Bikers not wrecking woodlot, rider says

Much has been written recently, pro and con, about the bike trails and jumps in the town-owned Case Woodlot south of Henderson Drive.

Daniel Willcock, one of the teenage bikers, last week appeared before council accompanied by several other teenagers to speak about the bike jumps, problems experienced and possible solutions.

He said they were not responsible for cutting down trees, setting fires or leaving beer bottles, but were having fun making jumps and riding.

He said they had been doing it for five years and there had been no complaints.

He added that he realized there was a liability issue and suggested bikers be registered and sign a waiver form and for the town to post signs "Use at Your Own Risk".

He asked the town to designate a spot in the woodlot for bikers.

In response to questions, he said he was representing about 100 bikers that used Case Woodlot and sometimes Sheppard's Bush.

In a report to council, town staff pointed out that BMX cycling was occurring in many areas throughout the municipality and the courses were most often makeshift.

Solution may occur in August

What to do with the Library Square has been discussed for years and council seems to be no closer to resolution than when talks first started.

It seemed a decision had been made when the general committee defeated a motion on a 6-3 vote to demolish the former library and seniors centre to create 67 parking spaces.

A subsequent motion to demolish the former seniors' centre to create 15 parking spaces was adopted.

But when the committee report came to council the debate restarted.

A motion was introduced to

demolish both buildings and it was defeated on the same 6-3 vote.

A subsequent motion not to demolish either building and for staff to prepare a list of issues raised at previous meetings was adopted.

Staff prepared a list of 30 items including parking issues, needs of community groups, vision of the square, rejuvenation of the downtown core, master plan for the area, general downtown core study, overall parking study and long term planning for the Church Street School.

Due to the lateness of the hour, council agreed to defer discussion of the list until the August meeting.

Strategic Plan finally updated

Aurora's first Strategic Plan was undertaken in January, 1993, adopted later that year and it has been controversial ever since.

It was updated in 1998 to lead the way into the new century and it has been updated again.

In January, 2004, it was agreed to update the plan including public consultation so as to reflect the views of the broader community, but councillors couldn't agree on a consultant and the review was deferred until council was in a better mood.

A year later, council endorsed a

staff recommendation that the consulting firm of DPRA Canada be engaged to review, develop and update the plan.

After public meetings, meetings with stakeholders and other residents, Joe Pittari of DPRA Canada submitted the final report "Shaping Aurora's Future" at last week's council meeting.

He pointed out that the 2006 updated plan emphasized the development of local assets, which capitalize upon the many strengths and opportunities in the area.

The strategic plan is an umbrel-

la document that provides guidance and direction for all the town's plans, programs and services.

He explained how the plan was developed, the consultation process, research findings, strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats.

The detailed strategic plan has five main components, a vision statement, goals, objectives, actions and implementation and performance measures.

He also listed the action steps,

Two defibrillators presented to town

It has taken a long time, but Aurora now has two automated external defibrillators courtesy of the

Mikey Network.

The Network was established by Heathwood Homes and the Heron Group of

Councillor responsible for Regency's Child Dr.

The man responsible for Child Drive in Aurora's Regency Acres has died.

Town of Aurora flags were lowered last week following the death of Alfred J. Child, a former Town of Aurora Councillor who served from 1955 to 1964 under Mayors Dr. E.J. Henderson and Keith Nisbet.

During his tenure as councillor, Child saw Aurora grow to a population of 10,000 and Sterling Drug open a new factory on Yonge Street.

As a result of that industry, Regency Acres, Aurora's second subdivision, was born and one of the major streets in that development was named after him.

Regency was built to accommodate the influx of people moving from Sterling's Windsor operation

to work in Aurora.

Following his retirement, Child was a member of the Rising Sun Lodge No. 129, Aurora, and continued his community involvement at Sandy Cove Acres in Innisfil, where he lived, by serving on several committees.

"The Town of Aurora staff are deeply saddened by the passing of this former councillor," said Aurora Mayor Tim Jones. "His contributions to the Town of Aurora in his municipal career are greatly appreciated."

"He was very proud to serve Aurora and very conscientious in his work," added his wife, Edna.

A private service was held at the Aurora Cemetery last Thursday.

Funeral arrangements were entrusted to the Paul F. Kent Funeral Home in Cookstown.

Companies in memory of a business partner.

The building company has previously built homes in Aurora.

Hugh Heron of the Mikey Network came to Aurora last week and prior to a council meeting at the Seniors' Centre presented the two defibrillators to the town, one of which will remain at the centre.

The other will be placed in the new Recreation Complex as requested by the donor.

The town also plans to install automated defibrillators in the Leisure Complex and the Community Centre.

It was in October, 2002, when officials from York Region Health Services demonstrated the equipment to Aurora Council and stressed the importance of its availability in public facilities.

It was pointed out that as many as 40,000 Canadians including 1,000 York Region residents die each year from sudden cardiac arrest, which might have been prevented if a defibrillator had been readily available.

Numerous alternatives suggested for building

Following the sale of Aurora Hydro to PowerStream, Inc. and PowerStream advising the town it no longer needed the hydro building on Industrial Parkway, council directed staff to explore a number of alternative uses for the facility.

Last week, Director of Leisure Services Allan Downey described the various components of the building and the surrounding property.

He pointed out that building and property had been leased to Aurora Hydro and later PowerStream at an annual rate of \$101,000 and the facility is in excellent repair and could be leased immediately for a short or long term.

The site is currently insured at a value of \$2,054,000 and assessed at a value of \$2,144,000 and council could sell it.

Council had previously identified the need for a new animal shelter that could service adjacent municipalities and the building could be converted into an animal shelter with extensive renovations and would produce revenue through the lease of the building to other municipalities.

Another option was to convert the building into a youth centre, but it would be necessary to consider the costs of operation.

Council has also expressed the need for community space and staff point out that the Hydro building presents a unique opportunity to address the present and future needs of the community as it is centrally located and could provide a number of alternative uses.

Staff presented a detailed plan of suggested uses for the building including the transfer of the Parks Department and carpenter from the Works building to free up much needed space for that department.

It was also proposed to move the fitness centre to the former hydro facility.

That move would free up space at the Leisure Complex for a Youth Centre in partnership with the Boys and Girls Club, Aurora Skating Club and town programs.

Councillor Nigel Kean said that while it was an excellent presentation there was a lot of missing information such as an independent appraisal as to the value of the building if sold and the cost of renovations to the various components if

council approved the suggested use.

He suggested the presentation was a wish list and asked where the money was coming from.

Councillor Evelyn Buck said the building was an important asset and the town lost considerable revenue through loss of interest on the loan to Aurora Hydro, the annual rent, and the loss of 34 jobs.

She stressed the need for a fiscal impact study especially with the need to build 400 residential units a year for the next

10 years to pay down the debenture on the recreational complex.

She said there was a need to lease the building to produce revenue and jobs while council took the time to make a decision in the best interests of the taxpayer.

Her motion to refer the item back to staff to lease was lost for lack of a seconder.

It was finally agreed to proceed to the next step and obtain a cost/benefit analysis including the cost of renovations.

Poor Richard

Town's sign bylaw exemptions are rubber-stamped

*Aurora has a sign bylaw,
Which is seldom enforced;
Why is a bylaw necessary
When all requests are endorsed?
- Poor Richard's Scrapbook*

Aurora's sign bylaw has created more problems for council over the years than possibly any other bylaw enacted by council. No matter what they do they are caught between the demands of businesspeople who want signs to advertise their businesses and citizens who complain about visual pollution.

At one time every application for an exemption to the sign bylaw was given very careful consideration and in a few cases rejected.

More recently with the number of requests for an exemption, the staff report is rubber-stamped without comment or discussion.

The most recent example was a request from KTI Limited in an industrial park on Isaacson Crescent in the Bayview/St. John's area for a sign variance to permit an illuminated wall sign on the east wall in addition to an existing illuminated wall sign on the north wall.

Currently the sign bylaw stipulates that the number of wall signs per business premise be limited to one.

Staff recommended the request be approved and it was rubber-stamped without question or comment.

This was the most recent of a whole series of exemptions including the United Church in July, 2004, for an increase in size from a maximum four square metres to 5.9 square metres and at the same meeting an exemption was granted to Rogers Video at Dunning Avenue and Yonge Street.

Then in August, 2004, an exemption was made for the Canadian Tire store to increase the size of their signage and at the same meeting Home Depot was given permission to install a wall sign on each exterior building face.

In November, 2004, a similar variance was granted to the Loblaws Superstore on Bayview Avenue.

Then in March, 2006, council granted an exemption to Pizza Pizza on Bayview Avenue to install two illuminated signs having a total area larger than the one sign permitted under the sign bylaw.

The sign bylaw was adopted by council in 1992 and by 2004 due to the number of requests for variances to the bylaw, mainly from large commercial outlets council requested staff to review the bylaw in view of the changing conditions.

By November, 2004, staff reported they had reviewed sign bylaws from several municipalities as they related to shopping centres and wall signs.

Staff also reviewed the various requests for variances granted by council to determine if they would be covered by the proposed changes.

In addition, staff proposed some minor housekeeping items to tidy up the bylaw.

With assurances that the proposed revised bylaw would cover the majority of requests for variances, the general committee endorsed the report as presented and directed staff to prepare the enacting bylaw.

But council was not always willing to grant exemptions.

In January, 2003, Hakim Optical requested a variance to place the company logo, a pair of glasses, on the tower of the shopping complex on the south side of Murray Drive at Yonge Street, which was denied.

Later, the Winners store in the same plaza made a similar request and it was approved.

In June, 2005, the Sormeh Spa on Wellington Street East requested a variance to the sign bylaw, which staff did not recommend resulting in council rejecting the application.

With all the exemptions to the sign bylaw being requested and granted by council, the time has come for a complete review of the bylaw to bring it up to date with current conditions.

Back in July, 1998, due to many complaints from merchants about the restrictive provisions of the sign bylaw, council established a joint council/Chamber of Commerce committee to review the sign bylaw and its enforcement.

The time has come to establish another joint committee to recommend changes to the bylaw or to scrap it altogether.

They're telling you that you fell off a ladder, but you vaguely remember falling out of a wheelbarrow.


You try to explain about the phone call, but all that comes out are moans and groans.



This isn't the first dysfunctional Aurora Council

The current Aurora Council has set a new record for unparliamentary conduct, flip-flopping on decisions, long meetings and lack of team spirit. It has been called dysfunctional.

But it's not the first council to suffer from infighting as in December, 1987, the council of the day was termed the most divisive in recent memory.

In his second year as mayor, John West found himself under constant attack on various issues from outspoken Councillor Evelyn Buck and later in the year from Councillor Richard Barker.

Councillors Buck and Barker frequently joined Councillors Norm Weller and Martin Paivio to vote in a block against many issues supported by Mayor West and his allies, Councillors George Timpson, Betty Pedersen, Tim Jones and Herb McKenzie.

The major issue of the year for council was the decision to build a new town hall to accommodate the town's growing staff.

In April, the York Region Board of Education had signed a controversial agreement to take over the town's portion of their joint administrative building on Wellington Street West, forcing the town to lease space on Industrial Parkway.

Citizens expressed concerns about the town selling its former accommodation to the school board for \$1.5 million, then spending money to rent accommodation for what could be two or three years.

Aurora then selected the town-owned Jack Woods farm house and surrounding property as the site of the new town hall, but later flip-flopped after complaints about the site's proximity to the industrial park and the demand to keep the town hall downtown.

The town identified 14 potential sites and engaged an architect to review the sites and evaluate them on their merits without consideration of land acquisition costs or legal difficulties so that at year's end no decision had been made.

Council did agree to build an addition to the Edward Street fire hall, an addition to the Scanlon Court Public Works building to accommodate the Parks

Department as it moved out of the former Victoria Street fire hall so that it could be converted into a seniors' centre.

Then there was the ongoing battle between council and the Aurora Cemetery Company which ended when the Cemetery Board washed its hands of any responsibility over the planned expansion of the cemetery.

Council made plans to appoint another Cemetery Board to manage the expansion when the cemetery became full.

Staff changes were frequent during that year with Fred Horvath resigning in June as Leisure Services Director and there was a heated debate at council as to whether the position was really necessary.

Kelly Cerswell resigned as treasurer to take the same post with York Region. The town hired its first personnel director, Nancy Voss, and selected Art Meeke as purchasing officer.

After previously disbanding its controversial Business Improvement Area, council voted to cancel its Main Street Canada

program and establish a new business committee chaired by Councillor McKenzie and to hire a full-time coordinator the following year.

Ball diamonds were also a hot issue after a new diamond at the Our Lady of Grace Park was removed after neighbours complained it was too close to their homes.

Another complaint was received over the increased use of the Town Park diamond.

Councillor Buck waged a crusade against the Aurora Fire Department which led

to a ban on the consumption of alcohol at the fire hall and annual mandatory fitness tests for firefighters.

Council was regularly visited by new residents angry with incomplete work

by subdivision developers resulting in council withholding building permits for violations of their agreements with the town.

That was Aurora Council in 1987.



ramps and jumps built from anything that could be found.

Staff presented nine

Rec vehicle in driveway causes woe

If Angelo Sciaraffa gets his way, the town will change its bylaw to allow recreational vehicle owners to park vehicles in the driveway, at least during the summer months.

He appeared before council last week to request the change in the bylaw after a neighbour complained about his vehicle and he was required to move it to another location.

He showed photos to councillors.

He said he had asked the name of the person who had complained, but was refused the information due to privacy laws.

He pointed out several townspeople have recreational trailers and in a tour of the town he had counted 147 such vehicles in driveways.

He described the problems of having to store his vehicle, picking it up on Friday, using it for the weekend, and then having to store it again.

He pointed out that it is necessary to open up the sides of the box trailer to air it out and this could only be done at his residence.

He suggested that possibly a permit system could be introduced, which would produce revenue for the municipality.

Sciaraffa added that the few people who complain make it difficult for others and he sought relief from the bylaw.

After listening to his presentation, Councillor Nigel Kean suggested the recommendation be forwarded to the Bylaws Department for a report. Councillors agreed.

possible locations within the town that might be considered as suitable locations, but wanted to obtain direction from legal services on any liability issues.

It was noted that Case Woodlot was not listed as a possible location.

Director of Leisure Services Allan Downey said woodlots were not considered due to the environmental impact.

Councillor Nigel Kean suggested staff meet with biker representatives regarding the suggested locations and report back at the August council meeting.

Councillor Evelyn Buck objected claiming that the teens were not a biker's group but neighbourhood kids who should be able to play in their own neighbourhood.

She suggested they be left alone as their fun was spoiled when others tried to organize them.

Councillor Wendy Gaertner noted that the summer season would be almost over before the August 22 meeting and

asked whether the kids would be able to use Case Woodlot in the meantime.

She also pointed out that some of the proposed locations were quite isolated.

It was then suggested that council and bylaw enforcement officers turn a blind eye to the bikers until the report was presented to council in August, to which CAO John Rogers issued a caution about potential liability claims since council would be aware of possible dangers.

The mayor and town solicitor referred to a case in Brampton in which a claim was launched against the municipality because council was aware of the dangers and the court awarded the claimant \$6.3 million creating a crisis in the municipal insurance industry.

It was finally agreed to refer the report back for a report from Leisure Services as to the most suitable location after meeting with representatives from the bikers and from the Town Solicitor on liability issues.

Hydro bills

Aurora rejects request for \$\$

Newmarket wants money and Aurora won't give it to them.

A year ago March, Newmarket Council directed its staff to identify all expenses related to merger discussions incurred by the Town of Newmarket and Newmarket Hydro with Aurora and Aurora Hydro and to seek recovery from Aurora.

After more than a year of negotiations, Newmarket agreed to a merger of Aurora and Newmarket Hydro utilities and it was expected Aurora would follow suit.

Then without any advance notice and following a private session, Aurora Council announced the sale of Aurora Hydro to PowerStream, Inc.

That resulted in Newmarket accusing Aurora of negotiating in bad faith.

Discussions took place with Aurora officials regarding the outstanding invoice in the amount of \$39,859.49 and an invoice to Aurora Hydro from

Newmarket Hydro in the amount of \$96,715.68.

In February, Newmarket requested the outstanding issue be cleaned up.

The correspondence was never brought to

council's attention in open session, and following a private discussion last week, Aurora rejected the request.

The next move is now up to Newmarket Council.



time frame, and responsibility of the various goals and objectives.

He indicated that when council adopts the strategic plan update there would be further work in the development of performance measures based on the actions identified in the plan and requires a leader to ensure the actions are implemented.

It was also suggested that a Strategic Plan Implementation Committee be established to assist in gathering performance measurement data from departments, analyzing the information and providing reports.

Several questions for clarification were asked by councillors including one by Councillor Ron Wallace who asked what would happen to the town when it was fully built out with no more revenue from development charges.

Pittari replied that a limited land base had to be carefully balanced between residential and employment lands to be sustainable. He also pointed out that the provincial Places to Grow policy calls for more intensification.

Resident Klaus Wehrenberg also addressed council to

oppose the plan. He said the vision statement was "gobbley-gook" and was not inspiring.

He was also critical of the goals which he claimed placed the economy over the environment and they were not satisfactory as far as he was concerned.

He was also critical of the public consultation process as the meetings with stakeholders were held before the public sessions and more consultation was required especially regarding the town's trail system.

Councillor Evelyn Buck said the document was "too wordy and all over the place" and should be brief and to the point.

She added that in the past council had paid little attention to the plan in making decisions especially with regard to fiscal responsibility.

Other councillors said they didn't see the plan as vague and the action plan needed to be wordy.

In response to a comment about the vision statement, Pittari replied that the public preferred the one presented rather than a briefer one that was also discussed.

After further discussion the Strategic Plan as presented was finally adopted.

More townhouses coming to Aurora

At a recent public planning meeting, Aurora councillors approved in principle an application from MI (Magna International) Developments for 134 townhouses on 24.5 acres of land on Wellington Street East.

The approval is subject to the resolution of outstanding issues.

The lands are located on the north side of Wellington Street East, just near the town's pumping station and new fire hall.

Lands are currently vacant and are bisected by one of two small tributaries of the East Holland River.

These tributaries have been designated by the Ministry of Natural Resources as components of the provincially significant East Aurora Wetland Complex.

The development block is located to the south and east of the tributaries.

The proposed development is projected to facilitate population growth by 402 people.

The proposed road network comprises a single full turn movement onto Wellington Street East located near the eastern property line which connects to an internal ring road that services the residential lots.

York Region has advised that a second point will be approved for emergency access only near the western boundary.

The four townhouse blocks facing Wellington Street will have their garages facing the street to

the rear with a minimum of one parking space in the garage and two parking spaces in the driveway.

The remaining residential blocks on local roads will have attached garages with the same parking arrangements. In addition there will be 68 on-street parking spaces.

Klaus Wehrenberg questioned the parking options and suggested another option was to negotiate with Magna to obtain a strip of land at the southern boundary of the development to the south of Wellington Street for part of an east/west trail system.

Councillor Ron Wallace noted the many units facing Wellington Street and asked if noise preventive measures were considered due to the traffic on the street.

He was supported by Councillor Nigel Kean who added the noise factor was a major concern.

Director of Planning Sue Seibert replied there had been no suggestion of a noise berm for the development.

Councillor Kean said he couldn't support the cash in lieu option and the purchase of land adjacent to the recreation complex but supported the trail option as suggested by Wehrenberg.

With assurance from staff the various comments would be considered and council approved the application in principle subject to the resolution of outstanding issues.

History abounds at Caruso and Commport destinations

The first Doors Open Day took place in France more than 20 years ago, and the concept soon spread to neighbouring European countries.

In 2000, the first North American Doors Open was held in Toronto, and in 2002 the Ontario Heritage Trust launched Doors Open Ontario.

More than 45 communities are taking part in Doors Open Ontario 2006, and Aurora is one of them!

On display will be the town's culture, history and environment!

Join in Saturday, August 12, for free tours of Aurora's local landmarks and hidden heritage gems.

No tickets and no pre-registration are needed. Visitors choose their sites and tour at their own pace.

To give you an idea of what you can see, The Auroran will feature eight of the sites on a weekly basis.

Sixth in the series are two of Aurora's restored heritage buildings, Caruso's/Mary's Flower Shop, and Commport Communications.

CARUSO'S

Built in 1887, 15210 Yonge Street has been owned and occupied by the Caruso family and business since 1913. Beginning as a fruit and vegetable market, called Mary's Fruit Store, the building has also been home to a barber shop, lawyer's office, and shoe store.

When Mary's Flower Shop opened in the 1950s, these spaces were combined into one store.

Extensive restoration work in 1997 and 2004 created the store we are invited to peek behind-the-scenes on the Doors Open tour.

The building has also been a home to the Caruso family for decades, and the second storey apartment is still occupied by members of the Caruso family.

Ninety-three years after the opening of the original business, the third generation of Caruso's now operates Mary's Flower Shop, making it Aurora's oldest continually operated family business.

Before you enter Mary's Flower Shop from the Yonge Street entrance, notice the concrete patch on the sidewalk.

This is where coal for the original boiler was delivered into the basement.

While inside, take in the tin ceilings, which were installed in the 1930s along with electric light fixtures which are still in use today in the main store.

The wood floors are original to building.

The renovations in 1997 saw the rear portion of the main level store converted from living quarters to shop space.

The building is still using steam as a heat source with the original piping and cast iron radiators.

Feel free to walk down the stairs to the basement

and spot the original walk-in cooler door at the base of the stairs, which now leads to office space.

The crude stone and cement cistern located in the north basement area was once used in the preparation of vegetables for sale.

The south basement area is relatively unchanged from its original state.

The rear portion of lower level was originally a stable area for horses and over the years the original structure has been gradually modernized.

Today it is used as a floral design area, workshop, and shipping/receiving area.

Even regular patrons of Mary's Flower Shop should visit the shop on the Doors Open tour.

Take a rare behind-the-scenes tour of the floral design area, and identify the original and restored features of this living history site!

COMMPORT

Commport Communications International, Inc., completed reconstruction on their historical property at 3 Ross Street in 2004.

This electronic communications company, which offers business-to-business services to customers worldwide, has been operating in the Town of Aurora for more than 15 years.

Visit the home of Commport Communications on the Doors Open Aurora tour to learn about the extensive renovation of the original 1915 house.

The renovation was inspired by the history that surrounds it.

Adjacent to Aurora's historic GO Transit Station (also on the Doors Open Aurora tour), Commport Communications wished to pay tribute to this local landmark that has helped shape the town.

The design of 3 Ross Street incorporates a sensitively restored heritage building, with a new extension that is intended to reflect the architecture of the station.

Old meets new on the exterior of the Commport building with its pillars and peaked roofs.

Much of the original building was preserved, especially in the interior office spaces.

The original train station, constructed in 1853 and rebuilt on the east side of the tracks by 1885, was the first destination ever to be reached from Toronto.


Industries boomed with the increased access to Toronto and surrounding townships as the rail line gave long awaited relief from highly expensive and seasonally impossible travel on Yonge Street.

Aurora quickly became a hub of business and local culture and can credit the arrival of the rail line and station with much of its early growth and prosperity.

Come and tour the interior of this interesting heritage building and its sympathetic addition.

Notice original features remaining in the 1915 building, and learn about the extensive restoration and addition process.

Area once considered for a regional airport

Back in November, 1971, Aurora and Newmarket Councils were approached by Dr. Peter Levers, representing the York Regional Airport Association, for support in building an airport in the northern part of the region.

He pointed out that one possible site was between Aurora and Newmarket and the other was near Queensville. Approximately 150 acres would be required to build a 5,000-foot runway capable of handling business aircraft.

He added that the King City airport was too small and Buttonville provided service to the south part of the region and northern sections of Toronto.

An airport was needed in the north area of York Region to bring business and jobs and help the tourism industry.

He was hopeful that the region would contribute to the cost of the proposed airport and the association was researching what was required to seek federal and provincial funding.

But it was a dream that never materialized, since such a site was never constructed.

WHEN YONGE STREET WAS RENUMBERED

Prior to September, 1988, street numbers for Yonge Street in Aurora started at Wellington Street and properties were numbered as Yonge Street North or Yonge Street South and it was very easy to identify and find a location.

With the implementation of the 911 emergency system there was the potential danger of duplication for emergency services in not knowing if the Yonge Street address was in Thornhill, Richmond Hill, Newmarket or Aurora.

As a result the decision was made to adopt a uniform numbering system for Yonge Street starting at Lake Ontario, through Toronto into York Region resulting in some cases five-digit addresses and difficulty for the general public in determining where the property was located.

It was not a popular decision as it was necessary for many businesses and residents to assume additional costs in changing the address on their stationery, business cards, etc. and people had, and are still having difficulty finding addresses on Yonge Street.

Some time ago Councillor Ron Wallace conceived the idea of dividing the town into three heritage districts, so that in addition to the address, the district name would be included to narrow the area for searching, but so far no action has been taken.

The five-digit numbering may help the emergency services in finding the correct location, but it's tough for the average citizen.

AURORA NEEDS MORE POLICING

One of the more common complaints at Aurora Council is speeding on residential streets and rather than insisting on better police enforcement, council lowers speed limits, installs more stop signs and builds more speed humps.

It's not a new problem, as back in February, 1984, then Mayor Dick Illingworth threatened to return to a town police force unless Aurora received better police protection.

He said at the time that he was concerned about the safety of children and senior citizens and in his frequent trips around the municipality he seldom saw a York Regional Police cruiser on patrol.

He pointed out that when Aurora had its own police force, there were normally two cruisers on patrol and he requested York Regional Police to have at least one cruiser in the municipality 24 hours a day.

His request was rejected by the Regional Police Commission after a report by Chief Bruce Crawford said the demand for police services in the town was less than average.

Not much has changed, but the force has grown substantially.

AURORA COUNCIL IN 1968

* Long before the region was given the mandate of issuing debentures for its member municipalities, in November, 1968, Aurora Council agreed to issue debentures to raise \$2,950,000 to build a new secondary school on Wellington Street West for the Aurora and District High School Board.

* After a seven-month search for a recreation director, council decided they couldn't hire a qualified person at the salary the town was willing to pay, so they decided to hire a less qualified person as a recreation director assistant.

But council couldn't agree on the Parks and Recreation Committee's recommendation to hire the only applicant for the \$6,217 job.

A full scale argument developed in which councillors accused each other of making a political football out of

Residents would have Hillary as a neighbour

Some residents may have Aurora's most significant historical building as a neighbour if a small infill development, approved at a recent public planning meeting, becomes a reality.

The development would occur behind a large heritage home on Yonge Street, immediately south of the famous Hillary House.

The purpose of the application is to amend the zoning bylaw to permit the construction of a five-unit residential development to the rear of the existing dwelling.

The five units will face north towards Hillary House and would be more than 2,000 square feet in size.

The proposed sanitary system would connect the existing and proposed residential units north to the Hillary House property, subject to an agreement.

Town staff noted the manoeuvring space for the residential and visitor parking areas is 5.7 metres instead of the 7.4 metres required and there is insufficient space for a 1.5 buffer strip along the north property line.

It was also noted that a substantial amount of technical

information and supporting documentation was lacking for Public Works with respect to sanitary servicing and stormwater management, and comments from the Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority and York Central Fire Services had not been received.

The proposal is consistent with the intensification development provisions of the Provincial Policy Statement although further technical information is required through the site plan process.

Bruce Hall, a planner for the applicant, said there was a demand for the product in the downtown area and the heritage home, although not designated, would be retained as a residence.

In response to the staff comment about the lack of manoeuvring room on the driveway, he said the proposed 5.7 metres was adequate and that a privacy fence would be built along the northern boundary instead of the required buffer strip.

Helen Roberts, President of the Aurora Historical Society which owns Hillary House, said the Society Board approved

the project in principle subject to concerns about drainage and damage due to heavy construction equipment.

John McIntyre, owner of Horton Place to the south, said he supported the project in principle and was sure that agreement could be reached on outstanding issues.

He added the proposal was much better than a previous application for an apartment building which was out of scale for the area.

Gail Novak, representing residents of Irwin Avenue to the south and Machell Avenue to the west expressed concern about drainage and landscaping and asked that disposal of storm water be reviewed.

Councillor Nigel Kean rec-

ommended the proposal be approved in principle and brought back to another public meeting.

Concern was also expressed about traffic trying to make a left turn on Yonge Street to enter or exit the property and the inability of a fire truck to turn around on the property.

Councillor Evelyn Buck said there was no need for the proposal to come back to another public meeting and council should make it happen providing all the outstanding issues were resolved.

It was finally agreed that approval of the zoning bylaw amendment be subject to the comments received and subject to the review of at least the second site plan submission.

the Parks and Recreation Committee and the Community Centre Board.

* There was criticism of appointed citizen committee members making recommendations to council as councillors were the ones who had to answer to the taxpayer, but council finally agreed to meet with both groups before hiring a new assistant director.

* A contract was awarded to International Harvester in Newmarket for a new tractor for the Parks and Recreation Committee for \$3,111, the second lowest of the six bids received.

* And the town engineer, an architect and the Building Committee were directed to conduct a \$500 study of the Old Post Office and the vacant Church Street School before making a decision on the future of the buildings.


