

Yonge would be three districts if plan accepted

If Aurora Councillor Ron Wallace has his way, Aurora's Yonge Street would be divided into three

He appeared before an Economic Development committee meeting recently to explain that five digit addresses on Yonge Street mean nothing to people.

"From Lake Ontario in Toronto to the 18,000s in Holland Landing, how can anyone explain the exact location of such huge numbers?" he asked. "From one to the other is about 40 miles."

Wallace proposed Yonge Street be split into three districts, so that retailers would have an easier time explaining the location of their shops.

Because of the town's lengthy history, he proposed the districts be called Fleury, Museum, Hillary.


"Fleury would be the area from the Chamber of Commerce building at Industrial Parkway South to Kennedy Street; Museum would take in the area to Wellington Street, and Hillary would end at the St. John's Sideroad," he said.


Wallace showed the committee three suggestions for signage that would mark each district.

Aurora's Economic Development Officer Dino Lombardi said better identification of the town's downtown core was part of the ED's strategic plan.

"I'm partial to the signs actually crossing Yonge Street, in the form of a banner; but what I'm proposing here would be located over the sidewalks," Wallace said. "They would need to be one to two storeys high to be obvious to motorists they're that big, they need to be tasteful."

The committee received the presentation and sent it to staff for a report.

Residents don't want sidewalks

Aurora is proposing to construct sidewalks in the south end area of Nisbet. Stoddart and Glenview Drives, but the people who live there don't want them.

A large group from the area attended a committee meeting last week to oppose the construction.

Don Roberts, a longtime resident of Nisbet Drive, and a former councilor, spoke on behalf of the citizen, who he said belonged to the LUAP (Leave Us Alone Please) committee.

He pointed out there was

no safety problem as there was no on-street parking. Driveways were long enough to accommodate two cars, but if a sidewalk was installed, driveways would be shortened creating the necessity for onstreet parking.

How serious are the newcomers?

Nominations are finally over, The election battle has begun. With a large number of candidates, Some must be in it for the fun!

Aurora voters go the polls Nov. 10 to elect nine people to run the affairs of the town for the next three years.

They will be challenged to control rampant growth, build new infrastructure to keep up with that growth, and still keep the tax bill within the ability of taxpayers to pay.

There are two candidates running for the office of Mayor, incumbent Tim Jones and newcomer Homer Farsad. One has 25 years' experience on council, nine as mayor, while the other has no municipal experience.

In the past, when candidates have jumped into the fray for the battle to be head of council, electors of Aurora have rejected them by a significant margin, on the basis that candidates should earn their spurs by serving on council or a committee first to learn the ropes.

Not only that, the mayor is Aurora's only representative on regional council and with provincial downloading of many programs and services to the regional level, experience in municipal affairs is almost mandatory for the people to be well represented.

In the 1997 Aurora election, newcomer Michael O'Brien challenged first-term Mayor Tim Jones and was swamped 6,730 votes to 1,688.

There are 16 candidates running for eight seats on council in this election. It's not a record number as there were 19 for the 1997 election.

Six incumbent councillors are seeking re-election, including David Griffith, Nigel Kean, George Timpson, Damir Vrancic, Ron Wallace and John West. Betty Pedersen is not seeking re-election and Evelina MacEachern withdrew her nomination creating two

There are three former councillors in the race, Evelyn Buck, Bill Hogg and Phyllis Morris. Newcomers are Wendy Gaertner, Vince Piron, Kam Qamar Sadiq, Paul Santoro, Keith Munro, Al Wilson and Stan Rycombeck.

Gaertner has organized the Hot Spot night for youngsters for the past several years and has appeared before council on several occasions. Munro was an NDP candidate for a couple of provincial elections, and Wilson has attended several council meetings.

The other candidates have never attended a council or committee meeting to the best of knowledge.

Less than a week before nominations closed Sept. 26, it appeared Jones was on his way to his first acclamation, and there were 12 candidates for council.

One has to wonder what motivated citizens to offer themselves for election during the last week or on the final day, pay their registration fee of \$100 for councillor or \$200 for mayor.

Were they waiting on the sidelines hoping other candidates wouldn't register and they'd get a free ride into office, or was it that they made up their mind on the spur of the moment?

Normally a new candidate for office will register early, start campaigning and start attending council and/or committee meetings to obtain some idea of the issues before council, so that when they appear before electors or participate in an all-candidates meeting, they will have some of the answers.

This election is not a normal election as so many candidates waited to the last minute to register and never bothered to attend a meeting to gain some experience in municipal government.

Another interesting aspect of this election is that three former mayors are seeking election as coucillors, Evelyn Buck, George Timpson and John West. It was even suggested that Keith Nisbet and yours truly should join so that all living former mayors would be in the race.

Electors face a challenge in deciding how they should cast their ballot, keeping in mind they may vote for UP TO eight councillors, and while the newcomers have every right to run, and they are to be commended for doing so, how serious are they?

Nov. 10, vote as you like, but vote!

I agree with Nicole Bridgeman that the town's traffic department just doesn't "get it" when it comes to safety.

At first I dismissed her comments as growing pains

in a new neighbourhood, but let's face it, driving in Aurora is dangerous.

Where are the Town's traffic people and where is York Regional Police? For example, Brookland

I have heard there have been other personal injury accidents at this intersection as well.

Has the town made any adjustments to this intersection as a result?

Drivers are still blazing in and out of the Jonathan's plaza to try and avoid the light at Yonge and Dunning, or buzzing the amber on Yonge, sometimes I think just for the sake of it, seeing as they get caught at the lights at Dunning or Edward anyway.

If we're welcoming new residents to Aurora and helping them to part with thousands of tax dollars each year, the very least we can do is help keep them, and long-time residents, safe.

Wouldn't it be a better use of the town's half-million surplus to address these traffic issues NOW rather than sock that money away? ("We're in the money": story, Auroran, Oct. 7, page 8).

eash-free park gets committee

Last April, Robert Schuetze of the "Bark Park" committee made a presentation to Aurora Council proposing a dog leash-free park on town-owned lands east of the Industrial Parkway, south of the St. John's Sideroad.

The location was within a

30-acre open space that contains a branch of the Holland River that is part of the town's trail system.

Provision for parking was the major problem.

Council endorsed the creation of the park and directed staff to enter into an agreement with the volunteer committee on condition the committee provided necessary liability insurance coverage and that the committee be responsible for the maintenance of the

The committee consists of individual volunteers who are not incorporated as a

body.

In order to obtain the necessary insurance to indemnify the town, the committee would have to be incorporated, which would cost about \$1,000 and require it to comply with several reporting functions as a corporation.

It was proposed the committee be established as the Leash Free Dog Park Committee, Advisory responsible for the operation, maintenance and administration of the park.

Councillor David Griffith recommended the group be established as an advisory committee reporting to the Leisure Services Advisory Committee, starting during the next term of office.

He suggested it act as a sub-committee with one member sitting on the Leisure Services Advisory Committee.

When the agreement is in place, \$50,000 will be made available to build a parking lot, which would also for future used soccer fields.

New phone system for the Town Hall

Last July town staff submitted a report to council noting the telephone equipment in use at the Town Hall was more than 20 years old, the equipment was old and replacement parts were difficult to obtain.

A Request for Proposal was issued in August and three of the 11 submissions were selected to make a presentation.

Vendors included BrantTel Networks (Avaya solution),

Bell Canada (Mitel solution) and Telus (Nortel solution).

BrantTel, even though its bid was higher than lowbidder Bell, was chosen as the preferred system.

Approved for the system was \$150,000 and BrantTel came in at \$148,241.75. The Bell bid was \$113,818.20.

Last week at a general committee meeting, Councillor Nigel Kean noted the preferred bid was 34 per cent higher than the Bell bid and asked if the town was "buying a Cadillac instead of a

Treasurer Allan Evelyn said the BrantTel system had many unique features and a well-trained staff, while Bell was still training technicians on the Mitel System.

He said BrantTel was a privately owned Canadian company and serviced several thousand businesses and organizations across Canada and the United

The committee awarded the contract to BrantTel at the quoted price, and council was expected to endorse it this week.

A CANOE TRIP NEVER TO BE FORGOTTEN

A canoe trip some years ago by two Aurora youngsters, Michael Chapman, then 14 and Jim Bagnell, 15, turned into a nightmare as they barely escaped drowning in Lake Simcoe.

They left Jersey River about 5 a.m. for a planned trip along the shoreline to Lefroy where they planned to camp overnight on the beach.

About 3 p.m. their canoe developed a severe leak and started to sink.

They clung to the overturned boat but it was fast blowing into the reeds on the south shore.

The boys decided they would never be seen in the reeds and left the boat.

They swam and rested intermittently but the wind kept blowing them out into the middle of the lake. Several boats passed but despite their shouts, they were not seen.

Finally about 7 p.m., a boat stopped and the boys were taken to Gilford and their families called.

They soon recovered from severe chills but were sad about the loss of their precious camping gear.

LITTLE CHANGE OVER THE YEARS

The headline in the local paper in 1988 could well be repeated in 2003.

It read "Aurora struggles to cope with tremendous growth".

The story told about the rampant growth with all the problems associated with it.

Aurorans struggled to cope with traffic congestion, in the schools, an affordable overcrowding housing shortage and a lack of water during

the summer months.

Not much has changed in 15 years.




