Last week's meeting to discuss the proposed Hydro One transmission line replacement through East Aurora was a repeat of one held June 10th, but this one was more vocal and emotional as residents

Same meeting, same location, opposed changes to the line.

While the previous meeting was considered a constituency meeting arranged by residents and coordinated by Councillor Phyllis Morris, this was an official gathering organized by Aurora Council and Aurora Hydro.

Mysterious woman dies

With windows boarded up, religious sayings painted on the garage doors, front yard in constant disarray, the house at 62 Nisbet Drive was a target.

Even though the place looked deserted, behind the plywood covered windows lived a woman and, at one time, her brother.

Lois Joan Fisk, Aurora's most mysterious woman, died in that house last week and was there for three days before officials broke in to find

Her brother, Kenneth Lord Fisk, apparently moved out some time ago, and it's not known if he is still alive.

A second address for the pair on the 2003 Aurora voters' list shows up as 147 Wellington Street West, an apartment building, but neither is listed in the latest edition of the telephone book.

Officials from several agencies made numerous attempts over the years to remove the woman from the premises with no success.

The house was a favourite target on Hallowe'en and on weekends when cars would scream up the street and occupants would throw things at the building.

Neighbours complained to the point where the Town of Aurora installed a temporary speed bump on Nisbet to slow the speeders.

While the exterior of the house was a shambles, people who visited reported the inside was in immaculate

Further details were not available at press time.

More than 200 residents packed the council chambers to hear from Hydro One and Aurora Hydro officials and to get answers but they left frustrated and angry.

The meeting was chaired by John Sanderson, President and Chief Executive Officer Aurora Hydro.

At issue is the replacement of a hydro line that has been there since the 1940s with a new line carrying more power that will require higher but thinner poles, and more of them.

Aurora Mayor Tim Jones, who came under attack during the meeting, said council was aware of the concerns expressed by residents. but there was a need for additional

Council, he said, would make a decision at a July 13 council meet-

councillors attended Tuesday's meeting, with the exception of Councillor John West who was at a library board meeting.

Aurora Hydro Director of Engineering and Operations Irv Klajman said Aurora's population in 12 years would be 63,000 and he said it was necessary to provide additional power and a reliable

Gary Schneider, Manager of Transmission Approvals Hydro One Networks, outlined the electricity transmission options to meet the growing electricity needs.

He pointed out that the proposed expansion for the transmission of power was being carried out at the

Wal-Mart coming to town?

If constructed, this project will be the biggest in the history of Aurora and could change the course of the town forever.

But apparently current residents and business owners don't care.

Included in the proposal, which would be constructed at the northwest corner of Wellington Street East and Highway 404, would be two major big-box stores (Wal-Mart is rumoured to be one of them), a huge supermarket or hardware store, a 10-screen theatre, and numerous smaller businesses, covering 561,775 square feet.

It would front the large business park, soon to be the home of the Canadian headquarters of State Farm Insurance, now under construction

The proposal originally came to a public planning meeting in April to hear the application from Whitwell Developments for an official plan and zoning bylaw amendment to permit the commercial

The development would be known as the Aurora Gateway Centre, would generate \$350,000 in annual taxes and create thousands of permanent jobs, developers said.

But for some reason, proper notification was not given to nearby residents, resulting in the public hearing being changed to an information meeting and a new

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





Speed humps will be installed on Golf Links

Golf Links Drive will become the second street in Aurora to wear speed humps, council decided last week.

joins Kennedy Street West as the second location for a device used to slow traffic.

At a recent meeting of the Traffic Safety Advisory Board (TSAB), Sandra Humpfryes told members the residents of Golf Links Drive had been working with staff for more than two years for the implementation of traffic calming measures to control speeding and reduce the number of accidents.

She pointed out there had been 23 collisions reported on Golf Links in the past 13 years, with others not reported.

She said residents were not looking to reduce the traffic volume, just the speed.

She requested five speed humps on Golf Links between Murray Drive and Yonge Street.

Mrs. Humpfrves appeared at last week's council meeting in support of the TSAB report.

There was a discussion as to the value of the humps in controlling speed as it was noted that some drivers speed up to go over the humps.

It was agreed that while police enforcement was the best method of controlling speed, the speed hump was an

Streets for people, too, reader argues

Re: Gurnett parking restriction to get a six month trial (Auroran, June 29).

There appears to exist some underlying belief at Town Hall that if a road exists, it should be used as efficiently as possible to facilitate the movement of traffic.

Any other use, I guess, is a waste of real estate.

There also appears to exist some notion that any increase in the efficiency of roads to move traffic, is an improvement. These are both fallacies.

Streets do not only belong to cars.

They are for cyclists, roller bladers and pedestrians as well.

Indeed, it is very difficult to go anywhere without using streets, regardless of mode of transportation.

They can be used to park cars. They can be used as a meeting place for residents. Do you ever run into your neighbour while walking down the street?

They can be used by slower vehicles such as roller blades and bicycles as well, or even pedestrians crossing to the opposite sidewalk. All of these

other uses must be taken into account.

Unfortunately, these other uses are seen by the Traffic Services Advisory Board as a hindrance to their primary mandate of improving the flow of traffic.

It is erroneous to think removing these "impediments" will improve traffic flow.

It has been shown time and again that any increase in a road efficiency is matched pound for pound with an increase in traffic volume making the net gain nil.

Any temporary relief of congestion also comes at significant social cost.

Temporarily because there is an almost endless flow of new people moving into Aurora.

Any increase in traffic efficiency will, in fact, make Aurora more appealing, and hasten this increase in traffic volume.

At significant social cost because every concession we make to improve the efficient movement of automobiles at the same time makes our streets less livable for all those other purposes, that is people.

This is the primary reason I have been strongly opposed to the right turn Wellington, the increased parking restrictions on Yonge, Victoria, and other streets, the widening of Yonge Street, and now these new ill-conceived parking restrictions on Gurnett.

Before council passes any more bylaws reducing the habitability of our streets, Aurora needs an overall strategy which balances those places where traffic flow efficiency is a primary goal (like Industrial Parkway), and where human habitability is a primary goal (such as Gurnett).

During the course of a council meeting, questions are asked and new ideas proposed, which are normally referred to staff for a report.

In most cases a report is received but occasionally an issue falls through the cracks and is not reported on, or if it is, it's not done in a public session.

As mentioned earlier Poor Richard is a packrat and has files on all these outstanding issues and is waiting for a

Here is Chapter Three. So far no action on either of the previous chapters!

In November, 2003, the Aurora Traffic Safety Advisory Board (TSAB) recommended that parking restrictions be implemented on two of the curved sections of McLeod Drive, that residents be notified and York Regional Police be requested to increase enforcement.

The enacting bylaw was presented to council on January 13, 2004, and after hearing from three delegations with contrary opinions, council referred the issue back to the TSAB for further consideration.

The issue was back before the general committee on January 20th and members requested a staff report on traffic safety conditions due to on-street parking caused by a neighbourhood plaza.

Staff recommended that parking restrictions be imposed on McLeod in the vicinity of the plaza. Two of the same delegates appeared before the committee, one in support and one opposed.

As a result the issue was referred back to staff for a meeting with the residents due to the conflict. Was the meeting ever held? If so, what was the result

and where is the bylaw? Prior to the sudden adjournment of the April 27 council meeting Councillor Nigel Kean asked when staff would report on the suggestion that CHATS be included in the

Staff replied there was no recollection of a request about CHATS and the seniors' centre and a check would be carried out.

It was also reported that a report on the Library Square was being prepared and there was a possibility arrangements could be made to include CHATS.

Yet following the workshop session on the seniors' building held February 9 staff was requested to give consideration for CHATS to use some of the common area, as integration might prove beneficial to both organizations.

However, answers are still outstanding!

In October, 2002, York Region Health Services made a presentation/demonstration of an Automatic External Defibrillation (AED) program and the benefits of incorporating such units in public facilities.

Cost to implement the program includes about \$6,000 for the unit, accompanying equipment and software of about \$3,000 plus training and manuals at approximately

Council endorsed the program and asked staff to submit a more comprehensive report. Was it ever submitted and does the town have an AED unit anywhere?

In April, 2001, when it was suggested that restaurants be added to the list of businesses requiring a local licence, members of council asked why it was necessary and if the municipality had the staff to enforce it if adopted.


The discussion erupted when staff recommended that the 61-page consolidation licensing bylaw bringing all licensing bylaws into one be adopted and for council to consider other licensing options such as auto repair/garages, restaurants and tobacco sales.

The report noted there were 115 food premises in Aurora including restaurants, food stores, bakeries, and convenience stores that would be subject to the licence.


It was agreed to consolidate the bylaw, but staff was directed to investigate and report back on the other proposed licensing options.

Mayor's Report **By Tim Jones**

Public meeting on hydro

On Tuesday, June 29th, approximately 200 people filled the Council Chambers to listen and give input to the Hydro One proposal for upgraded hydro service through the existing Hydro cor-

This issue has been the subject of a number of meetings including workshops held through the Region by Hydro One, an expanded constituent meeting held by a councillor on June 10th at the Town Hall, a June 16th workshop by Hydro One on Electromagnetic Fields, at Regional Council. where Council approved a resolution to call for options and a series of other recommendations.

The meeting on June 29th was requested by council through Aurora Hydro to address the issues known to date.

Drawings and information were available in the lobby of the Town Hall showing larger and more frequent towers and along with information on Electromagnetic Fields.

The meeting began with a facilitator setting the format after which I gave some opening remarks which included introducing the members of council.

Irv Klajman, Director of Engineering and Operations for Aurora Hydro spoke to the projected demand for local electricity and Gary Schneider, Manager of Transmission approvals for Hydro One spoke to options under consideration to meet those needs.

Questions that arose during the June 10th meeting at Town Hall were responded to by Hydro One and I addressed questions directed to the Town.

The issue of this transmission upgrade is a real and an emotional one for all the residents who live on this corridor.

Through the questions raised, the issue about the effect of the Electromagnetic Field on the health of those in proximity, was a particularly frustrating one.

It boils down to the fact that although no one has yet to prove that in a transmission scenario such as the one that is being proposed, it is dangerous to one's health, however, Hydro One officials were not able to state, in response to several questions asked on this point, that it could be proven to be safe either.

Thus the question: should these towers and transmission capacity be upgraded as proposed because nothing has yet to be proved or should we demand more expensive alternatives to elim-

inate the risk of the unknown?

The aesthetics of higher and more frequent towers was also raised as an issue, especially as it might relate to property values and resale.

Would there be compensation?

My read of the response was that there was no plan for compensation.

There was a frustration that Aurora wasn't reacting fast enough to this issue.

Aurora will consider its position July 13th at a Council meeting scheduled for 7 p.m.

A recommendation by Hydro One on this project is not planned to occur until the Fall, so I feel

Aurora is well within the timeframe to research this matter fully and give a more substantial considered response than simply "not in my back yard", as evidenced by the reaction of one neighbouring municipality.

I asked in the meeting that Hydro One prepare information for Council for the 13th of July on the costs of burying these lines in the existing corridor through the populated areas.

I also asked for information outlining the options for how that might be paid for.

These lines benefit the majority of residents in York Region and thus, in my opinion, any additional costs of any options suggested should be shared in a similar manner.

Options could include looking for help from the region, the hydro ratepayers, governed through the Ontario Energy Board, and even the Province.

We must also recognize that any actions that we recommend that are acted on would have to be considered in the overall policy of future improvements elsewhere throughout

Province.

I also suggested that Aurora Hydro be asked to consider examining projects that would involve hydro generation for future implementation, in that as they are now, a private company, Aurora Hydro has the ability to enter into business projects such as this.

I have asked that our staff prepare a report and propose a Council response similar to those of the Region of York, which are, in turn, similar to those of Vaughan and Markham, as a starting point for Council to deliberate on July 13th.

Because of the meetings and input to date, Council may be able to further the efforts of others with recommended options depending on the information we receive from Hydro One and the opinions of other members of Council.

They say that there is no such thing as bad publicity.


So, perhaps the Aurora Historical Society should appreciate Dick Illingworth's "Brickbat" in his column of June 22nd.

"BYLAWS" OLD AS VIKINGS

Just in case you have wondered why municipal laws are called bylaws instead of ordinances as in the U.S., or some other word, you can blame the Vikings.

The "by" part comes from an old Norse word "byr" meaning a dwelling place, village or town and "law" came from several sources including the Old Norse "log" meaning good order.

Byr and log reached olde England with the Viking raiders who settled along the east coast more than 1,000 years ago and bylaws became laws governing local affairs, rather than the laws of the country.

Now you know! Aren't you glad?

BELIEVE IT OR NOT

Today cabinet ministers and senior bureaucrats are able to get away with bending the rules and doing what they like.

But back in the summer of 1981, it was different.

Believe it or not, the Ontario Transportation Minister and Deputy Minister Harold Gilbert, a resident of Aurora, were charged under the Environmental Assessment Act, based on allegations made by Ron Reid, a staff environmentalist with the Federation of Ontario Naturalists.

Although the extension of Highway 404 from Gormley to the Aurora Sideroad was exempted from the need for an environmental hearing by a May 27th Ontario cabinet resolution, Reid claimed the minister and his deputy knew work was being done on the roadway before that date.

The evidence against them was overwhelming and both were fined a substantial sum of money for the environmental infraction of proceeding through a sensitive area before the environmental hearing.

NOT MUCH HAS CHANGED

In September, 1970, the Aurora Junior Chamber of Commerce prepared a list of questions of issues of the day for those seeking election to Aurora Council. Many of the questions are still pertinent today.

One was whether the candidates were in favour of attracting more industry to Aurora and if they supported more residential building.

Another question had to do with the standard of maintenance of town streets and how to improve serv-





There was also a question about preserving historic sites in Aurora, adequate off-street parking in the downtown area and whether Aurora would benefit and prosper under regional government.

The Jaycees also wanted to know what recreational benefits new residents would receive and if the municipality spent enough on parks and recreation.

Regardless of the answers at the time, many of the same questions could be asked 34 years later.

ANOTHER NAME MAYBE

There has been considerable controversy over the address of the Aurora Town Hall on John West Way resulting in a change in name effective January 1, 2005, to Municipal Drive for the Town Hall and the Seniors' Centre. The name John West Way will remain for the street.

Back in January, 1990, in order to proceed with the engineering drawings related to the Beavertop Investments draft plan of subdivision for the ill-fated Aurora East Industrial Estates, the street names for the development had to be confirmed by council.

Street H in the Beavertop plan extended from St. John's Sideroad south to connect with Wellington Street at Mary Street and the developer suggested the Mary Street name be extended through the develop-

As the Town Hall was to be located on the street, staff suggested it be named Council Avenue, Municipal Way, Auroraview Terrace, Chaingate Boulevard, Willson Park Drive or Hollandview Drive, but it ended up John West Way.

RESEARCH PROJECT

Back in November, 1995, Aurora Council entered into an agreement with the University of Waterloo to use a portion of the stormwater open space zone within the Coscan subdivision for the purpose of stormwater management research until December 31, 1997.

The subdivision was located south of Henderson Drive on the east side of Bathurst Street.

Although the open space had not yet been assumed by the town, Coscan officials said they had no objection to the research project.

The agreement called for the research project, when complete, to be shared with the town.

In view of all the stormwater projects authorized by the town and the current projects to improve the quality of the facilities, it is wondered if the research was shared, and if put into practice.





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

Residents reject hydro corridor plan

From page 1 request of the local utilities. A joint study was started two years ago as to the need and possible solutions.

Schneider said that without additional power supply there could be a shortage by the winter of 2006/2007.

Several alternatives have been proposed for moving power, he said, but whichever route is selected needs approval from the Ministry of the Environment and the Ontario Energy Board.

Schneider reviewed comments from the June 10th meeting and provided answers to communication, health concerns pertaining to electric and magnetic fields (EMF) and property values.

He said more than 25.000 notices had been delivered door to door in the affected areas, ads were in the media, and information was on a Hydro One website.

workshop was held with approximately 50 people in attendance and a report of the discussions at the workshop is being prepared and will soon be available

He added that in trying to determine what level of EMF was acceptable, Hydro One used guidelines established by Health Canada and the World Health Organization and Hydro One meets those quidelines.

Regarding property values he said the existing 140foot corridor was in place long before the homes were constructed along the corridor over which Hydro One had no

He added that studies reveal that any adverse effect on property values decreases over time and that Hydro One did not pay compensation to homeowners adjacent to corridors owned by

Potential options to delay an expansion of the transmission lines is increased generation, which the province is encouraging, conservation of electricity, a building moratorium, and running the risk of lack of supply reliability.

Sue Fusco, chairperson for STOP (Stop Transmission lines Over People) presented a video prepared by STOP. Prior to the video she said answers the people heard were not to their satisfaction.

She asked for a strong resolution from council similar to that adopted by Markham.

The video featured Richard Johnson, an Aurora resident, and depicted the current towers with a rendition of what the proposed towers would look like in relation to the neighbouring homes.

He said STOP had 1,200 members, many of whom posed project until it was brought to their attention by STOP.

Major concerns are health hazards due to EMF and decrease in property values, estimated to be 15 to 20 per

Mayor Jones came under attack from residents who claimed he promised the lines would be buried or never expanded at a meeting 10 years ago.

Jones later denied making the statement saying council has no control over Hydro One lines.

He was also asked about the alternative of placing a moratorium on growth, which was loudly applauded.

He replied that was an idealistic suggestion as it was not possible to stop growth, only manage it. He added that growth also included business, which produced jobs and helped bring needed assessment to balance residential taxes.

Questions were asked about burying the lines to reduce the risk to people. It was also pointed out that lines had been buried in

Schneider replied that the cost to bury lines was five to seven times the cost of overhead lines and the reason lines were buried in Toronto was because Hydro One did not have a right-of-way.

Schneider tried to explain that if York Region or Aurora wanted buried lines, residents of the area would have to pay the incremental costs as the benefitting municipality, as Hydro One, a provincial agency, could not impose regional costs on all residents of the province.

This brought an angry response from some who suggested high salaries and bonuses paid to Hydro One officials could help pay for

Question after question was asked about health hazards due to EMF and loss of property values due to the higher towers proposed for the corridor.

In spite of the efforts of Hydro One officials to respond to questions, their received.

Several residents said when they purchased homes they had been assured by hydro officials including Aurora Hydro the transmission line would never expand.

Schneider replied that Hydro One officials would never have said it and Sanderson of Aurora Hydro said local officials were not in a position to make such a promise as they had no control over the transmission cor-

The Director of Real Estate for Hydro One pointed out that the transmission line through Aurora has been there since the 1940s and Hydro One had no control over the development that took place adjacent to the corridor over the years.

The same questions were repeated and regardless of answers provided by Hydro One officials, the audience left angry and frustrated.

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Studies still don't say for sure

The possibility of a larger Hydro One transmission line through Aurora from Markham to Newmarket has created a storm of protests, especially regarding Electric and Magnetic Fields (EMF).

Use of electric power is taken for granted, but over the years concerns have been expressed about the potential health dangers from EMF.

Studies have been carried out often with conflicting points of view leaving much uncertainty whether there's a health hazard or not.

A Swedish study published in 1992 provided what some scientists considered to be the most convincing evidence at that time of EMF on people.

In a 25-year study of 500.000 Swedes, researchers found that children living near power lines were four times more likely to have leukemia.

But not all studies reveal the same results.

The following vear California researchers reported no increased cancer risk among EMFexposed workers at a California electric utility.

In May, 1994, the issue was before York Regional Council. A public meeting had been held in Richmond Hill to discuss a proposed regional centre on the former Langstaff jail farm.

Concern was expressed about potential health hazards from exposure to EMF from hydro transmission lines crossing the site.

When the Minister of Municipal Affairs approved the region's official plan in October, 1994, he deferred the section on communication corridors and transmission facilities as the plan failed to provide policy direction on EMF.

As a result the region engaged a consultant to provide technical expertise on the issue. The consultant's report reviewed several case studies and noted that while there was a correlation between magnetic fields and cancer, research studies did not show exposure to EMF directly causes cancer.

The staff report indicated

the link between EMF and increased cancer rates including childhood leukemia had not been fully explained. In order to put the poten-

tial increased risks to life in perspective, the staff report compared other risk levels that people encounter in everyday life from 1 in 2.7 for heart disease; 1 in 44 for auto accidents; 1 in 360 for drowning; 1 in 1,400 for firearm accidents; and 1 in 5,000 to 10,000 for EMFrelated causes.

Regional Council asked the province for a safety standard for exposure to EMF. Meanwhile, staff was directed to investigate a policy of prudent avoidance, such as setting back new development farther from transmission lines.

A study released in July, 1996, revealed hydro workers with a high exposure to electric and magnetic fields had a leukemia rate 11 times that of the general pop-

The study of 32,000 current, former and retired Ontario Hydro workers also suggested they had an increased risk of lung can-

The study was carried out by Dr. Anthony Miller, Chairman of Preventive Medicine and Biostatistics at the University of Toronto. He noted that while leukemia rates were higher for hydro workers, the incidence was still low.

He said electric and magnetic fields are encountered around power lines, transmission towers, home and office wiring, electric appliances, electric blankets and

Miller cautioned that the study didn't mean people had to worry about their use

In July, 1997, the largest study to date of EMF and cancer was carried out by the National Cancer Society and no evidence was found that people living near high voltage lines were more susceptible to cancer than others.

In another report to York Regional Council in 1998. staff advised that recent studies in a residential setting did not provide any further insight into a link between EMF and brain cancer or childhood leukemia.

And so the battle rages between Hydro One officials who claim the utility meets all the guidelines imposed by Canada Health and the World Health Organization and the concerned residents living beside transmission

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
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
