World Youth Day Cross here in June

Aurora residents will have the opportunity to witness a major event in June when the World Youth Day Cross comes to town.

In preparation for the occasion, local schools and parishes are organizing a procession through Aurora when the cross arrives.

The processional will include approximately 200 students, families and teachers who will carry the cross

They will start their journey from Cardinal Carter Catholic High School and end at Our Lady of Grace Church.

Patrick McConvey and Frank Pignataro attended the last council meeting to explain the event and seek council support.

The cross will arrive in Aurora the afternoon of June 11th.

the school, the procession will leave around 2:30 p.m. for the pilgrimage to the church.

McConvey and Pignataro asked that the two northbound lanes on Yonge Street be closed to vehicular traffic during the procession.

Reconstruction of Jasper Drive, Dunham Crescent, Sunray Place and Cabot Court begins this summer. The project includes complete reconstruction of the four roads, addition of curbs and storm sewers, new watermains and a sidewalk on one side of Jasper.

Fourteen firms responded to the tender call with bids ranging from a low of \$914,395.63 to a high of \$1,278,889.94. Council endorsed the staff recommendation that the contract be awarded to the low bidder, Direct Underground Inc.

engage a lawyer to fight the smoking issue under the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms.

According to the committee report, a survey of York Region residents indicated that 87 per cent supported the smoke-free bylaw in restaurants, 72 per cent in bars, and 75 per cent in bingo halls.

A majority of residents and businesses surveyed support the bylaw and a majority of those surveyed have not adjusted the frequency with which they visit restaurants, bars and bingo halls.

The report states there is no evidence that the implementation of Phase II has adversely affected the regional economy from the consumer's perspective.

The same evidence also suggests the region should stay the course with its planned implementation of the bylaw to protect residents from the effects of second-hand smoke.

The committee report was presented to the March 28 meeting of regional council.

Markham Regional Councillor Frank Scarpitti pointed out that charities were losing funds due to the bylaw and its impact on bingo halls.

He also noted it was not a level playing field as Toronto bingo halls had 50 per cent non-smoking, whereas it was 75 per cent in the region.

He recommended the regional bylaw be amended to provide for 50 per cent smoking, as in Toronto, and that was adopted on a 9-8 vote.

The bylaw will be introduced at the next council meeting.

Staff replied that the works department was also concerned about the access point and that a traffic study may be required.

Staff was directed to complete the required official plan amendment and present it to the next meeting of council for adoption.

It brought the expected reply: "You're too late!"


Wallace presented each member of council with the traditional clown nose.

Automobile is king in GTA

We have a love affair with the car,
To fulfil our transportation needs;
But urban sprawl is rampant,
Which causes public transit to bleed.
-Poor Richard's Scrapbook

What comes first, the chicken or the egg? The same question might well be asked about urban sprawl. What comes first, planning or transportation?

It's quite obvious in Aurora and the Greater Toronto Area with urban sprawl eating up agricultural land subdivision after subdivision, the automobile is king. Public transit is thought about long after the homes have been built.

A large part of the GTA's population lives in suburbs and they're the ones who spend their time stuck in traffic as they try to commute to their place of employment.

To respond to the resultant gridlock, the road network is expanded and expanded, which encourages more and more cars to enter the fray and add to the problem. The answer is rapid and efficient public transit, at a price commuters can afford.

The only way this may be accomplished is to plan the public transit system before plans of subdivision are approved and residential units constructed Public transit must become an essential component of the official plan process.

There is no way that adequate and reasonable public transit can be provided if the only revenue received is from the property tax and the fare box.

Both the provincial and federal governments receive considerable funding from gasoline taxes, but none of it is returned to the municipalities for transit. There is no other state or province that does not provide some capital assistance

Not only that but the province downloaded several provincial highways to local governments claiming that they served local rather than provincial traffic.

This has added an extra financial burden on local government but the province still retains the fuel and licence revenue. The highways were downloaded but not the revenue.

Urban sprawl is the result of public policy. Sprawl is direct result of accommodating the desires of developers and people's love affair with the car.

The situation is made worse when councils cave in to the demands of developers for higher density, smaller lots and narrower roadways, as was done in Aurora's Bayview/Wellington subdivision and other areas.

GO Transit is doing an excellent job in moving people and getting them off the roads at peak periods.

What is needed is a national program of subsidy for regional public transit systems for inter-regional commuting and local transit systems to deliver the commuters to meet the regional system.

Available rapid transit can move more people cheaper, with less pollution, and much faster than an armada of cars, each with only one person in it. The answer is so obvious, why it is just a dream, not a reality?

Sorority played active role in town centennial

To the editor,

Four years before Canada celebrated the nation's centennial, the Town of Aurora staged a big birthday bash to mark 100 years since the proclamation of Aurora as a village.

It was a grand party which included "something new every day as the town comes alive to its history", as proclaimed effusively in a press clipping.

The village population of about 700 in 1863 had grown to a mighty 10,000 by July 4, 1963.

The first chapter of Beta Sigma Phi Sorority had been formed just one year before than centennial party, and the members prepared and entered a float in the big parade (see the photo above).

It was one of 73 floats, and along with about two dozen antique and classic cars, and even a bicycle built for two, it played to an estimated crowd of between 15,000 and 20,000 people as the parade meandered south of Yonge Street.

There was a town band at that time in Aurora, and they gave special performances during the week-long celebration of events.

As the town continued to grow, so, too, did the Beta Sigma Phi chapters.

Although the organization is essentially a social and cultural group, thee has always been a keen interest in being involved with local community issues.

And fund-raising activity continues to successfully fuel the coffers so that important community projects can be pursued.

There are currently six active chapters with approximately 100 members.

Their assistance was critical to the success recently of fund-raising during the Christmas gift wrapping, a portion of which was dedi-

cated to the hospital building fund.

Daffodil Days, staged to benefit the Canadian Cancer Society, is another project which members of Beta Sigma Phi support.

Under the direction of Mary Gibson, of the Alpha Omicron Master chapter, members will be on hand at a number of public locations early in April to continue to provide assistance to

this worthwhile cause. Now, about that photo

Mayor's Report By Tim Jones

Growth is inevitable

Lately I have read letters to the editor and columns on growth and the related costs attributed to the expansion of our Town, both residentially and industrial/commercially.

On the surface, most would like to see no more growth.

After all, isn't it growth that is choking our roadways, causing additional costs to existing taxpayers to cover the amenities that the Province tells us we can no longer demand from the same growth itself?

Isn't it growth that is shrinking the environmentally significant areas that we used to have as views from our kitchen window?

If it was only as easy as implied in recent growth condemnation letters to the editor!

How easy it is to condemn Council for growth as if Council could simply say "NO" and shut the gate!

The simple truth of the matter is that no Council in the province can simply close the gate to growth.

Our fate was cast years ago when the York Durham sewer system was created from Toronto through to Newmarket.

Referred to as the "inverted T", this system serves today's Toronto east to west as the top of the "T" and up through Richmond Hill, Aurora and Newmarket as the bottom of the "T".

The province approved this servicing with the full intent to encourage growth where these services could be applied and used, and that includes Aurora.

To supplement this, major highways also run North/South like the 400 and the 404.

Basic planning principles dictate that you should grow close to where the major water, sewer and transportation services are available as opposed to outside this area, or sprawl, as some would describe.

The Province also regulates each municipality to have a quantity of lots ready to go for servicing and developing at any given time.

For Aurora, this translates to needing to have at least 1,200 residential units ready to go and at least 4,000 units 'waiting' in the wings.

These numbers are currently under review as part of our five-year review of the Town's Official Plan.

The exercise for Councils and staff in municipalities, based on servicing and available lots, is to manage and control those lots among those who own the lands in our towns.

We do that through Official Plans and Growth Management Strategies that map out which lands get priority to available servicing.

These are completed years before they are realized. We try to do that in an organized and rational way, from growing from our core out to our boundaries and not just anywhere there is pressure.

We do that through a fully public, participative process, so every resident has an opportunity to have

his say.

Council is about to embark on an Official Plan review with a committee comprised of residents, staff and con-

sultants.

This process will be open to all residents of Aurora

for input.

Occasionally we are pressured by developers to jump ahead of our plans or deviate in density or design.

When pushed, we have either vigorously defended our policies at the OMB or tried to negotiate out of OMB situations, for, as we have found, if we lose at the OMB, we risk losing more control than we would otherwise have had.

By planning proactively for growth, we are better able to defend the Town's moderate growth philosophy. Growth yesterday and today has not and does not pay for itself.

But it does provide housing for business and industry which we also want to attract to our town.

For services and amenities connected with growth, it is up to Council to look to better ways to meet demands and set priorities.

This is where I believe partnerships, public and private can have a role to play.

This is also where service mergers in areas such as transit, fire, and investigation into other areas like water, sewer and garbage may play a significant role.

Compared with most, Aurora has managed its growth well, and that is evident in the defensible positions we have held at the OMB when we have been forced to protect our interests.

In one of his latest Bouquets & Brickbats, he states he would give a bouquet to the councillor who would demand the pictures of former reeves and mayors return to the proper place outside the council chambers.

What made you change your mind, Mr. Illingworth?

Only last year I heard you say how happy you were your idea of removing these pictures and replacing them with the town's permanent art collection was finally carried out.

This collection is known as "Preserve Aurora".

Mr. Illingworth continues, stating only 20 per cent of SOYRA members are Aurora residents and taxpayers.

Therefore the town's permanent art collection should be hanging on the second floor, currently occupied by a display put up by SOYRA members. The display rotates every four months. In other words, get SOYRA out of there

Mr. Illingworth, SOYRA represents York Region artists. Aurora is a big part of this region, not quite 20 per cent, I think.

The society is a promoter for the arts and promotes where it can and where it is allowed and accepted in the region.

They have a similar display in the Town Hall in Sharon, an annual art show is held in the York Regional Building in Newmarket, they work with the York

Region Board of Education through the new art program Art Links with displays in the York Region Board of Education building on Wellington Street in Aurora and this year also on the third floor in Aurora's Town Hall.

SOYRA members were asked to participate in the Art Festival during the Aurora Fair and have done so for the last two years.

This year Aurora Chamber of Commerce sent invitations to SOYRA members to set up booths in front of the new library during the World's Longest Street Festival, here in Aurora.

And SOYRA is going to be there.

The Art Aurora Show in the Town Hall in Aurora is a yearly event put on by the Town of Aurora.

This event requires a lot of volunteers to set up the easels, hang the paintings, have people on three floors to overlook the show, deal with inquiries and sales and numerous other things.

SOYRA members volunteer their time for these

And you are wrong, Mr. Illingworth, when you say only 20 per cent of SOYRA members are Aurora tax-

Those members who do not live in Aurora do volunteer their time in Aurora and through their volunteer work they bring people to Aurora, where they also spend money in gas stations, in art supply stores, in food outlets.

During the SOYRA show last year in Newmarket there was an advertising program in which several Aurora businesses were promoted.

Mr. Illingworth, I would like to ask you, why are you giving your readers a false image of what SOYRA is all about?

In your Poor Richard column you say it was SOYRA who made the decision to remain at the Town Hall with the Art Aurora Show.

You know darn well that should the Town of Aurora decide this show was going to take place in a barn somewhere in the sticks, the show would take place somewhere in a barn in the sticks, because SOYRA does not decide nor does it have any power to make any decisions regarding Art Aurora.

SOYRA does make recommendations and you are bright enough to know the differences between a decision and a recommendation.

And you also know why SOYRA made that recommendation.

The Town Hall has far more space to put on a proper display of art work.

You can put up about 250 pieces and give the public enough room to wander without bumping into someone or something.

The new library just does not have this room.

SOYRA has given financial support for renovating the Skylight Gallery in the Aurora Town Hall.

on SOYRA. It is my intention to counter negative comments by Mr. Illingworth about SOYRA.

Speaker's a step closer to world championship

Jane Eves, a human resources consultant by profession and President of The Towns of York Toastmasters of Aurora, is one step closer to being crowned The World Champion of Public Speaking.

Jane's captivating stories about how she met the man of her dreams, and the courage of a young boy with leukemia were the vehicles she used to advance in the competitions.

Her warmth and gentle humour persuaded the judges to award her the Toastmasters Northern Division Championship last week in Penetanguishene.

(The contest, originally slated to be held in Orillia, was moved due to the

OPSEU Strike.

Having defeated a slate of contestants from across Northern Ontario, Eves has earned the right to advance to the District 60 contest to be held at the Toastmasters Spring Convention April 20 at the Delta Toronto East Hotel.

That competition will draw speakers from across Ontario.

A win at the district contest earns her the right to advance to the regional and finally the world contests.

As she was awarded her prize, Jane thanked her club for the support and feedback she received during the competitions.

The Towns of York club has captured the Northern Division title seven of the last nine years.

It has also sent member Ross Mackay to the world contest in 1995 where he placed third, and Ray Pons to the regional level in 1999 and 1997 where he took second place both years.

The Towns of York Toastmasters has been an Aurora institution since 1969, and is part of the world wide non-profit educational organization Toastmasters International.

Markham suggestion may control speeders

The Town of Markham is seeking a solution to problems caused by speeding on local roads and has asked Aurora council for support.

Markham is asking the provincial government to double fines for speeding on local roads and to amend the Highway Traffic Act to permit the region to delegate responsibility for enforcement of speeding on local roads to local municipalities, if they so request.

The resolution also seeks an amendment to the Provincial Offences Act to include speeding and stop sign violations in the list of infractions which could be enforced by a local bylaw officer within municipalities which have assumed the responsibility.

Councillor David Griffith said it was the best recommendation he had ever seen, and as the police were not providing adequate speed control coverage, the use of bylaw enforcement officers would assist in bringing speeders under control.

When questions were asked about the need to hire additional staff, Griffith was successful in gaining council support to have staff review the proposal and report within 30 days.

Dearly Departed rehearsals start

It's a black comedy centred around the death of Ben Turpin, and focuses on what kind of a funeral to have.

"R.K" was an educator to remember

With all the controversial news and the on-going battles between the Tory government and teachers, such as the need for teacher training and re-certification, it appears the government has no trust in today's teachers.

Over the years, there have been many excellent teachers who go out of their way for their students.

One such teacher was R.K. Smith, a history teacher at Dr. G. W. Williams Secondary School. He wasn't a text book teacher and he went to great lengths to prove it.

"R.K.", as an exuberant history teacher, believed young people could get excited about history and other studies if they learned through experience or pictures rather than a lot of stodgy textbook memory work.

He got the opportunity to prove his theory in 1965 when he acted as coordinator for Ship's School, a non-profit organization devoted to student travel and study. Over the years he led hundreds of students from the Aurora area through several countries.

In 1969 he talked Aurora council into supporting a student council for his Grade 10 history class.

Town staff assisted in the students' nomination meeting and election. Following the election, they sat with their counterparts on Aurora council for two meetings and then held their own council meeting to which parents and members of council were invited.

Mayor Stephen Ostick ran a strict meeting as his members of council had picked up some of the faults of Aurora councillors.

They came up with some original suggestions for the town, including the appointment of a Citizen of the Year, which Aurora council adopted for 1970.

When R.K. was transferred to another school, council couldn't find another teacher to pick up the challenge of organizing a student council.

Another Dr. G. W. Williams Secondary School teacher to be remembered was opinionated science teacher Mel Woods

He stood an imposing six feet, five inches and in his 40 years of teaching estimates he taught 12,000 students before retiring in 1978. He taught students to think for themselves.

Before coming to Williams he taught at an RCAF school in Hamilton in 1941 as an instructor to provide prospective aircrew the basics of a high school education in 90 days. One of his students was Aurora's Dick Illingworth.

WAR MEMORIAL DEFACED

It's hard to believe but in November, 1997, vandals defaced the "Aurora War Memorial Peace Park" sign at the magnificent Cenotaph with Neo-Nazi and racist graffiti.

Aurora work crews were able to remove the graffiti from the sign, but a few months later grease swastikas had to be erased from the Altar of Sacrifice, which is located in front of the monument and honours the men and women of the Second World War who made the supreme sacrifice.

A young Aurora woman, Amanda Pandolfi, claims she advised the town's parks department but nothing was done. Her father then told officials at the Aurora Legion, but the graffiti remained.

Finally after public and media pressure action was taken and the graffiti was removed. But this wasn't the first time vandals hit the Cenotaph. A few years ago the Legion spent

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Aurora Sd. Road 2.8 km's west of Hwy 400 \$8,500 to remove swastikas from the Cenotaph.

With the bright lights on busy Yonge Street, it's strange nobody saw the vandals at work.

COURT FIGHT

It was also in November, 1997, when Aurora parent Doug Clark sued the Ontario Secondary School Teachers Federation for \$11.45, representing one day's worth of education taxes he felt he lost the first day of the province-wide strike.

Federation officials tried to talk him out of his action in the Small Claims Court and threatened him with the Federation's legal costs if he should lose the lawsuit.

Clark decided to proceed and the Federation failed to file a statement of defence within the 20-day period, so Clark filed to have the Federation declared in default, and a court date was set for January 7, 1998.

He claimed the Federation encouraged the teachers to break the law.



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


