### Wind turbine issue heading to OMB

In September Aurora Cable Internet submitted an application to the Committee of Adjustment for a minor variance to permit three wind turbines and a storage shed on the company's Ridge Road transmission site.

The turbines are about 74 feet in height and it was noted the power saved from not using the grid could provide power to about 50 homes and ACI's services would not be subject to brownouts.

Several residents appeared at the Committee of Adjustment hearing to oppose the application on the basis of noise, devaluation of property values and concern about the environmental impact as the site is located on the Oak Ridges moraine.

### Opening postponed

When the invitation arrived at The Auroran offices, it started off "After years of false starts, the Aurora Sports Dome becomes a reality this Saturday, Dec. 10th, 2005".

And then, only two days before the scheduled opening, another "false start" landed, and the event was postponed. Partnership and Public Relations Coordinator Laurie Mueller noted in

a fax "due to construction delays, we regret to inform you that the Grand Opening...is cancelled and will be re-scheduled for a later date".

The huge dome, located in the back yard of the Aurora Legion on Industrial Parkway North, will wait for another day - as yet undetermined to show itself off to the soccer crowd.

Thousands of children, officials and dignitaries, were scheduled to take part in the day-long ceremonies Saturday. All got an unexpected day off.

Some 4,000 Aurora Youth Soccer Club members had been invited to take part in the official opening.

Among the dignitaries invited to attend were MP Belinda Stronach, Aurora Mayor Tim Jones and AYSC President Ron Weese.

When it does finally open, the dome will be the largest air-supported structure of its kind in York Region, and will be home for such activities as soccer, baseball, flag football, ultimate frisbee and golf.

### Two firms apply for concessions at new complex

Council endorsed terms of reference for a Request for Proposals for a concession service and vending contract for the new recreational complex.

The terms included a lease of about two years to coincide with the expiry date of other snack bar facilities, a flat rental rate of \$1,000 per month plus a percentage of net sales, liability insurance and supply of all equipment.

A total of five firms took tender documents and submitted bids but only two firms acknowledged all the terms and conditions of the Request for Proposal.

They were Mr. Vending and Recreation Leisure Services.

Both firms were evaluated on proven municipal experience, listing of products and services provided, pricing structure, hours of operation, references and percentage of net sales on concession and snack machine rev-

Last week, town staff recommended Mr. Vending with an annual rental of \$13,000 and other considerations.

Mr. Vending is a consortium of Country Style, a pizza outlet and a bagel outlet.

The deal will be in effect for two years.

Councillor Vrancic referred to council's past experience with the vending contract at the Aurora Library and pointed out the late opening of the recreational complex and the unfinished swimming pool could have an impact

on firm's revenues. At the library the operator reported to council that the location had not been profitable resulting in no payments to the

Vrancic said he was still concerned and suggested the two-year contract start when the facility was open and made an amendment accordingly.

Councillor Evelyn Buck disagreed claiming the operator knew what he was bidding on and council's job was to protect the citizens.

It was pointed out that the contract was designed to expire at the same time as the other canteen contracts resulting in Vrancic changing his amendment to give staff the flexibility to amend the contract as may be required.

It is expected to be ratified by council this week.

### <u>A celebration at Hartman's Corners in 1909</u>

Is one of your ancestors in this photograph? It was taken on September 6, 1909, on the occasion of a grand family reunion and celebration of the 102nd anniversary of the arrival of homesteaders John and Mary Hartman in an area that would one day become the Town of Aurora. In 1816 their farm stretched from Yonge Street to Bayview Ave. along the south side of what is now Wellington St. and their beautiful house still stands on the rise overlooking Hartman's Corners, now the intersection of Bayview and Wellington. It currently houses a French Montessori School and may become the site of a Toyota dealership. The gentleman in the middle holding the framed portrait of his grand-

parents is the host of the party, Lot L. Hartman, grandson of John. He was a long-serving member of Whitchurch Council and a Warden for York County. In the 19th century, the Hartman family owned farms on both sides of Bayview and Aurora's first school, located on the northwest corner opposite the house, was called the Hartman School. This building was moved into the Town of Aurora in 1883 and now stands next door to Baldwin's on Wellington East. Lot Hartman's late uncle, Joseph Hartman, who had owned a farm on the current site of Magna International, had also been a trustee and one of the first teachers at the Hartman School. He went on to become

an influential Liberal MP for this area in 1852. Two hundred descendants of John and Mary and an equal number of friends and neighbours attended this festive reunion. Sir Henry Mulock dedicated a monument to the Hartmans on that day and it still stands near the entrance to the Aurora Cemetery on Yonge Street.

### Rowland wasn't always a Moddle

The surname was not always Moddle.

When his parents arrived in Canada from Britain, a customs officer remarked, "We can't have a name like that here", and proceeded to change the 'u' to an 'o'. His wife said she was always thankful for that officer, saving her from becoming Mrs. Muddle.

The correction I would like to mention is that in 1945 there was no 'Wells Street School'. That building was the one and only original Aurora High School. It became Wells Street School when it became an elementary

My dad, as principal of Aurora High School, did interviewing prospective staff.

I remember the day Rowland Moddle arrived at our home and was ushered into Dad's study.

To a 12-year-old he was such a handsome, dark haired man in Canadian Air Force uni-

I have always thought how clever he was to arrive in uniform to be interviewed by a fellow airman from WWI. He got the job and Aurora benefitted in many ways from that day onward.

### **Poor Richard**

Secrecy at council meetings, Is a question that has always been; Citizens want to know why The discussions can't be seen.

- Poor Richard's Scrapbook

Municipal politicians like to brag that they deal with issues affecting people and claim theirs is the most open form of government, yet secrecy at council meetings has been an issue for years.

There is a delicate balance between the public's right to know and an individual's right to privacy and carrying out public business that best benefits and protects the municipality as a whole.

The issue came to the fore recently with the introduction of Bill 123, the Transparency of Public Matters Act, a Private Member's Bill currently before the Legislative Standing Committee on Regulations and Private Bills.

At first glance it appears to be worthwhile legislation as it would impose new rules for public access to meetings held by a wide range of public bodies, including municipalities.

But reading the fine print brings out other meanings. The Bill would permit any person to challenge a council decision on procedural grounds by making a complaint to the Information and Privacy Commissioner.

The Bill gives the Commissioner the power to issue an order voiding any decision, recommendation or action of council made at a meeting whose procedures

are alleged to fall short of the requirements of the Act. In order words, one individual would have the power

to overrule decisions of a legally elected council. Citizens elect councillors to represent their interests and if they are not satisfied they can get rid of members of council at the next municipal election, but they have no power over the politically-appointed Commissioner.

Members of council and citizens have enough problems and expense in dealing with appeals to the Ontario Municipal Board who has complete control to rule on local planning issues, usually against the municipality and in favour of the developer.

It has been pointed out that the proposed legislation

would be a competing statute to the Municipal Act for conducting council meetings and for challenging council decisions.

There is no doubt that improvements must be made to clarify and to strengthen the current legislation dealing with council business being carried out in camera or behind closed doors and Aurora Council is just as guilty as other municipalities in getting around the legislation.

Back in 1983 as a result of many citizen and media complaints about public business being discussed behind closed doors, the province established a provincial/municipal committee to study the whole issue of open and closed meetings and access to information, and I was appointed committee co-chairman.

After a year of study, the committee recommended that all council and committee meetings be open, except for certain clearly defined issues which could be discussed in private, such as personnel, contract negotiations and pending litigation.

The report was met with hostile opposition from several municipalities resulting in the province shelving it.

Conditions didn't improve and finally in January, 1995, the Municipal Act was amended to require all council and committee meetings to be open to the public, unless the meeting met certain criteria.

In spite of the legislation, there hasn't been much improvement as the terms legal, personnel and finance cover almost any item if council deems it so.

Even then a report is supposed to come back to open council, which seldom happens.

The public is still waiting to hear the reasons why council decided to cancel the pre-grading contract for the seniors' centre which had been approved in open session and award it to another contractor at an increase of \$73,000 behind closed doors and with no public report.

Or why the town treasurer disappeared leaving the town without a treasurer for more than six months without an explanation

Just a couple of items for which the public has a right to know and there are many more.

# Nordic walking is offered in Aurora

Although it may not be obvious by my physical appearance, I value getting exercise every day as a way to keep me energized for many of the long days...and nights, demanded in the role of being mayor for the Town of Aurora.

Every morning, I head to my health club to participate in various activities before heading to work.

They include yoga two days a week, general fitness in the gym one day a week, tennis every Sunday and walking four miles two days a week.

I have to tell you that I appreciate the supportive comments by a number of residents who either see us through a window or wave while driving to work while we are walking our route!

A number of weeks ago, our walking group was asked by Gerry Faderbauer, a former World Champion Olympic rower and personal fitness trainer at the Timberlane Athletic Club, if he could join us to demonstrate a Nordic walking technique.

I was a little skeptical about this technique but thought, what did I have to lose, especially if I involved the others in our walking group, to simply give it a try.

Nordic walking is a technique that is used as dry land training for cross country skiers.

This method of exercise uses specially designed poles to engage the upper body during fitness walking.

Researchers in sport medicine and other sport professionals are enthusiastically supporting the development of this new activity to Canada because of its upper body workout while walking.

And, for people like me, it burns significantly more calories than simply walking.

Some statistics when Nordic walking:

- the heart rate is approximately five to 17 beats per minute higher than regular walk ing.
- it can burn approximately 400 calories per hour compared with 280 calories per hour walking.
- it releases pain and muscle tension in the neck/shoulder area.
- it increases the lateral mobility of the neck and spine.
- it does not aggravate joints and knees.
- it reduces the load on knees and other joints.

This activity can be done throughout the year.

Normally our group stops walking when the snow flies as it is dangerous on portions of various roads.

With the reconstruction of Vandorf and the addition of a bicycle path and sidewalk, next year we will be able to walk where it is safe, to the Sheppard's Bush paths and continue all year.

This program has been touted as a perfect way to start a fitness program for people who wish to do so, who love the outdoors and don't want to do the tread mill machine regimen.

The actual activity is recommended to take place over a half hour to two-hour time frame depending on your fitness level and time availability.

The only equipment that you need to go from walking to Nordic walking is a set of easily adjustable poles which cost \$59.

I would recommend a session by a qualified trainer before going out the first time.

This is a sport that is unique to Aurora at this time and accessible to all. Gerry Faderbauer can be reached at Timberlane at 905-727-4252.



If the Conservative party dares to tell the people what they have in mind for medicare, they would be a washout.





### Yes. A thief may:

- Sift through your trash bins, looking for papers that have not been shredded.
- Hack into your computer and steal any information that is not guarded by a firewall.
- Steal your belongings, such as your purse, wallet or mail.
- Purchase your personal information from someone who has accessed it previously.
- Eavesdrop on conversations that you have in
- vourself over the phone Steal it from loan or credit applications or any forms that you may fill out at a hospital, bank,

- school...etc. Watch you type in your Personal Identification Number (PIN) when you buy something, then they steal your wallet.
- Be anyone, even your most trusted friend.

- Thieves may steal your debit card information from false debit machines, then proceed to make a second card from the information stolen. This allows the thief to steal money from your account.
- Thieves may use the information stolen from you to open new accounts under your name. They may also use your entire credit card limit and/or give out bogus cheques, leaving you, the victim, in debt.
- Thieves may steal your mail when a new spree.
- They may pose as telemarketers or people from your bank and con information out of you that will allow them to access your life.
- They may purchase new cars, houses, or various items that can range in cost.



- Protect your PIN. Memorize it and do not give it to
- Never choose an easy to guess PIN, such as your name or phone number.
- Never let your credit or debit card out of your sight.
- Only use debit when you feel safe and secure.
- Keep all your transaction slips.
- Know and check your daily limits regularly.
- Keep your personal information in a safe place at home. If your card jams in an ATM or ABM do NOT enter your PIN, contact the people who supply the machine and ask them to come immediately
- Always shred personal information. Never give out any personal information over the phone unless you have initiated the call.
- Never give out any personal information over the internet unless it is a secure site. (A secure site will show a locked lock or a key.)

### There was a time when students handled crossings

Every year, usually around budget time, newly elected councillors object to the thousands of dollars in the municipal budget to pay for school crossing guards.

They argue that as the school boards pay for school bussing, they should also be responsible for the cost of the crossing guards.

Recently Aurora Council, the question of who should be responsible for the crossing guards was introduced, but not within the context of a budget debate.

The Aurora Traffic Safety Advisory Board recommended that as of September, 2006, school crossing guards be removed during the noon hour at certain intersections and a letter be sent to all affected schools.

The intersections included Aurora Heights Drive and Haida Drive, Aurora Heights Drive and Crawford Rose Drive, McClellan Way and Tradewind Terrace, Orchard Heights Boulevard and Hill Drive and Stone Road and Crow's Nest Gate.

It was pointed out that the schools had implemented different lunch times resulting in the crossing guard being required to remain at the crossing for up to three hours and it was difficult attracting guards at some intersections as only a few children were

There is nothing specific in the Municipal Act that requires municipalities to provide school crossing guards, whereas the Education Act provides that a board may school pertaining to the welfare of students and exercise jurisdiction in respect thereof, so it appears clear where the responsibility should lie.

Back in the old days when Aurora had its own school board, it was argued there was only one taxpayer and it didn't make much difference who was responsible, but with the many changes in school funding in the past few years that no longer holds true.

But long before the question of who should pay for crossing guards was introduced, senior students were selected to handle school crossings and they were known as School Safety

The students were selected by the principal or teachers and were usually the top ranking students. A teacher was normally appointed as Patrol Supervisor.

Training of the safety patrol students in Aurora was carried out by the Aurora Police Department.

Members of the safety patrol were equipped with a white or orange belt and a badge, which identified patrol members to their schoolmates and to motorists.

Safety patrol members had no power to stop traffic. Their main functions were to hold the children back on the sidewalk or the edge of the road until there was a gap in the traffic so students could cross safely and to remind the children of the safety rules.

In 1969, there were 92 students serving as safety patrols from different schools in Aurora.

It was so successful that the Aurora Safety Council won a National Safety Award for the school patrol system.

Then in 1971 with the establishment of the York Regional Police Force the school safety program was discontinued. in spite Aurora Council's requests to restore the program.

At that time across Canada, the school patrol program was still active with 150,000 Grade 6, 7 and 8 students participating.

Transportation, the Ontario Safety League and the Canadian Home and School Association.

About the same time adult crossing guards were hired at major intersections with pay at that time of about \$15 per

At that time in the province only police officers had the authority to stop traffic, and in order for an adult crossing guard to have that right, the guard would have to be sworn in as a special police officer under the control of the police department.

Current legislation gives crossing guards that authority.

In October, 1984, when a school principal requested a second crossing guard at the school, Aurora Council asked the York Region Board of Education to consider a student safety patrol but no action was taken.

In February, 1985, council asked York Regional Police to establish a student safety patrol program similar to that operated by the Toronto Police. York Police officials replied that safety patrol was a municipal responsibility and offered to assist in the train-

Parents, especially in new subdivisions, attend council meetings to request, or in some cases demand action in providing a crossing guard. and council has to decide if one is warranted or not.



spending, more free votes in the House of Commons and same sex marriages.

She lost out to Harper in the leadership race but won the Conservative nomination to be a candidate in this riding defeating Lois Brown by 100 votes.

Ironically, Lois Brown will be Stronach's biggest challenge in January's election, as she attempts to fill the owned once Stronach.

Brown is a former constituency assistant to MPP Frank Klees and was a member of the Alliance Party before it merged with the Conservative Party.

At that time it looked like Stronach's Liberal opponent would be John Taylor, son of Newmarket Mayor Tom Taylor, a former federal Liberal candidate.

It appeared it would be a Stronach/Taylor battle in 1998 when Frank Stronach defeated Tom Taylor for the federal nomination for York Simcoe, but was defeated in the election by Tory John Cole.

However, in mid-March, 2004, John Taylor withdrew his name from the nomination race claiming the deepening sponsorship scandal surrounding government expenditures caused him to back away from federal politics.

Enter corporate lawyer Martha Hall-Findlay who received the nomination to represent the riding for the Liberal Party.

Also nominated were Ed Chudak for the NDP, Dorian Baxter for the Progressive Conservative Loyalists and Daryl Wyatt for the Green party.

When the votes were counted in the June 28, 2004, election Stronach was the winner with 21,818 with Hall-Findlay close behind at

Following the election, Stronach was named a member of the Party's senior leadership team and official opposition critic for international trade.

In 2001, the National Post identified her as the most important businesswoman in Canada and in the same year the World Economic Forum named her a Global Leader of Tomorrow.

In 2002, she was ranked by Fortune magazine on its list of the most powerful women in business and in 2004 Time magazine ranked her as one of the world's most influential people.

In October, 2004, as critic for the Conservative Party she was critical of the Martin government for what she claimed was inadequate handling of

the trade portfolio.

However, in May, she shocked the people in her riding, the party and Canadians generally by accepting Paul Martin's invitation and a cabinet post to cross the floor to join the Liberal Party.

The chain of events started the week before when she was summoned by Harper to explain her comments to the media warning against triggering an election over a budget that promised critical infrastructure funds to her riding.

She made it clear she was uncomfortable with the direction Harper was taking

Her act in crossing the floor to the Liberals was received with mixed messages, as she was praised by some and vilified by oth-

For this election, Lois Brown has been nominated to represent the Conservatives, Ed Chudak, the NDP, and it is believed Dorion Baxter will represent the Tory Loyalists in the battle against Stronach.

The major question is Stronach will whether be punished by loyal Conservatives who feel jilted by her defection.

Liberal organizers are counting on the Stronach name and the family's extensive corporate and community ties in the riding.

The president of the Newmarket Aurora Conservative Riding Association says the election will be a referendum on what Belinda did and their battle cry is "Bring Down

Belinda".

Members of the federal Conservatives have compiled a hit list of more than 20 key ridings in Ontario and Atlantic Canada they believe they can win from the Liberals in an effort to form a

government January 23rd.

The Newmarket-Aurora riding is not on the list, as it is reported Conservative strategists do not believe they can unseat Human Resources Minister Belinda



uses are considered to fall within the Transportation, Infrastructure and Utilities of the official plan and the proposed variance conforms to the general intent and purposes of the official plan.

Planning staff asked that if the variance was granted the applicant enter into a site plan agreement with the town prior to the installation of the turbines and that they have a minimum setback of 50 metres from any property line.

The Committee of Adjustment provided conditional approval to the minor variance which resulted in the residents launching an appeal to the Ontario Municipal Board with a one

day hearing scheduled for January 11.

Normally reports on appeals to the OMB pertaining to minor variance applications are not reported to council but due to the high degree of public interest, staff brought the issue to last week's general committee meeting.

Several residents were in attendance and made presentations using much the same arguments as presented at the Committee of Adjustment.

One resident expressed concern about the negative impact of the towers on their properties and supported an environmental assessment

prior to approval.

She asked for council to support the residents' position at the OMB.

Councillor Damir Vrancic pointed out that for council to lend support would be contrary to the town staff's opinion and would entail the engagement of outside legal and planning experts.

Tom Cleland, representing Aurora Cable Internet, claimed opposition to the towers had been blown out of proportion and the Committee of Adjustment had consented to the application with conditions.

Councillor Ron Wallace pointed out that the residents had appealed to the OMB, a

date had been set, so council should stay out of it.

Vrancic said that while he was sympathetic to the residents it would be necessary to engage outside professionals to represent the town and he was not prepared to do that.

He said the residents have

a right to appeal but he said the decision was up to the OMB, not council.

After further discussion the committee adopted the Wallace motion not to take a position and to leave the



When the store changed hands, most of the photographs were placed in storage.

### Poster contest honours Aurora boy

The memory of 10-year-old Ryan Doige of Aurora was honoured during Organ Donor Awareness Week in April, 2000, with a poster and book cover contest organized by his parents and liver transplant recipient Sandra Holdsworth.

Ryan was a Grade 4 student at Highview Public School in Aurora when he died suddenly in May, 1997, and seven people received the gift of life through the donation of Ryan's organs.

Prior to his death, Ryan had seen his father, Dale Doige, fill out an organ donor card and asked what he was doing.

He was so impressed that he began a campaign for organ donations by asking others to sign an organ donor

A few weeks later, when Ryan was declared brain dead, his parents gave permission to donate his organs as they knew of his wishes.

They have since initiated an organ donor awareness program, Ryan's Hope, in memory of their son.

#### **DEALS THAT NEVER HAPPENED**

In August, 1979, it was believed a trio of business deals would result in renewed industrial growth for Aurora meaning more jobs and a scaled down townhouse project for the former Sisman Shoe property on Mosley Street.

Post Paper Box Limited submitted an offer to purchase the three-storey Mosley Street building which would allow the company to expand from its 8,000 square foot location on Edward Street to 24,000 square feet in the new facility.

Sisman President Ted Rowe said his proposed townhouse development for the area, which went to the Ontario Municipal Board when neighbouring Attridge Lumber appealed, could still proceed with 22 townhouses on the north end of the 1.2 acre property.

The proposed sale also affected Excel Metalcraft on Edward Street which would allow them to expand by taking over the Post Box property, but it was all a dream as it never came to be.

#### **AURORA'S FIGHTING COUNCIL**

The current Aurora Council is not the only one that has had bitter disputes over issues as previous councils had hot debates at times

The big difference is that in former councils, once the vote was taken, the decision was made and everyone lived with

In April, 1970, a usually routine issue erupted into a furious debate as council voted down a proposal to shift Councillor Pete Miller from the Police Committee to the new Parks Development Committee.

Council's Striking Committee of Mayor Dick Illingworth, Reeve Evelyn Buck and Deputy Reeve Bill Trent recommended that Councillor Norm Stewart replace Councillor Miller on the Police Committee.

When put to a vote, the mayor and the reeve were the only members to vote in favour of the report.

Some members of council wanted to make the appointments there and then, but according to the procedural bylaw, the issue was referred back to the Striking Committee.

Reeve Buck said one of the problems of dealing with appointments in public session was that it was difficult to discuss them without getting into personalities.

The personality implied in the debate was that of Councillor Miller, a former policeman, whose committee reports repeatedly appeared in favour of the police and often encountered rough sailing in council.

Councillor Illtyd Harris stressed the need for appointment of the parks committee and moved that it be made that night.

His motion was ruled out of order and he appealed the chairman's decision and a debate erupted even though it was improper under the rules of procedure.

The vote was 4-4 resulting in the loss of the Harris motion by a tie vote. Not much has changed!

#### THE INTERACT CLUB OF AURORA

In Mav. 1994, thanks to the Aurora Rotary Club, Aurora teenagers had a club they could call their own.

It was the Interact Club of Aurora, which was committed to good citizenship.

Under the auspices of Rotary International, there were 6,997 Interact Clubs worldwide with more than 154,000 members, aged 14 to 18, in 88 countries.

The 40 members of the Aurora Interact Club were active in canvassing for the Red Shield Appeal and helped Rotary members raise \$3,500 for the Salvation Army.

Members also visited seniors to assist in any way they could.

The idea of setting up the youth organization in Aurora by the Aurora Rotary Club started in 1991 but it was difficult to organize as it was not part of the school system.

The Aurora Rotary Club also sponsored the Probus Club of Aurora for retired or semi-retired professional or businessmen and women in 1995.



### Animal control studied

In November that year three proposals to provide animal control services were received and the contract was awarded to Kennel Inn.

That contract has been renewed without complaint until June, 2004, when representatives of the Aurora Residents Pet Care Association came to council to oppose a oneyear extension of the Kennel Inn contract.

It was also noted that the Ministry of Agriculture and Food had given Kennel Inn a passing grade over the entire time it has provided service.

Council received the presentation and re-confirmed its previous decision to extend the contract for one year.

At the same time, it directed staff to pursue the option of a joint venture with neighbouring municipalities for a municipally operated animal service control pound.

When the contract expired in June, council approved a month to month agreement pending the Request for Proposals and associated review by

the Ad Hoc Committee. The Ad Hoc Committee

performed an extensive search into all possible options and visited a number of shelters in various municipalities.

The committee reviewed several proposals including a joint municipal facility; contracted service with Kennel Inn; construction and operation of a Town of Aurora animal shelter; contracted service with Georgina; and a partnership with other municipalities to construct a new shelter.

The committee also studied the merits of a public/private partnership.

Last week, staff recommended a service agreement with Georgina until a final decision was made.

Mayor Tim Jones recommended entering into a service agreement with Georgina for the provision of animal shelter services and with Wayne Jones Animal Control Services for the provision of animal enforcement at a total cost of \$153,490.

His motion also included that staff bring back a recommending amendments to the Animal Control Bylaw for an adjustment in licensing fees and that staff continue to review options with other municipalities and

with Kennel Inn.

contract The Georgina would be a year but a longer term was desired.

Councillor Evelyn Buck said she couldn't support the recommendation as Kennel Inn had provided a lengthy service to Aurora and while she had heard rumours about Kennel Inn, no proof had been provid-

She expressed concern about the small facility at Georgina and the long distance Aurora residents would have to travel to reclaim their pets, with seniors having a lack of transportation.

She added that Kennel Inn should have a right to defend itself.

Councillor Ron Wallace also remarked on the long service Kennel Inn had provided to the municipality and that it had met all regulations and he wanted to hear from Kennel Inn as to their future plans.

After further discussion the motion was lost on a 4-4 vote with Councillor Nigel Kean absent from the meeting.

A subsequent motion to refer further discussion to general committee meeting in January was adopted.
