to re-learn these

traditions and, most importantly, reclaim identity.

That being said, along the way, there have been – and continue to be – significant misconceptions to address, one of the most evident of which is cultural appropriation. You only have to look as far as a festival to see non-indigenous people walking around with makeshift feather headdresses to get a flavour of cultural appropriation, which Mr. Nettagog says is a "mockery."

With that in mind, it was important to set the right tone in deciding Saturday's craft program. Working on a theme of inclusion, organizers settled on creating footprints to represent the path moving forward, along with representation of the traditional medicine wheel to show "the different races of Mother Earth and how we all have those gifts we bring within that circle, we are respecting each other, and walking together."

"We are all human beings," says Mr. Nettagog. "We need to treat each other as human beings, and I think not a lot of people are aware of that."

Surveying where this relationship between Indigenous and non-Indigenous Canadians stands after 150 years, Mr. Nettagog said he would like to see "more awareness" generated over the next 50 years ahead of the 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Confederation."

"It is going to take a long time," he says. "They say it will take a lot of years to get back to where we were as Indigenous people and take those responsibilities back of learning the ceremonies, the songs and the dances because a lot of that was lost through the residential school system and it affected everybody in so many different ways. There are a lot of people out there who aren't even aware of the effects it had on a lot of us.

needs "There to be that understanding of why we're out there still fighting for our rights as Indigenous peoples because we want to have clean drinking water as everyone else does. We want to have the same healthcare and education as everyone else across the board. It doesn't really matter how many people show on Saturday; [success is] the fact that this is happening for the first time in Aurora and that is success. It is getting that word out there. It's a time of celebration and a time of song and dance."

The New Beginnings Powwow will take place at Lambert Willson Park (135 Industrial Parkway North) this Saturday, June 3, from 12 noon until 9 p.m. Events get underway with the Grand Entry at 12 noon, festivities and activities from 1 – 5 p.m., a feast from 5 – 7 p.m., and closing ceremonies beginning at 7 p.m. The Powwow will feature craft and food vendors each with Indigenous roots. Admission is free, but attendees are asked to leave their pets at home (Service animals exempt). For more, visit aurora.ca/powwow.



#### Time for engagement on a new memorial: reader

(Re: Vimy anniversary put purpose of **Cenotaph into perspective)** 

There's not much to be added to John Sander's eloquent letter calling for Council to reconsider its decision to place a LAV in the Cenotaph Park.

At the time, it was obvious that Councillors were unprepared to debate this issue and didn't want to be labelled as "anti-veteran," as some told me.

Now the question is, "Who will show bold leadership by proposing a monument to all who have died serving Canada since WW2, and who have not yet been recognized?

Such a monument should be in keeping with the physical and spiritual character of the Cenotaph envisioned and erected under leadership of citizens of Aurora, King Township, and Whitchurch Township in the mid-1920s.

These were small urban and rural communities with limited resources, but with a vision to erect a unique memorial, a memorial that has no equal across Canada.

Now it is up to Council to engage the Royal Canadian Legion with the aim of a providing a new memorial that reflects the character of our Cenotaph, and which would reflect the definition of a cenotaph.

Together they could engage the local artistic community and commission a locally designed work.

Definition: "A sepulchral monument to person(s) whose body elsewhere", from Greek words meaning, "empty tomb".

It suggests that while remembering those who have made the ultimate sacrifice is okay we must dissociate ourselves from the trappings of war as if to say, "we're not like that anymore." My wife and I were at Vimy last month (after the big show when it was quieter and much colder).

Three of the eleven thousand names of those with no known grave related were to me. True, there are no weapons on display, but the grimness of war is there. On Hill 145. It is in the trenches, the shell holes,

tunnels and the small signs warning of unexploded ammunition. It is a sobering monument to sacrifice erected on blood-soaked ground. As you say, in Aurora we have a Cenotaph where we can remember the fallen. The LAV monument simply reflects the sacrifice made by young Canadians in a different place and time. Aside from the fact that the LAV was mainly used to offer our troops protection, we should be reminded that the point isn't to glorify the vehicle, but rather to remember those that were sent into harm's way to use it. Lest We Forget.



#### **Not Scheer Luck!**

As a movie fan, it's a fairly safe bet that I like drama as much as the next

That being said, however, even I have my limits.

This past Saturday I was so grateful to have a previous commitment as, in the end, it saved me from myself. As the day wore on, I had flashbacks to years past where I was compelled by some invisible force to spend entire days on the couch waiting for an outcome that that was all but certain.

One of the last such times was the NDP leadership convention which propelled Tom Mulcair to the top job. The same can be said for the leadership races that shot Justin Trudeau, Michael Ignatieff and Stephane Dion to the head of the Liberal table with varying degrees of success.

As interested in politics as I am, I was not quite tuned in at the time Stephen Harper was crowned in the race to the newly-minted Conservative party, so this would have been my first time glued to a deep Blue sea. Yet, there was that pesky commitment, so I had to keep in touch via Smartphone.

And, phew, that was a close call! Waiting for the results in real time must have been agony for Conservative conventioneers and armchair politicos alike.

That is no reflection on the outcome of the race, but just the sheer wait for satisfaction. (Get it? I digress...)

Votes were cast in a tabulation system, so all the votes could be counted (and were), along with second, third, and fourth place votes, and the final numbers redistributed and crunched all within a minute or two of the last ballot being fed into the machine.

Yet, in a supreme feat of high drama, they kept each of the 13 candidates who held in for the bitter end of the race on the edge of their respective seats to an even more bitter end for all but one. And, in the end, there could only be one. And, of course, we know by now that Saskatchewan MP, and former Speaker of the House, is the one.

Mr. Scheer was ultimately tapped by party members – well, by points allocated to each riding – to fill the shoes of Mr. Harper, the size of which is yet to be decided by history.

"There is renewed hope for Canada starting today," he said to party faithful after his surprise victory over runnerup Maxime Bernier.

In his speech, which was warmly received by the energetic crowd in Toronto, he said a Conservative government in 2019 would focus on policies that create both prosperity and opportunity, on drafting balanced budgets, ending corporate welfare,

reining in spending, nixing any talk of a carbon tax and scrapping HST from home heating and electricity.

"You have made this a campaign of ideas," he said. "We know that Conservative solutions are the best response to the issues which we are confronted with. In the next months we will have to communicate those Conservative values to a greater number of Canadians. The next Conservative government will always be looking for new ways to make life more affordable by cutting your taxes, making it easier for the public sector to create jobs and we will end the Liberal policies that make it harder to start new businesses, make life more expensive for families and that punish hard work and success.

"There is a system that rewards hard work and success which benefits all Canadians. As Prime Minister, I will focus on results with Conservative policies that create prosperity and provide opportunity for every single Canadian."

But, Mr. Scheer also said he believed the foundation of the Canadian democracy is to "have a debate about any subject."

"That is why I am so committed to defending free speech," he said. "I will withhold Federal grants from university that shut down debate and

can't stand different points of view." "We all know what happens when Conservatives are divided," he added near the end of his speech. "We will not let that happen again. We win when we are united. Throughout this campaign. all of the leadership candidates... working independently grew this party to the biggest it has ever been in history. Now imagine what we will do when we're all working together."

Keeping taxes in check and fostering a hospitable environment for business have always been Conservative staples and what Mr. Scheer offered in his acceptance speech was earnest yet hardly ground-breaking.

From my perspective, the bolder pledge is party unity.

As the race drew to a close, most leadership candidates pledged they – and their supporters – would work

together, regardless of victor, under the "Big Blue Tent." It is a nice sentiment, to be sure, but how long will this goodwill last?

Taxes, business, and "freedom of speech" (although some might take issue with that phrase being used in this context) are issues that surely unite Conservatives, but there were many issues which rose to the top that can only serve to divide.

Take, for instance how the vote shook down in the riding of Aurora-Oak Ridges-Richmond Hill. According to data released by the party following Saturday night's announcement, Mr. Scheer handily beat Mr. Bernier on the thirteenth ballot with 60.54 per cent of the vote.

The first ballot, however, told a wildly different story.

At the outset, Saskatchewan MP Brad Trost, who ran on a campaign of rather hardline social conservatism when it came to abortion and to choose and equal marriage, to pick but two examples, was the clear leader of the pack with 47.96 per cent of the vote, with Maxime Bernier and Andrew Scheer in second and third place with 14.3 per cent and 12.6 per cent respectively.

The gap in Newmarket-Aurora was slightly narrower with Bernier and Trost tied for top spot on the first ballot with 24.58 per cent apiece, with Scheer in fourth position, about 1.5 per cent behind Erin O'Toole. (On the final ballot, Scheer and Bernier split the vote 50-50)

Mr. Scheer, of course, has social conservative values as does Mr. Trost to the enth degree. The popularity of Mr. Trost's campaign in certain pockets of Canada, coupled with the divisive immigration policies of Kellie Leitch, which undeniably resonated in certain segments of our country, makes me think the new leader's biggest task will be fostering that unity and truly defining what ultimately defines the party in a post-Harper universe.

If it was truly a campaign of ideas, the powers that be now have a smorgasbord to choose from. And, yes, those Conservative ideas do need to be communicated to a greater number of Canadians, but just what will those Conservative ideas be? Pocketbook ideas only go so far.

They better decide soon and, if Saturday was anything to go by, the New Leader better not put these ideas through a tabulated ballot or we could be waiting for the results through 2020.



#### Thoughts about the Federal Conservative Party Leadership Race

By the time that you read this, the Federal Conservatives will have a new

This past Saturday, the Conservatives announced the results of their Leadership vote.

This overly drawn out contest had fourteen contestants.

According to media reports, the party went from 90,000 members to now over 250,000 members and each one of them had an opportunity to vote for the leader.

Most pundits believe that former Conservative Cabinet Minister Maxime Bernier, a Member of Parliament from Quebec will win.

I chose to vote for my long-time good friend Erin O'Toole. He represents the riding of Durham. He was a former Veterans Affairs Minister in the Harper government. Prior to entering public life, he was a captain in the air force and worked as a lawyer.

Unlike previous leadership contests that were done by a delegated convention, whereby each riding association in the country sent representatives to a national party convention to vote, this was a one person one vote operation.

This process did not elicit much interest from the general public on a national level and was far too long. There was no excitement of a convention; the last minute speeches that could make or break a candidacy and no in between balloting last minute deal making for support.

Instead, a preferential ballot was used. Each voter could rank up to ten candidates (or only one). The lowest ranked candidates fall off the ballot and their choices get allotted among the remaining candidates. A candidate needs 50 per cent, plus one to become party leader.

This process also did not really generate any local excitement.

The riding association hosted fundraiser and invited all the leadership candidates. I believe that six of the fourteen attended. And while the respective candidates did hold smaller meetings in town, they were modest and low key events.

As a longtime volunteer in the Conservative party, I would suggest the following changes the next time that a party leader is chosen:

First, real, substantive debates on issues cannot be undertaken when you have fourteen candidates on the stage. You need to both make the bar higher to enter and propose incentives for the candidates to know when to exit the

This time out each candidate had to submit nomination forms signed by 300 party members from at least 30 electoral districts in at least seven different provinces and territories. This was a good idea.

Further, according to Wikipedia, each candidate had to pay a \$50,000 nonrefundable entrance fee, half of which must be paid when filing nomination with the other half due by the close of nominations on February 24, 2017.

They also had to pay an additional compliance deposit, December 31, 2016 or when filing nomination for those who register in 2017, which is refundable provided the candidate complies with campaign rules.

To me this amount of money is not enough to keep marginal candidates out of the race. I would have increased the initial amount to \$100,000 and I would have also increased the additional amount by \$150,000. I would also change the mechanism for the refundable part of the entrance fee.

As you get closer to the leadership voting date, I would have decreased the amount of refund that a candidate gets. If a candidate leaves the race in February, then he/she gets more than if they quit the race in late April. There was no such incentive in this race.

I would also make use of polls help to assist eligible voters. The party should poll party members once every two weeks from about February through to voting day and publish these results. This will help voters to focus on who can win. It will also help the candidates in both fundraising and in making a decision to drop out or who to throw their support behind.

Most importantly, I would also propose some type of hybrid process that contains the best elements of a delegated convention with a one person, one vote election system. I will lay out a detailed plan for this in my next column.

In the end, however, it is not about the voting process itself. It is about electing the best potential leader to take on Justin Trudeau and the Liberals in 2019.

#### In praise of trails and biking

Trails invite action.

Be it walking, jogging or biking, trails call us to the joy of motion, and motion in beauty, as we explore the natural wonders of Aurora that lie off-road.

Residents know this.

In Town surveys, they rank trails as one of the greatest attractions to life here, especially in a rapidly growing community. The stats show their importance. The town has about 60 km of trails and more in the works. Aurorans have in our trails a gift that keeps on giving, keeps on growing. We need to celebrate this and never take it for granted.

I love walking, running and mountain biking on our trails. Each has its own charms.

Walking is pastoral. At this slower pace, Nature rewards us with hundreds of epiphanies in spring: trilliums and lilacs in bloom; painted turtles sunning on logs in the marsh; swans on the ponds; waterfalls in Sheppard's Bush. You miss little walking, if you are fully attentive.

Running speeds things up. Here is the joy of being in Nature and being in fast gear. Breathe deep the oxygenated environment of treed trails as you motor through. Look around at the wild raspberry bushes; the Norwegian pine; the woodpeckered oak. This surely beats the streets.

Winding through the trail network, you feel your heart racing, in the delight of motion, in the rich panorama of the trails. And then there's mountain biking.

When I first took this up in Toronto I lived where there were limited off-road trails. No more. I have enjoyed every kilometre of the network in Aurora. Every trail has its own identity, and it pays to stop and pay attention when the unexpected happens. There was that pileated woodpecker just a few trees away, having lunch. Or that broad-winged hawk you saw snacking on, well, something. Or the Northern Oriole resting, a showstopper in living colour.

Biking is a celebration of motion and balance, of instinct and planning, of the spontaneous and the deliberate. The bike is an extension of the body, and of the mind. It is part of us. In fact, we can almost forget it is there when we coast down a hill. When we go along a trail there's a sense of pioneering, of a courier de bois on wheels, that is, I think, exhilarating.

Bottom line: we need our trails. And our trails need us.

Imagine Aurora without trails. Imagine only paved streets and roads. It's not a pretty picture. But we do have them, so let's use them and let's support them. They can be a natural ally as Aurora seeks to become the fittest community in Canada by 2020.

As a member of the Trails and Active Transportation Committee, I appreciate the synergy between trails and active living. And I know the value of what the Parks and Recreation staff do to ensure our trails are in good order.

#### "De-paving paradise" leads to personal growth at Aurora school

Joni Mitchell once said you don't know what you've got till it's gone, but Light of Christ Catholic Elementary School certainly did and, last week, they got out their hammers and chisels, and did something to get it back.

Over 40 members of the Light of Christ community, along with representatives from the York Catholic District School Board (YCDSB), Windfall Ecology Centre. and YorkWay Paving, gathered to depave their own personal paradise – the school yard – to make way for a healthier alternative; a healthier alternative for body, mind and soul.

Together, they pried up huge chunks of the asphalt and black top that has covered their playground for more than a quartercentury and, in time, over 450 square metres will be ripped up to "green" the school yard with new trees, gardens, and permeable surfaces.

"Most of the playground at Light of Christ was covered in pavement," says Principal Travis Macdonald. "There was actually very little space that was not paved, so we wanted to create a space that was more natural to play on. [A greener areal encourages imaginative play for kids, and that is a big thing. It also provides space for kids to engage in the

natural environment.

"By removing the black top, it will also help to decrease the temperatures out there. It will also mean shade trees. There was no shade on our school playground, so we have planted six trees as part of the program and not only will those trees help provide shade for our students, hopefully it will also attract birds and wildlife to the

Currently, log benches have been added to the playground and more amenities are hoped to be added if more grant funding becomes available. As it stands, last week's de-paving project was sponsored by significant grants from RBC Canada and an in-kind donation from YorkWay.

The support of Windfall was also integral in bringing the project to fruition.

According to Andrea Fallone, Program Manager at Windfall, "De-Pave Paradise" is an initiative of Green Communities Canada of which Windfall is a member. The mission is to remove paved surfaces to allow rain water to seep back into the ground rather than flow down into storm drains and into lakes and streams. Being able to "green" communities like Aurora in the process is also a huge plus and schools are increasingly getting on board.

"There is a lot of interest from schools within [the YCDSB] to naturalize their school yards," she says. "Students get to enjoy a more natural school yard, they get to be outdoors and actively playing on mulch, or within trees and gardens, as opposed to pavement, it helps keep the schoolyard a bit cooler, and it gives us the educational opportunity to talk with them about watershed, native plants, native trees and issues.

"These are great community events and they get the whole community, whether it is the school community or the community at large, together and engaged on protecting our local streams, creeks, rivers and lakes. It is pushing an environmental message that we want to drink clean water."

This message is not lost on the students of Light of Christ. Its Eco Team was heavily involved in spearheading the in-school de-paving program, says Mr. Macdonald, part of their ongoing efforts to "save the environment and increase recycling."

"When they were informed about this project, they felt it was wonderful because it falls into line with all the activities they have been working on this year," says Mr. Macdonald. "There was immediate buy-in and excitement for the project and the kids were on-site and it was just wonderful to see how excited they were by it."

Members of the Newmarket-Aurora Progressive Conservative Riding Association will continue their efforts this week to seek an appeal into the process which saw Charity McGrath nominated to carry the blue banner in the 2018 Provincial Election.

As first reported in The Auroran last month, the riding association filed an appeal with the Ontario PCs on April 27 and, under the rules of the party, officials had seven days to respond. The Riding Association is set to meet this Saturday and will call on the Party Executive to order the Newmarket-Aurora results be audited by Pricewaterhouse Coopers.

In a press release Tuesday, Riding Association President Derek Murray alleges there is "clear and substantial evidence indicating the campaign team for Charity McGrath Di Paola breached party blatantly rules their membership drive when members did not pay their own fees and their signature was falsified on the membership form, and fraudulent members were knowingly allowed to vote at the nomination meeting in which Charity McGrath Di Paola was declared the winning candidate.

"The riding association initiated an investigation and 100 per cent of the membership list was called."

Receiving a 22 per cent response rate, the Riding Association says 89.89 per cent of respondents had been contacted by a candidate to attend the April 8 nomination meeting, 50.17 per cent signed an application to be a party member, and 40.06 either paid or had an immediate family member pay for their membership. In all, they are challenging 358 voters on the rolls over both municipality.

This information, they say, was provided to Bob Stanley, Executive Director of the Ontario PC Party who replied the Party reviewed the submission and determined it "does not raise a question that merits a hearing."

The riding association argues the

rejection of the appeal indicates they feel "upwards to 25 per cent of [Riding Association] members potentially being forged or fraudulent is not worthy of a hearing."

"In all recent nomination races, Executive Director Bob Stanley is a consistent player," said Mr. Murray in his statement. "[PC Leader] Patrick Brown has indicated he has nothing to do with the nomination meetings. Notwithstanding the response from the Party Executive Director, we call on Patrick Brown, the Party Membership Chair, and the Party Executive to direct PricewaterhouseCooper to conduct an independent third party audit of legitimate memberships for all riding appeals and demonstrate that values of transparency and accountability are firmly in place in the Ontario PC Party.

"Ethics and accountability must start with our own party first. Only a full audit by PwC of the legality of disputed memberships can validate our parties' commitment to the principles of transparent, fair, and democratic government and the legitimacy of the nomination meeting and the resultant candidate. Our collective goal should be to decisively win the next election with the strongest candidate in each riding nominated by legitimate members and, in contrast to the current government, ensure the party stands for the highest ethical standards in keeping with the Leader's public commitment to ethics and accountability."

When asked to comment on the latest step in the appeal, Ms. McGrath said she wanted to thank "all the new members and existing members" of the riding association and called for unity.

"I'm deeply humbled and grateful to have obtained the support of the majority of the members and will continue to work very hard to get our message out to the voters in Newmarket Aurora," said Ms. McGrath. "I want to thank all those who volunteered to help my nomination campaign and those who purchase a membership to support my candidacy. I also want to thank Continued on page 11

#### Church redevelopment clears Public Planning hurdle

Plans for the redevelopment of Aurora United Church and adjacent retirement centre cleared another hurdle last week, receiving unanimous consent from Council members at Wednesday night's Public Planning meeting.

With this tentative approval, developers and concerned neighbours will likely have until July 4 to continue working together to hammer out remaining differences.

Following last week's Public Planning meeting, the redevelopment of the site, which includes a now-seven storey retirement complex, will next come before elected officials at a General Committee meeting, followed by a Council meeting to

ratify that decision.

Marco Ramunno, Aurora's Director of Planning, told lawmakers and residents alike that his final report could come before Council by the end of June but would most likely take until the July 4 cycle to be complete.

In the meantime, Councillors told a packed house they hoped the intervening weeks will allow the two disputing parties to address remaining differences – particularly building height, tiering and massing from Tyler and Temperance Streets – before the next meeting.

"All of us on Council are hopeful that we can move forward with this application in a way that satisfies the congregation of the United Church and local residents and we can move forward," said Councillor Michael Thompson. "Aurora is a town of good neighbours and I think we would all like to continue forward."

Added Councillor Paul Pirri: "Collaboration isn't always a quick, tidy, easy thing to do. Sometimes it takes work and sometimes there are concessions made on all sides. Keep moving forward and keep working together and I am sure by the end of it we will have something there we are all proud of. The second you stop thinking about our neighbours as neighbours is when we get into trouble."

At the start of last week's meeting it became clear the proposal now before Council was a markedly different one.

Speaking on behalf of the proponents, planner Sarah Millar said a "substantial" amount of work had been done to modify the plan since March. Height, she conceded, was an issue with many community members, as were massing and setbacks from the side streets. Nevertheless, Amica was able to rework their retirement home plans to come down two storeys and reconfigure the space to accommodate 152 units rather than the initially proposed 159 units.

Parking issues brought up from residents had been largely resolved, as had redesigning the back end of the building to be more in keeping with the adjacent residential neighbourhood.

Nevertheless, Council members said they understood many of the residents' remaining concerns but said they had a fine line to walk.

"I will always support any application if the concerns of the residents are met," said Councillor John Abel. "That is what tears it with me. The developers know how to talk to staff and we make decisions, but we have to make decisions based on what the residents are telling us. It is loud and clear the residents on Tyler and Temperance and surrounding areas have an issue with the massing, specifically on the back part. I hear that loud and clear.

"It was a tremendous loss but often out of the ashes there is an opportunity and now we can rebuild and put a sustainable entity and the outreach they provide can continue and it will be a model that sustains for many, many years. This is a great model moving forward. It is a responsible model."

In any redevelopment, he said, there has to be a benefit to the wider community and providing these residential units for seniors is a benefit.

Councillor Tom Mrakas was another Council member who said the potential benefits from the development needed to be weighted in the process.

"We are elected to represent all of the residents of this Town and the Town as a whole," he said. "When we look at planning and applications, we look at it from a high level view of what is good for the Town as a whole. This vision has been going on since 2010 when the

Aurora Promenade Plan was developed and it was to intensify the Yonge Street Corridor. That is what we are doing. It is also helping with the growing population of our seniors [and] we're desperately going to need extra housing and that is what helps out with this.


"I have always stated that if there is not a benefit to the community as a whole then we don't move forward with an amendment. As we look forward I see many benefits in this application. I see that the proponent has listened to the concerns, have made substantial changes, they have dropped two floors, have done some extra tiering. I would like to see a little bit more tiering but I think when we get to that general committee meeting we can still work on a few things. We're very close but I think we need to keep moving forward and we have an obligation to make a decision tonight. While it is not a final decision we need to make a decision moving forward."

Councillor Jeff Thom had a similar perspective, outlining the benefits to the community and also the hope that there is a way to move forward this summer "in a way that satisfies the congregation of the United Church and local residents." Aurora, he said, is a "town of good neighbours" and that should be the order of the day.

Listening to the comments of her peers, Councillor Wendy Gaertner said she was "proud" to be part of a Council that articulates the values of residents, but said, from her perspective of the longestserving incumbent Council member, that this planning application was one of the most "difficult" she has seen yet.

"Usually we have residents on one side and a developer on the other. In this case, we have residents in the neighbourhood and we have residents who also are part of the developer's plan because they are part of the church community," she said, joking that, as a Libran, she wanted to please everybody. "I am going to look at it from a planning perspective. We have an OP (Official Plan) and part of that OP is our Promaenade plan and that is a vision for Yonge Street. In this case, it is the historic part of Yonge Street. Then we have the respect in our official plan for Stable Neighbourhoods and for transition so that stable neighbourhoods are protected. For both of these, the height and the massing and the setbacks are not what is required.

"I know that everybody has worked very hard to come up with a plan that is so much better and so many of us have said so much closer and thank you and thank you to the residents who have worked so hard as well. Hopefully when we come back to our general committee meeting there will have been a little bit more progress made so I can say we have been able to support the needs of our residents and a wonderful and contributing church community."

#### Neighbours still at odds over Aurora United Church plans

Councillors last week said they hoped neighbours could come together to build a consensus over Aurora United Church's redevelopment plans before they render a final decision this summer - but, as far as bridges go, there is still a wide gap to cover.

Crowds filled Council chambers last Wednesday night for the final public planning meeting on the proposed redevelopment of Aurora United Church and its associated seven-storey, 152 unit Amica retirement home.

The assembled audience represented all views on the issue-from neighbours worried the new retirement home building will set a terrible development precedent in their largely Victorian neighbourhood, neighbours wanted to see some downtown revitalization, and, still, neighbours who just want a place of worship to once again call their own.

Nearly 20 residents came to the podium last week to make their appeals to Council. These appeals ranged from tweaks to - our outright rejection of - the rebuild plans, to just getting on with it, to considering the benefits to the larger community from both perspectives.

One such neighbour urging a significant re-think on the development plans was Tanya Pietrangelo, who said the developers simply had not done enough to change the plan to fit in with the area - "our charming community full of character."

"Our homes will suffer if this development proceeds as is," she said. "My current house value will diminish. Who will pay for that difference? And I am not the only one. How would you feel if a large seven storey building was going to be built right beside your house or right in front of your front door? Or just a few doors down from the house you wanted to call home for the next 60 year and invested all of your savings in? I have spoken to so many of our neighbours on Tyler, Temperance, George, Mosley, Mill, etc., and they all share the same sentiments as I do.

"This has nothing to do with the church or the church plan itself. We support the church in its endeavours to rebuilt, but it is the proposed retirement building plan as is that is not good enough. It is obtrusive. It does not fit in and it doesn't add value to our residential community."

More needs to be done to set back the building from Temperance and Tyler to be more in keeping with the existing homes and, ideally, should not be more than three-storeys high in keeping with what is already in the neighbourhood. She said she understood that it might not be feasible with the developer with whom the church is partnered, but said no more than five stories should be allowed.

"Over 200 of our neighbours signed a petition that voiced their concerns about the scale and size of the building and the issue of adequate parking and increased traffic. Please listen to your residents," she said. "How many neighbours that already feel so defeated? They feel that the Town doesn't care about them. How shameful when residents who pay their taxes and contribute to the community are made to feel this way. Listen to your residents and make the developer come back with a better plan that fits with our homes

and our community."

Among those in the opposite corner was Brian Elliott. Although a resident of Newmarket, Mr. Elliott said he has been a member of the Aurora United Church congregation for nearly three decades, drawn to the church because of the wide array of activities it offered and community programs it facilitated, from Inn From The Cold to Alcoholics Anonymous.

Approving the plan would ensure the "Angel of Yonge Street" rises once again in Aurora.

"While of course the building is gone, our spirit continues to thrive. We need help to help us create a new home," he said. "We want to make the church and its facility a centre for the community in addition to it being the church home. To do this, and ensure a legacy, we need funds to make this happen. Unfortunately, even with our insurance settlement, we needed help and we sought out a quality development partner for a joint proposal where we would retain the ownership of the land.

"Contemplate that if this proposal doesn't succeed, what happens? I take a very logical view of things. There seem to be two alternatives. One is to move to a much less costly building and a site, perhaps outside

of Aurora's boundaries. There is not a lot of affordable land in Aurora. For us, this is not what we would want to happen. We are an urban church on Yonge Street and we would like to get back to our mission on Yonge Street. The second alternative is to merge with an existing church with existing facilities, possibly outside of Aurora's boundaries. Again, this is not what we want. The congregation is dedicated to Aurora."

There were many additional reasons to go ahead with the plan, he offered. One was to replace a lost building and all the community resources it provides, thus taking pressure off municipal resources to fill the gaps, providing quality retirement spaces for a growing seniors' population, the employment opportunities that come along with it, and meeting intensification targets.



#### Local author offers "fifty shades of green" with sci-fi adventures

Inspiration can strike people in the strangest places, and at the strangest times. For Aurora resident Brian Horeck, the commonplace sighting of a few water bugs doing the backstroke in a minnow trap started turning the gears on an unlikely career path.

Now, the Sudbury native, who once saw high school English as the enemy, is a best-selling sci-fi author and will be bringing his Northern Ontario stories to a hometown crowd at this Sunday's annual Aurora Chamber Street Festival.

"They look like aliens," was one of Horeck's first thoughts when he cleaned out that fateful minnow trap but, as the creative mind went to work, he pondered, "What if they actually were?"


His first novel, "Minnow Trap", focuses on a Northern Ontario summer where three long-time fishing buddies stumble onto some strange happenings – and critters – at one of their favourite haunts. Soon, they are in a nightmare not only with extra-terrestrial life, but international intrigue.

"English being my worst subject, I hand wrote my chapters and went to the computer to try typing, which I had to try with just one finger," he laughs. "I went to my late wife, who I lost just as I finished writing the book, and I got the book out with her help."

With his first book typed up and ready to go, he set about on a rather unconventional marketing campaign, self-publishing the book and advertising it on billboards scattered along the Ontario stretch of the Trans-Canada Highway. Giving away little more than "Minnow Trap" was coming, it got people pondering just what "Minnow Trap" was.

Soon, Horeck found out that it is a little bit harder than he anticipated to get word out on a self-published novel, but he was confident they would sell, a confidence bolstered by his sure knowledge he had a good story behind him.

"The hardest part is convincing he said, adding he's always looking for



yourself that you have a product," he says. "You have to make a first impression and you only have one chance. I know I am not the best writer and I had that going against me, but I had to get sales up there. I did my best with a run of 3,000 copies. I got them out there and I couldn't believe how they were selling!"

Even at that point, Horeck didn't necessarily see himself as an author and gave little thought to writing a second book but after "Minnow Trap" got out there, he heard from readers wanting more. Before coming up with a sequel to his debut novel, he published "Frozen Beneath," a second novel set in Northern Ontario exploring a meteorite crash.

Only, it's not a meteorite crash. A spacecraft has taken a nosedive into a frozen lake, a craft carrying space tourists. Naturally, chaos ensues when hunters Kevin and John delve deeper into just what is sitting at the bottom of the lake.

"I know the books before I write them,"

authenticity. "I went ice fishing and watched for everything my friends said or did to pick up stuff, whether they accidently lost the slush scoop through the ice trying to clean the hole up, or dropped their cell phone down. I want people to relate to it and think, 'I feel like I am out there with my buddies.' I wat to relate to people and be real in what is happening. I see tens of thousands of vehicles going up the 400 with ATVs, snowmobiles and boats behind them and they just want to get up to God's country just to relax, fish, hike and I want to write to them."

For example, once up in God's country, he happened to be in a store and overheard one of the locals refer to urbanites as "Citiots," That, of course, made it into the book – only now they are a target audience!

"I read everything now, even romance to get some ideas," he says. "With Minnow Trap 2, I am getting a bit of feedback that it is '50 Shades of Green' with a little something going on there with an alien who is in human form and rather appealing to the men. Now, my Grade 10 English teacher showed up at a book signing at Chapters in Sudbury and she said she had to make sure she saw me in person, saying that the Brian she knew never even read a book let alone wrote a book. She couldn't believe it, so vou just never know!

"I felt I was the only person to tell that story."



#### York Regional Police run for Special Olympics in memory of detective

The York Regional Police are ensuring one of their own's passion for the Special Olympics lives on forever.

Rob Plunkett, a strong ambassador for the Special Olympics in life, lives on in death through the annual Race for Plunkett, held Wednesday at Riverwalk Commons in Newmarket.

"Rob Plunkett's passion for Special Olympics, and his leadership, has always motivated members of our police service and the community to get involved," said Thomas Carrique, York Regional Police deputy chief. "This event is a testament to Rob's legacy, as both a person and a police officer."

Though the torch run by law enforcement was celebrating its thirtieth anniversary this year, it was the ninth to be named in honour of Plunkett, who served as chair of the 2000 Special Olympics Spring Games in York Region.

Plunkett was the victim of a botched car theft in August of 2007. After his death, two other York Region officers stepped in to take on his role as the coordinator of the torch run, which now accepts citizens outside of law enforcement and draws hundreds of participants each year.

A gold medalist at the Canadian Police Olympics and the "Toughest Cop Alive" contest, his love for sports fueled his passion to get as many people as possible into the game.

"Rob was committed to helping people be the best that they could be," said Carrique. "He is really a shining example for all of us."

The event, which begins in the Commons and follows routes of both five and ten-kilometres, raised over \$30,000, all of which goes to the Special Olympics program.

Over the past three years, the event alone has raised over \$90,000 for Special Olympics.

Barbs have struggled defensively so far, giving up 94 points, the most allowed in Rugby Ontario's most elite competition.



#### Next phase of Library Square development approved

The future of Library Square took another inch forward last week as Council gave the green light to beginning design options on just what might replace the former homes of the Aurora Public Library and Seniors' Centre on Victoria Street.

Firm in their vision of a public gathering space of some sort, Council formally approved the demolition of the two buildings and putting out a new Request for Proposal for a company to bring this vision – and the vision of the community to life.

While it is not the big leap forward some neighbours might have been hoping for, Council members insisted that this "baby step" was closer than Aurora has ever come to resolving the nearly 20year debate on what to do with the old buildings.

"We have heard from our community, we have heard from our community partners, and we have heard from all of our boards," said Councillor Tom Mrakas. "We are moving forward as we all want to, and as the community wants to. Last June we made a decision to demolish two buildings, we have already made that decision, we're moving forward with putting out the tender in having someone do the demolition for us. We're also putting out the tender to have someone do those detailed designs. We haven't done that.

"We have had some high view concepts." That's what we've done and now we're looking for those detailed designs. I am excited just as everyone else is to get this done and finally move forward and have something special in that area."

Councillor Mrakas was responding to Councillor John Abel's observation that with last Tuesday's vote they are essentially back to 2013, but other members said they disagreed.

"While I understand where Councillor Abel is coming from in starting at square one, we're actually starting right now after doing some much needed research on repurposing old buildings in our community. It has been up in the air for a very long time," said Councillor Sandra Humfryes. "We have been able to do lots

of public information sessions where the public were able to engage and give input on both of those options. I think we have officially conducted those surveys and those consultations officially for repurposing and that is what the biggest difference is.

"There are lots of different ideas and lots of different perspectives and we just wanted to make sure that this term we were actually able to get here. At this point there is no way but forward full force."

This was a view shared by Councillor Michael Thompson who called the process to get to this point a "challenging one" that has been addressed "umpteen times" for almost 20 years, garnering "dozens and dozens of staff reports. While he said Councillor Abel is right that this was talked about in 2013, it was also discussed in reports and talks dating back to 2003.

"From my perspective, I think this Council is closer than anyone has ever gotten in turning Library Square from a concept into a reality," he said. "I don't necessarily see us starting over. It has been a struggle, it has been baby steps, but sometimes it is two steps forward and one step back but I think we have all seen the progress and I am optimistic that we continue to drive this forward and hopefully see it come to fruition in this term."

Councillor Paul Pirri's From perspective, Council was not back at the starting post but making an informed decision after two years of consultation on the Cultural Precinct Plan.

"Politicians often get in trouble when they make evidence-based decisionmaking but go down the path of decisionbased evidence-making," he said.

Looking over the history it has taken to get to this point, Councillor Wendy Gaertner says it is a matter that has been tackled by five Councils now and, so far, it has proven to be a "very difficult decision to make." Aurora has done a lot of public consultation, she said, and now the Town is on the right track.

"I am very sorry about the demolition of the Old Library, which was our Centennial gift to ourselves and I am opposed to demolishing it before we

of community consultation, lots of lots know what we're going to be doing as others, which means we're probably with the property, but it is the will of the majority of Council and I do congratulate this Council on taking what I believe is one step forward as well." Added Mayor Geoff Dawe: "I do believe we're moving forward, perhaps faster than some might like, and not as quickly

free of contention, ultimately coming down to a 7 - 2 vote, with Aurora's two youngest Councillors - Paul Pirri and Jeff Thom - being the loudest champions of traditional paper ballots.

The irony was not lost on other members of Council who championed electronic voting not only as the way of the future, but also as a way of opening the vote up to more people, whether

to a polling station or simply don't have time to make it before or after the daily commute.

They were nevertheless firm in their convictions.

Speaking against recommendation, Councillor Thom cited a number of studies from British Columbia to the City of Toronto, to Australia recommending against internet voting to 2013. Despite the expansive staff report on different voting options pursued by other towns and cities, it did not address why places like Waterloo, Whitby and Guelph have either moved away from, or rejected, internet voting.

He also referenced recent security hacks, including one at Disney, as being a cause for concern when it comes to the safety of the vote.

"We all want everyone to be able to exercise their constitutional right to vote and I think is very sacred but we have to make very sure that we have

they are physically unable to make it the safest method possible to conduct our elections and we owe that to the residents," said Councillor Thom. "If one day every four years the people of Aurora have to put it in their calendar and say I am going to make efforts to I believe that anything that can vote – I agree that it would be better for inclusivity for people with accessibility issues but I think the risks associated with internet voting don't outweigh the benefits. The status quo is fine to me."

voting method is 100 per cent risk-free. While a hybrid voting system might be more expensive at first than either paper-only or internet-only methods. there are significant benefits in the end.

"There is no such thing as a perfect election," he said. "Unexpected issues always arise and staff are forced to think quickly about how to solve problems. These issues could manifest themselves in situations like temporary election staff not reporting on election day, a power outage, or any number of other hitches. Likewise, staff also accept that there is an inherent risk with any method of alternative voting. Our commitment to Council is to prepare as thoroughly as we can for the method of Council's choosing.

"Does the status quo of a paper ballot counted by vote tabulators create a problem? Staff's response would be no, as this is a proven model in this municipality to elect representatives. However, the addition of internet voting does enhance the democratic process for the residents of Aurora. By providing voters an additional option from the traditional paper ballot, the election becomes much more inclusive to the whole population of Aurora."

Ultimately, this was a deciding factor for Councillors like Wendy Gaertner who were not altogether enthusiastic about an internet model.

"I am going to vote for this because contribute to accessibility is the right way to go for this Council, so I will be in favour," she said. "I am not happy about it, but there it is!"

Others, however, were more fulsome in their support, including Mayor Geoff Dawe, who was in favour of internet voting at the outset.

For Councillor Michael Thompson, convenience was just one deciding factor with accessibility the other.

Some, he said, find it a challenge to get out to vote, particularly those with mobility issues and the cost of getting to the polling station could be an additional barrier to exercising their democratic rights.

"This option allows all a better opportunity to get out and vote," he said. "They may not exercise it, it might not approve numbers as some Councillors have alluded to, but it does create a more equal playing field and allows people the opportunity to vote who may have had challenges getting out in the past.

"I don't believe that internet voting in any way elevates the risk to the Town. We conduct a lot of online business. If someone wants to attack the Town through malware or a cyber security attack, having online voting or not will not increase or elevate our exposure level."

Added Councillor Joh Abel: "We pay our taxes online, we should be able to vote online. This is where we're going. We're going to be online and using technology. This is where we're going with our lifestyle. I would be in favour of going hybrid. The safeguards will be in place."

With a hybrid model in place, staff will be gauging its success next year. If the success is resounding, the Clerk noted there is a possibility there could be a further push to move towards 100 per cent electronic voting by the time of the 2022 municipal election.






