A look at Aurora's first half of 2002

The year 2002 will go down in Aurora history as a year of growth and change, of increased taxes, crowded roadways, stop signs, fear of the Ontario Municipal Board and turbulence and conflict on

In January council was scrambling to reduce the 2002 tax bill. The first draft indicated a 19.8 per cent increase, which was reduced to 12 per cent with hopes of making the final draft still lower.

Later in the month it was reduced to an increase of 8.8 per cent or about \$69 on the average home, plus an estimated \$35 increase for

It was found that stop signs went up on Kennedy Street during reconstruction without an enacting bylaw, and residents objected to their removal.

The licencing for public garages was put on hold, as was the proposed development for a fivestorey building at Tyler and Yonge

Aurora lost one of its most

respected citizens, retired Deputy Fire Chief Fred Bolsby who died at the age of 64.

Friends of the late former Councillor Bob Hartwell started planning the Bob Hartwell Memorial Runners Challenge to raise funds for the Children's Safety Village.

One of the major issues facing council in February was the future of local hydro with the provincial proposal to deregulate both Ontario Hydro and local utilities.

The final report was received on construction of the new library at a total cost of \$11 million including \$2 million for land.

The multi-stop at Kennedy and George Streets was still controversial and stop signs left up for a sixmonth trial Growth in Aurora was still strong with 1,300 approved residential units in the works.

Council supported a centralized fire dispatch system in principle pending a report on final costs, and approved Aurora being designated as a Character Community

The 2002 capital and operating budgets were adopted with a tax increase of 8.8 per cent over 2001. Council petitioned the province to reduce the powers of the Ontario Municipal Board and the region to relax the smoking bylaw for bingo parlours, as charities were suffering financially.

March brought many problems and challenges to council with Seaton Drive residents objecting to the elevation of the new homes to the rear of their properties. Aurora continued to grow from 35,837 to 40,167 or 15.2 per cent

Proposed widening of Bathurst Street through Aurora created concern about traffic noise and noise attenuation measures requested. The need for a sidewalk on Bathurst Street was questioned

Lighting for the Thompson Funeral Home parking lot concerned neighbours and town renewed parking agreements with

the United Church.

Council supported an initiative for changes in legislation so local bylaw enforcement officers can enforce speeding and stop sign bylaws.

A heavy snowstorm hit the area March 26th with more than five inches of snow.

Council's application to federal and provincial governments for funding to rehabilitate the historic Church Street School was successful and \$320,000 was committed.

April was another month of growth and complaints. There were 69 planning applications in various stages of progress for a total of 5,000 residential units. A 112-acre development on Bayview Avenue was approved and added to the list.

Clublink's proposal for a sevenstorev retirement home on the former Aurora Highlands clubhouse site was appealed to the Ontario Municipal Board.

One more time

Maybe something will happen this time.

For many years a butcher shop occupied the property located on the southwest corner of Tyler and Yonge Streets. It later became a leather goods store and was damaged by fire, resulting in its demo-

The property remained empty over the years in spite of various proposals.

Now it appears a five-storey mixed-use building including retail space on the ground floor and 32 residential condominium apartment units above will be constructed on the site.

But it's not the first time Aurora councillors have heard such a pro-

At a recent council meeting a staff report was adopted recommending a zoning bylaw amendment with first, second and third readings of the enabling bylaw to be considered at the next available council meeting.

In March, 1996, council approved in principle an application for the redevelopment of the site for a four storey mixed-use building including commercial space on the ground floor and 13 condominium units above, plus the retention of a house at 5 Tyler Street.

Council approval the application subject to several conditions including façade treatment, alterations to the configuration of the fourth storey and issues dealing with access.

While a site plan agreement along with the third reading of the implementing bylaw was scheduled for the August 1996 council meeting, the documents were not approved pending the involvement of an urban design consult-

The applicant retained a new architect for a revised project in 1999, which was for a five storey mixed use building, located on both the Yonge and Tyler Street properties.



The revised project included retail uses on the ground floor and 32 residential condominium apartments above and required several concessions including setbacks and buffer strips.

Following another public meeting in January, 2000, council approved the revised application in principle and requested that planning staff and the applicant work together to solve outstanding issues and concerns raised by neigh-

By September, 2000, the urban design consultant, staff, the applicant and residents had reached consensus on several issues, except for parking.

A revised site plan submission was completed January 7, 2002, and was discussed by general committee later that month.

Angela Daust, representing the residents of Tyler and Temperance Streets, appeared before the committee to express opposition to the proposal. She pointed out that the mass and density of the building was not in keeping with the neighbourhood, nor the historic United Church across the road.

She also expressed concerns about traffic safety at the Tyler/Yonge intersection, on-street parking and pedestrian safety.

After listening to comments from the public, council agreed to refer the application back to staff until all outstanding issues were resolved, including parking.



Could be year of frustrations

The days come and go, As calendar pages fall; Where did the time go, Events we can't recall.

Year 2002 has drawn to an end and one wonders where the time has gone and what was done.

It was a strange year with many ups and down and it will go down in history as a year of uncertainty.

Many seniors who have their life savings tied up in a Retirement Investment Fund (RIF), which may be invested in the stock market, watched their investments go down the drain, and they pray for some recovery in 2003.

Welfare recipients experienced a cost of living increase, while their social assistance payments remained at a reduced level. They are hoping for a more compassionate government.

Students, parents and teachers are hoping for some stability in the education system so they can settle down and enjoy their school years without having continual changes imposed on them by a chaotic govern-

Patients want assurance that when they need urgent health care there is bed for them in their community hospital, without being shipped hither and yon looking for an empty bed and staff to look after them in a time of need.

Seniors want to remain independent in their home, but with government imposed cutbacks on health care and social services, some are forced to enter an institution at a much higher cost.

Environmentalists, homeless, unemployed, parents seeking child day care, poor downtrodden taxpayers, and so many others experienced 2002 as a year of uncertainty.

Now we move from a year of uncertainty to 2003, a year likely to go down in history as the year of frustration. It's not a pleasant outlook.

At the federal government Prime Minister Jean Chretien is saying the longest goodbye in history, as his announced retirement date is February 2004, in spite of the fact his replacement will be selected in November, 2003.

Chretien is so vindictive in his desire to keep Paul Martin from replacing him as Leader of the Liberal Party and Prime Minister that he will go to any length to prevent it, even if it means destruction of the party and the country.

Hopefully when the new Liberal leader is selected, there will be a general election, but where is the opposition? The Tories and the Alliance will still be fighting as to who represents the right, and both the NDP and Tories are looking for a new leader.

In Ontario, we may or may not have an election in 2003. Normally in the last year of a four-year term, the government would bring down an election budget in March or April and then call the election in May or

But these are not normal times. Premier Ernie Eves is in the difficult position of deciding whether to call an election during the summer of 2003, or take the unusual step of going to the fifth and final year of the government's mandate, in hopes the popular opinion polls

According to the polls if an election were to be called today, the Liberals under Dalton McGuinty would form the next government. They are focussing on the GTA area, now mainly Tory Blue in hopes of turning it into Liberal Red, a smart political move.

The Liberals have plenty of ammunition with urban sprawl, traffic gridlock, waste disposal, protection of the environment and other issues important to the peo-

Then on the local level there will be a municipal election in November 2003 to determine who will lead the town's administration during the next three years.

If the election is anything like previous municipal elections, only about one of three eligible voters will make the effort and take the time to vote.

It's not a very good record, as elected representatives only represent about one-third of the population. If electors don't bother to vote, they shouldn't bother to



Aurora in the year 2002 from Scott's perspective

EDITOR'S NOTE: Auroran cartoonist Scott Johnston has shown us in the last couple of years that his talent stretches beyond his cartoons. (He wrote the Night Before Christmas article on Page 4 in our last edition of 2002.) Now, tongue firmly embedded in cheek, Scott has a look at Aurora's past year...from his perspective.

Jan. 8 Anticipating a tax increase of nine per cent, Aurora Council softens up taxpayers by hinting the increase will be 25 per cent. Jan. 15 After spending \$9 million on the new library, Council decides to save money by keeping it closed Mondays. In other words, to save 1.1 per cent of the total cost, the facility will remain closed 14.3 per cent of the week.

Feb. 2 The groundhog accurately predicts the six-week summer water ban.

Feb. 9 Unseasonably warm weather threatens to turn the first Aurora Arctic Adventure into the Aurora Amazon Adventure.

Feb. 16 After two months of debate over the use of stop signs at the intersection of George and Kennedy, Council votes to address the problem by installing a cloverleaf interchange

Feb. 20 The Public School Boundary debate gets out of hand when Siamese twins are assigned to different schools.

Mar. 20 Council decides not to install a sidewalk on Bathurst, while on Wellington, work begins on the new road widening, sidewalks, bicycle paths, lighting, median, landscaping, and pedestri-

May 5 Clowns Canada holds its annual convention in Aurora, prompting smiles from the children, and endless Council-related

May 25 The Leisure Complex re-opening after extensive renovations proves so successful that the pool is closed again in October, so that it can be re-opened again next spring.

June 2 Regional Council's decision not to approve a 50 per cent public transit subsidy for seniors faces little opposition, as few seniors can afford to attend the meeting to voice their concerns June 20 Applauding the preservation of 65 acres at the Ivv Jav Farm Woodland & Wetlands near Bayview are residents, who can enjoy the pleasant surroundings, and developers, who can charge higher prices for their adjacent "backing onto parkland"

July 1 Two annual traditions take place in Aurora: the Canada Day parade, and the commencement of the summer water ban. July 15 Speed humps are installed to calm traffic on Kennedy Road. Meanwhile, residents of Collins Crescent, Ridge Road and other streets observe that the pot-holes and other deteriorating conditions of their roads make them self-calming.

Aug. 3 The condo at Wellington and Industrial reaches two milestones: its first tenant, and recognition by the Aurora Historical Society.

Aug. 17 When the Federal government proposes splitting the town of Aurora into two ridings, residents are united ... in their apathy.

Sept. 9 Lake Ontario water is finally connected to the Aurora water system, which will reduce future summer water bans by at least one day.

Sept. 21 The term "throwing your money away" takes on new meaning as Council ponders a proposal for a fee of \$1 to be paid for each additional bag of garbage.



With aging, changes occur in hearing, vision, flexibility and reaction time. We must learn to adjust our skills to compensate for these changes

The session is a straightforward one, full of information including using a workbook, discussion and watching a video about driving habits and the areas we should all watch out for.

It's not unlike some of the things we experience with our health - we tend to live in denial that we are ever in any serious threat of our health or that our driving habits are anything less than perfect.

However, in many cases that is simply not the case. Ever had chest pain and passed it off as anything but a

Just ask almost anyone who has had a heart attack, or found out at a health check up that they have had a heart attack and didn't know it.

55 ALIVE course urged for seniors

The same applies to driving habits.

On a video shown in the session, a gentleman who has driven for 65 years disregards the fact that he can't physically turn around to look out the back or side

As long as he is driving with his wife, he feels safe, as she makes the effort to look around for him and tells him it's okay to drive forward.

Unfortunately, if there is a hesitation in the communication, there could be a accident and it could be fatal. And, how fair is that to an innocent second party?

When asked, why do you take the chance, the reply is quick, " if I don't drive, we can't get what we need to get we like our groceries fresh and we need to get to the store to get them."

But at what potential cost?

It's a great four-week session offered Fridays in February in a relaxed environment. The instructor is





Conflict of interest; it's an issue municipal councillors, especially in small towns, wrestle with as they strive to perform their elected duties.

I noted with interest Councillor Ron Wallace's observation: "somewhere it goes from the ridiculous to the sublime".

So, why not settle for the sublime and, instead of councillors having to declare conflict of interest when dealing with specific companies, draw up a plan to improve the local business scene as a whole?

I am well aware the Canadian economy as a whole is now regaining its lost momentum, but sustainability is the moot point.

Business viability and stable employment are urgent requirements.

W. John Trusler Aurora students, nicknamed the double cohort, will apply to the colleges and universities in Ontario seeking to continue their educational career. But where should your son or daughter go?

Traditionally, a parent would think that a university education would provide and lead their child to a better career. Universities have an active alumni organization to raise funds and a rich tradition of education. Colleges have only been operating since 1969 and are searching for funds to build new libraries and facilities. Universities have become established and recognized by name, while colleges are still trying to get a reputation.

This attitude, however, is out of date and is based on myths. Colleges have changed over the years and they should now get more respect from the public.

For example, at Humber College, in 2000, 6.2% of students had partial university experience and 12.4% of the college students had completed a university education.

At the same college, 25% of the students had completed five OAC's, and 13% of the students had completed six. The student's educational level at

entry into a college program is now solid and significant.

Furthermore, 91% the graduating students at Humber found work in their intended career program within one year after graduation. Few universities can state this fact and compete with this high placement rate.

Academic standards at

colleges are now matching the same standards at a university.

Some college courses

now adopt the same text-

book used at a university,

for the same type of course. In 2003, the colleges and universities will offer more programs, which will lead to a college diploma and university degree, over a

four-year period. This will

the skills and the knowledge for a career and a job.

So, it is time to change the old image of colleges. Adults will, no doubt, continue to consider colleges as viable ways to advance their careers and skills. For example, in 2000, approximately 24% of the students registered at Humber, were 24 years of age or older. It is now the time for high

school grads to consider a new path to higher education. The double cohort students may well want to apply to a Community College for a college-university program, for 2003-04. It is a new option in post secondary education.

According to Ryan Priestly, it would fall into itself.

The president of Priestly Demolition, Ryan said the engineers expected that once the middle and a few legs of Aurora's 40-year-old water tower were removed, the structure would collapse in a heap.

of a 10-storey building, the town's south end water tower didn't collapse. It toppled.

After a full day of weakening the equivalent

The giant tower, capable of holding a million gallons of water, came crashing down, wiping out a mature coniferous tree and a hydro pole.

It unceremoniously face-planted itself in the killer. mud.

For Priestly Demolition, the experts in getting rid of things in a hurry, the water tower was a new challenge.

Equipped with a huge inventory of destructive demolition devices, Priestly's men worked all day at removing the now useless tower, while spectators, including Mayor Tim Jones and Councillor George Timpson, watched from a distance.

The idea was to remove the centre post, demolish a small building, then eat off a few of the tower's eight legs.

Three legs had been severed and the structure remained upright. The fourth was the

But instead of collapsing under its own weight, the tower let out a horrible groan, then fell toward the property's only access, a driveway off Davis Road.

Founder of the company, Vic Priestly was on hand to watch his son, Ryan, bring the structure to the ground.

"Any demolition is a good demolition," Vic said, when asked if things had gone according to plan.

By the end of the following day, the mortally wounded structure was being carved up into a plethora of scrap metal and awaiting removal.



RUMOURS & RUMBLINGS

His name is not in the news these days, but back in February, 1983, Ken Taylor was well known as the Canadian Ambassador to Iran who was able to use his office to hide several Americans and sneak them back safely to the United States.

He was a hero to the Americans.

Taylor visited Aurora that month as the guest speaker at a "Multi-Cultural Conference" at the Aurora Highlands Golf Club.

The conference was designed to promote awareness of ethno-cultural similarities and differences within York Region.

The Cross-Cultural Program of Southern York Region sponsored the event.

Following the conference. Mayor Dick Illingworth was asked why he hadn't attended to welcome the heroic Canadian.

His answer was simple: "I wasn't invited".

WHEN COFFEE WAS STILL 25 CENTS

For many years the coffee shop at the former IGA store at Yonge and Wellington, now Sobey's, was the favourite meeting spot for Aurora's seniors to gather every morning.

At that time coffee was 25 cents a cup. When the sales tax was imposed in 1982, IGA manager Art Pepper decided to drop the price of a cup of coffee to 23 cents so he could still sell it for 25 cents with the store absorbing the tax.

Local seniors appreciated the price adjustment so they could go in and enjoy their coffee and a chat at the same price.

In May, 1985, when the store underwent renovations, it was planned to eliminate the snack bar and the seniors' favourite meeting place.

Val Waite organized a 100-name petition and the snack bar and coffee tables were saved.

PARKING RESTRICTIONS REDUCED

If you have problems trying to fit your car in one of the designated spaces in a parking lot, and more problems when you try to back out due to lack of room, don't blame the plaza or store operator.

In May, 1985, Aurora Council decided to reduce the minimum size of the parking stalls from 19.7 feet deep to 17.4 feet and the width from 9.8 feet to 8.8 feet.

The reason given was that cars were generally smaller at that time than in 1980 when the original sizes were set.

The new sizes were tested at the Shoppers Drug Mart on Yonge Street for more than a year without any reported complaints or problems.

DETERIORATION OF DOWNTOWN

It was in 1960 when the Post Office carried out a "places to call" survey in Aurora as the first step to door-to-door mail delivery.

Until that time residents walked downtown to the Old Post Office with the historic clock tower on Yonge Street.

What would normally be about a 10-minute trip often stretched out to more than an hour as neighbour met neighbour and people stopped to shop in the many retail stores in the downtown core. For the ladies there was Ardill's Department Store

and for men Norm Cook's Men's Wear and Chet Osborne's Shoes and Clothing.

There were three drug stores, Nixon Fisher's Five to a Dollar, Mary's Fruit Store, Rubin's Grocery and Department Store and many others.

In those days, 400 to 500 people would gather on Yonge Street every Saturday afternoon about 3 p.m. as Harry Seston mounted the steps of the Post Office to make the weekly draw of an Auroran who

week.

When home mail delivery started there wasn't the same need to make frequent visits to the Post Office and the downtown core and that was the start of the core's deterioration as a retail centre.

Then in 1967 a \$397,670 contract was awarded for the construction of the present Post Office on Wellington Street East.

Speed complaints continued to haunt council as more and more streets requested the limit be reduced to 40 km/hr.

Aurora citizens learned they would start receiving Lake Ontario water blended with the local water supply in late May or early June and that the Wellington Street reconstruction project was on schedule and on budget.

Motorists were pleased to learn that the regional centralized traffic control system was to be upgraded. Council petitioned the province to amend the Highway Traffic Act to permit a 40-km/hr speed limit on all streets in the municipality.

Due to a number of citizen complaints about the number of newspaper boxes on town streets, council directed staff to review ways and means under which the boxes might be controlled.

Former Aurora Councillor Earl Stewart died in a Barrie hospital during the early part of May.

Aurora council was hopeful some of its traffic problems would be solved with the release of the consultant's report on the Master Transportation Operations Study in June, but councillors were disappointed.

Following a trial period of speed humps on Kennedy Street, council agreed the traffic-calming device was here to stay.

The fundraising committee for the new Library reached \$750,000 with a target of \$1 million.

On June 11th, students,

staff and others carried the World Youth Day Cross north on Yonge Street from Cardinal Carter High School to Our Lady of Grace Church.


During the month there was considerable debate over the future uses of the 89-acre parcel of land the town purchased on Leslie Street, and the need for a Clean Yards Bylaw. The proposed removal of the Yonge Street pedestrian crossover at Mosley Street was also debated.

The first six months of 2002 were interesting and controversial, but there is much more to come in the last six months of the year, which will appear in the Auroran next week.
