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Town to close doors to celebrate holiday

Family Day will be celebrated in Aurora as a public holiday and business will cease at the Town Hall for the day.

The holiday was proclaimed into law in Ontario last December after Premier Dalton McGuinty promised it as Ontario's ninth annual statutory holiday during last fall's election campaign.

Family Day will be celebrated on the third Monday in February and this year it falls on Monday, Feb. 18.

There has been considerable criticism of the holiday by employers and cash-strapped municipalities and critics claim it was cooked up by the Liberals without any thought or planning in order to win votes.

Premier McGuinty admits there are some problems to be ironed out and says the government will find a way to iron out some of the wrinkles that develop as a result of the first Family Day.

Following a closed session prior to a special council meeting, Aurora Council announced that Feb. 18 would be a public holiday for all non-union staff.

In response to a ques-

tion regarding union staff, it was learned negotiations are under way regarding the labour contract and an announcement will be made in near future.

It was learned that the price tag for the day will be in the \$50,000 range and the only other issue to be

worked out is what happens in the event of a snow storm.

While production will cease for the day and the Town Hall closed for the day, it is believed that the mid-winter break will increase production in the long run.

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Poor Richard

Drive-thru rules must be made

*Urgent action is badly needed,
To stop the drive-thru curse;
A new town policy is a must,
Before the situation gets worse!*

- Poor Richard's Scrapbook

A recent letter to The Auroran by Jim Jackson referred to the three drive-thru coffee shops on Yonge Street between Dunning Avenue and Kennedy Street.

He expressed concern about traffic grinding to a halt on Yonge Street.

He also pointed out the littering problem caused by coffee cups thrown out of car windows, the late night hours and the noxious pollution emitted by the cars driving in and out of these centres and idling their cars as they wait for service. He questioned whether Aurora now has the highest per capital ratio of drive-thru coffee shops in Canada.

His letter brought back memories of the previous discussions at council regarding residents' complaints about the drive-thru at Yonge Street and Ransom Street and the problems with traffic flow and stacking at the drive-thru at Golf Links Drive and Yonge Street and the two drive-thru locations on John West Way at Wellington Street East.

There was considerable opposition by residents adjacent to the drive-thru in the commercial strip plaza at Bayview Avenue and Hollidge Boulevard.

After extensive consultation, a compromise of a 10-metre separation between the drive-thru and the residential area was approved.

I have a personal interest in the location of drive-thru facilities as I have one for a neighbour at Cousins Drive and Yonge Street.

In the absence of a town policy, I insisted on the same 10 metre separation as that granted the residents adjacent to the Bayview and Hollidge drive-thru.

I was under the impression there would be a 10 metre separation between the drive-thru line and the residential property line, but was disappointed to find out after construction started that the 10 metre separation was from the building to the property line, so that the drive-thru lane and the idling cars are much closer.

Currently, the town's official plan prohibits drive-thru restaurants in the historic core as they are not considered compatible with the pedestrian orientated setting.

It was suggested that this restriction be extended to include all of Yonge Street, but no action was taken at that time.

In June, 2007, a Public Planning Meeting was held to receive comments on drive-thru facilities and a draft proposal for an official plan and zoning bylaw amendments including location, appropriate distance separation requirements from residential properties, mitigation measures, design and stacking.

It was proposed that where a property in any zone that permits a drive-thru facility abuts a residential zone, a minimum of 30 metres shall separate all points of the drive-thru facility or stacking lanes.

There were no members of the public in attendance at the public meeting in support or opposition to the proposed amendments and staff advised that no comments had been received from the Chamber of Commerce or its members.

Maurice Luchich, representing Tim Horton's, told council members that a 30 metre separation would in effect be a prohibition and drive-thru facilities were in response to customer demand.

There was a difference among council members as to the proposed 30 metre separation with some claiming it was prohibitive and others arguing it was a necessity in residential areas.

Finally, a motion was adopted for staff to review prohibition on Yonge Street, the 30-metre setback and to request comments from the Chamber of Commerce and to continue to work with Tim Horton's.

At the November, 2007, meeting of the Economic Development Advisory Committee, members supported the proposed amendments, which were endorsed by the general committee, but there is no further action has been taken by council to expedite action.

The 30-metre separation in the Toronto bylaw followed a hearing by the Ontario Municipal Board which ruled that there was sufficient justification to provide for a minimum 30 metre separation.

So, let's get some action in Aurora.

To the editor,

A farmers' market is where you go to ask the seller/grower/maker about what you're buying, where you make your conscientious purchasing decisions, where you exercise your environmental muscle.

I would rather buy my food from local growers

than Sobey's or Superstore, but if I have to create a carbon footprint an inch deep to get to the nearest market, I will NOT shop for local produce.

(Stouffville, Uxbridge, and Barrie are the nearest farmers' markets I've heard about and/or shopped; Peterborough's and St. Catharines' historical and

giant markets are at the outer limit of "local" by the "100-mile Diet" standard, but I've visited them upon occasion while visiting friends in the area, and was stricken with awe at their size and ant-like busyness.)

Local growers have a very difficult time getting their stuff in big chain gro-

ceries, which is all we have left in Aurora - our climate does not let them be steady, year-round suppliers.

I thought the local government was supposed to govern the people, break even, and support the wishes of the community as a whole, not solely look to turn a profit for itself.

From a vendor, however, with a "vested interest" in retaining the farmers' market in Aurora.

Note that if the market fees go up too much, it will present a barrier to any micro-businesses in the area, struggling to gain a physical presence for their often unique and ingenious merchandise.

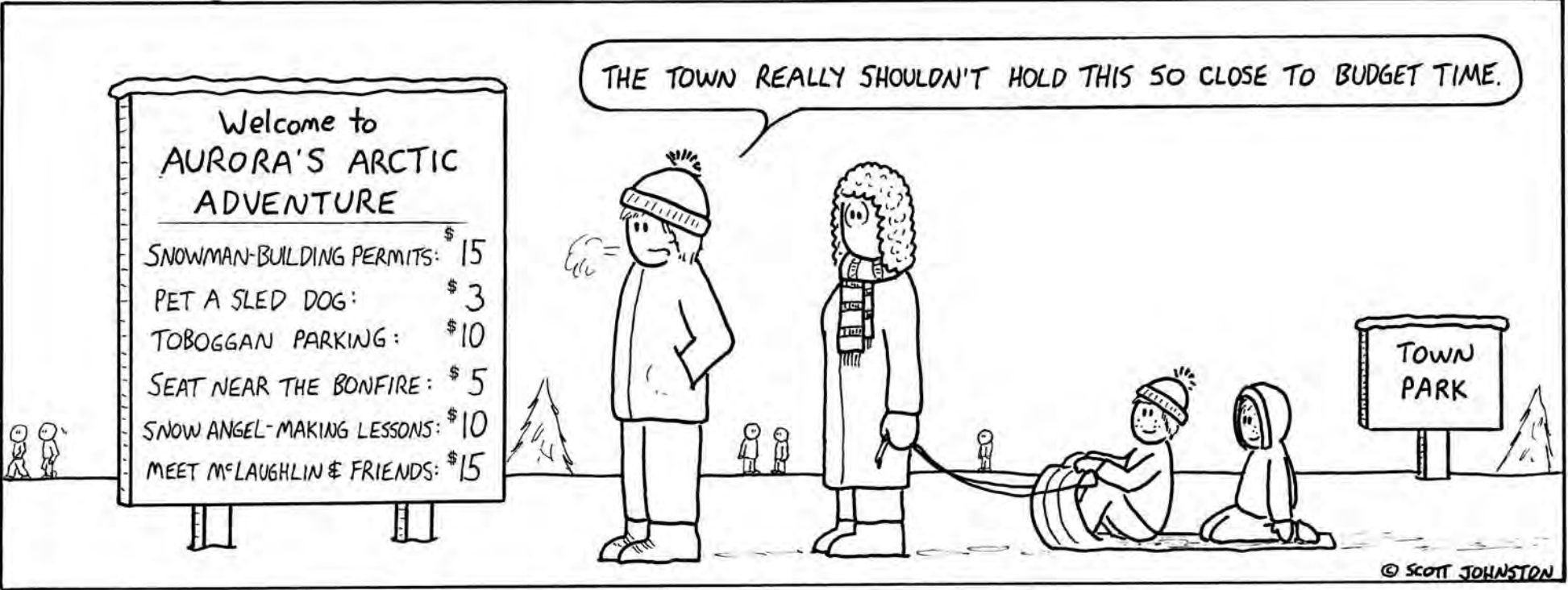

Front Porch Perspective

It is extremely important that we preserve and protect our local institutions and our heritage.

It is equally important that we both honour and remember those who have gone before us.

And in many cases this has been done in Aurora.

Through areas like Sheppard's Bush and the McKenzie Marsh we have sought to protect our green spaces.

By designating some of this town's oldest homes as "heritage houses" we have sought to preserve our history.

We have also tried to remember those who have gone before us.

Probably most every school in Aurora does something to commemorate Remembrance Day and any idea, be it display cases, or slide shows, or plays, or bringing in Veterans to address the students, is a tremendous way of engaging students by trying to bring history to life.

Every modest step that we take - like giving the cenotaph's two edifices much-needed face-lifts last summer and also keeping the area clean of garbage - shows that, collectively, we care.

I add another small suggestion to honour our past.

It is one that the young children of our community, the Aurora Historical Society and Town Hall may be able to get behind.

It's about street signs. Street signs?

Yes, street signs.

We all live on streets that are named, for the most part, for either a particular individual or for some special event.

But I'll bet that most of us don't know the reason why our own street was named the way it is.

Or even if we did, what happens in 50 years when new people are living on the street?

I submit that it would be a good idea to affix a small sign on top of these signs signifying who the person or event was.

I'm not sure about how this would square with current municipal bylaws but this has been done elsewhere.

Look at downtown Toronto; there are small signs that sit on top of the street signs signifying the fashion district, little Italy and, if memory serves, the Greek culture of the Danforth.

We could do the same here.

For instance, Timpson Drive is named after a friend of mine, George Timpson, who was, until he moved away a short time ago, a long time resident of Aurora. The sign could say - "Aurora Councillor from 1973-76, 1986-94, 2001-03; Mayor of Aurora 1977-1982".

Or how about the following for the Chadburn Crescent street sign named after Aurora's Lloyd Chadburn: "WWII Fighter Ace - 14 enemy airplanes destroyed - DSO, DFC, CdeG avec Palme, Legion d'Honneur".

With such a small sign in place, every time we would

walk past these streets we would be reminded of their particular accomplishment.

This is where the kids' participation comes in.

I think this would be a great project for the little tykes to learn something about Aurora and the folks who contributed to making this the great place it is to live. In fact I kindly challenge the elementary schools in town to take this project on.

I don't think such a project would be that big of an undertaking. Just start with a few streets every year.

The Grade 2 or Grade 3 children could team up in pairs and prepare a small research project on a street name and then present their findings to their classmates.

Then copy the presentation and go around to the homes on the street and solicit say \$1 or \$2 from each household as a contribution to the sign.

Some business in town could sponsor the project and make the signs at a reasonable cost.

The Town hall types could ensure that all the signs look nice and are based on the same template while the Aurora Historical Society and the teachers could ensure that the brief facts on the signs are right.

Then the individuals living on the street could have a little ceremony - or what have you - and affix the sign above the respective street sign.

This is a small and simple way of bringing history to life and remembering our past.

My father was (and still is) a supporter of the Conservative Party, and said he would not have gone to see Mr. Pearson.

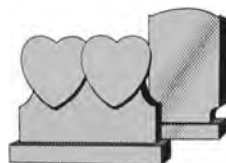

Baby Talk – Part I

So you just found out you're pregnant. Congratulations! That is wonderful! What is even more amazing is that your baby already has a spine, most of the body organs, arms and legs are beginning to form, and it has its own nervous system. And, it's only 5 weeks old! Miraculous! In order for your baby to develop normally, it has two basic needs: One is proper nutrition and the other is a normal operating nervous system.

Let's cover nutrition first.

At the risk of insulting my readers, some people operate under the impression that as long as they are

not hungry, they eat well. Not true! As a mom, you must be aware of the fact that everything you eat and drink affects your baby. Everything! Generally the baby will take from the mother whatever it needs in terms of nutrition and I have met many mothers in my practice who are literally undernourished as a result. As a mom, you must remember that you are eating for two. Simply "filling up" is not the answer. Your baby has very specific needs as it is growing and developing. Its rate of growth is seven times faster than its three-year-old brother. Much like feeding a baby elephant some may say! The baby will take as much as it can

from mom so it is important that mother provides proper fuel for all that rapid growth. So the following are essential for normal development of your baby:

1. Iron. Mom requires at least 800 mg daily. This is crucial for the development of red blood cells in your baby and is contained in most dark leafy veggies. If you must, you can obtain a liquid iron supplement from a health food store. The nicest way of getting iron is from a tablespoon of dark molasses in a glass of milk three times a day. What a way to treat your baby! Taking Vitamin C will help in the absorption of Iron from your digestive tract.

2. Folic Acid. This is very important in the normal development of the nervous system and cannot be omitted. You are lucky though, Folic Acid is contained in most foods which contain iron so it's a cinch to get. If you really want to get fancy, oysters are loaded with Folic Acid. They are also a known aphrodisiac and that may be why you are reading this, but that is

another topic!

3. Calcium. Our friend! Mom and baby need at least 1200 mg daily. The molasses treat is a good way, or you may try raw almonds if you are not into dairy. Vitamin D helps in the absorption of Calcium from the digestive tract. This can be tricky because Vitamin D can also cause nausea and "morning sickness". I have found that the easiest way of getting Vitamin D is from a careful suntan. Even in the winter you can get adequate sun exposure from regular short walks. It is not necessary to be golden brown, but getting some regular sun is critical.

I would also like to caution moms on taking Vitamin B6 when pregnant. It tends to reduce the amount of breast milk available for feeding; not a good thing! I'll continue in two weeks. See you then!

What if you could get it by actually charging someone \$3-\$5 to come out every Saturday morning by 7.30 a.m., set up a stall, pack up and carry in truckload(s) of goods, put up a tent in rain, wind or shine, move around heavy picnic tables and decorate a parking lot.

You can charge them \$3 to do all of this!

What a bargain...hmm, there's more - they also give you 3-5 hours of their day to 'be there' and create a 'market'.

How much do you think it would cost to have a Jazz Duo or Trio in your back yard for two or three hours on a Saturday?

The usual cost is about \$150 per musician per hour - do the math.

The Town of Aurora got that and more this summer for free on at least 12 Saturdays.

How many musicians do you think might like to get up at 7 or 8 a.m. after doing a gig until 3 a.m. the night before

and then not get paid?

Is there any real value here...think about it. Perhaps no one in the Town appreciates a little laid back live jazz at a market setting.

How much would any of you charge to haul goods from your home to an uncovered parking lot, hidden behind buildings early every Saturday, often freezing, melting or being buffeted by the wind without shelter for three to five hours?

You might sell stuff and you might not.

You made a commitment to be part of a market so, rain or shine, you show up and 'create' a market.

People might attend and they might not. It's the curiosity of all outdoor markets around this world.

Most communities love them and help them grow large because they represent a community spirit one cannot share in a Big-box store or even in a strip plaza. It is the essence of a 'market' that makes it important in the community.

A watering hole for all to come out and meet and greet one another on a weekly basis and catch up on each other's lives.

No one stops the other stores and vendors in the area of the market from joining in!

A market like this is a community-based effort: meaning of the community, for the com-

munity, largely done by the community. It is a good thing - not a cash cow or prized pig.

How much is it worth to bring a community together over a coffee in the summer to enjoy our town?

Do we have to travel to Newmarket or Toronto to experience this?

2008 budget still not settled

cent increase.

A second draft showed a six per cent increase.

As council had given direction that the increase in the operating budget was not to be beyond 3.5 per cent and the capital budget was to remain at the 2007 level, staff proposed several changes to achieve that target.

Proposed changes included increasing the revenue from supplementary taxes to the operating budget to \$350,000 and decreasing the rate of weaning off the town's dependence on Hydro

funds from \$220,000 to \$100,000 per year.

Staff also recommended several departmental savings.

With the proposed changes adopted the tax increase would decrease from six to 3.4 per cent and when blended with an assumed regional increase of 4.25 per cent and a zero education tax rate the tax increase is 2.65 per cent.

However, until the budgets are adopted the dollar increase for average assessed home cannot be estimated.

It was pointed out that all the capital projects

identified to 2011 total \$102 million and with reserve funds totalling \$60 million, there is about a \$42 million shortfall, which would create a burden for future taxpayers.

As a result Councillor Grace Marsh proposed that approximately \$460,000, equivalent to a two per cent tax increase be added to the town's portion of the tax bill making the town portion 5.46 per cent for a blended rate of 3.22, which was adopted on a 5-4 vote.

Several of the staff recommendations were adopted and others were

sent back for more information to be presented at the next budget meeting.

Taxpayers are going to have to wait awhile yet before they know what living in Aurora will cost them in 2008.

In 2009, it is predicted taxpayers will face an increase of around 11 per cent.

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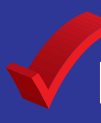


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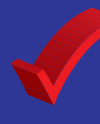

Stuck with laneway maintenance

In December, 1996, council of the day discussed the issue of private versus public ownership in regard to the rear yard laneways in a Bayview-Wellington development in terms of ongoing maintenance and capital replacement.

Various options were discussed including making the laneways private, accepting as public, accepting as public with a surcharge, or a one-time cash payment.

The developer pointed out that leaving the laneways private affected the sale of the homes.

Staff recommended a one-time cash payment as the preferred option but this was defeated by council on a 5-3 vote.

As a result council assumed the rear laneways to maintain at pubic expense.

YONGE/WELLINGTON INTERSECTION

Once again Aurora Council is requesting a study in hopes of improving the traffic flow through the Yonge/Wellington intersection.

The mayor has requested copies of everything that has been done and what has been suggested to be done to improve the intersection.

In April, 1998, following a three-month experimental ban of motorists making left-hand turns from Yonge Street on to Wellington Street during rush hour, the ban was lifted.

Council had tried prohibiting the left turns in an attempt to reduce bottlenecks at the intersection.

Even though proper signage had been erected many drivers neglected the signs but even with the high non-compliance rate, it was reported that through traffic had improved by 35 per cent.

Regional traffic engineers recommended that the left-turn restriction remain in effect.

Aurora councillors voted to return to the status quo following expiry of the experiment and convene a public meeting for further discussion.

THE BLOOMINGTON LANDFILL SITE

The landfill operation on the north side of Bloomington

Road between Bayview Avenue and Leslie Street has been a problem for Aurora Council and adjacent residents since the early 1990s.

In early 2003, the landowner sued the town for \$5.8 million claiming municipal officials abused their authority and interfered with his ability to carry on his business.

The landfill site became inactive and in 2004 an application was received for a permit for the dumping of fill and alteration of grades on the site.

In July, 2004, the applicant launched an appeal to the Ontario Municipal Board on the basis that the municipality failed to make a decision on the application with the 45 day limit.

Council authorized staff to retain outside counsel and experts to represent the town before the OMB in support of the town's position.

Later the town solicitor reported that the OMB hearing which had been scheduled to start in May, 2005, had been adjourned indefinitely until such time as the court proceedings had either been heard and judgment rendered or otherwise disposed of.

At the November, 2007, council meeting Councillor Evelina MacEachern asked when staff would be providing a report on the landfill operation with the town solicitor replying the report should be presented within two weeks.

With the town solicitor moving on to another position will there be a report or will it be necessary to go back to square one when a new solicitor takes over? Answers please.

WHAT HAPPENED?

Last August, there was an article in The Auroran about the need to find a home for the bell believed to come from the steam engine, "Toronto" used to haul the first train to Aurora in 1853.

The article pointed out that the bell was not in good shape as it had been neglected over the years.

A letter addressed to Mayor Phyllis Morris from Gary McNeil, Managing Director and CEO of GO Transit, advised that GO Transit would welcome the opportunity to house

the bell at the GO Station at GO's expense.

The plaque referenced in the article would also complement the site.

It was an offer too good to miss but it has never appeared on a public agenda or been discussed in council.



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"Night Must Fall"

A mystery with a twist

Theatre Aurora's current production "Night Must Fall" is a play with a difference. Normally, in a mystery drama, you try to determine who committed the murder, but in this play, by Emlyn Williams, you know the murderer.

Night Must Fall is a psychological drama.

It is the shiver-inducing tale of a serial killer, a tyrant invalid, a young woman who prefers independence to marriage, a sassy housekeeper and a timid maid.

The scene is set in the sitting room of Forest Corner, Mrs. Bramson's bungalow in Essex in 1935.

Before the curtain, the voice of the Lord Chief Justice is heard terminating a speech to the Court of Criminal Appeal in which he supports the ruling of the Lower Court that murders were committed and the sentence of hanging be carried out.

So, it's no secret that Danny, a bellhop who arrives at the Bramson bungalow, has already murdered one woman

and there's not much doubt that he will murder another.

He is summoned to the bungalow by Mrs. Bramson who has learned her maid Dora is pregnant and Danny is responsible.

She wants to know his intentions.

Danny arrives at the bungalow on a Sunday afternoon and with his smooth talk and manner skillfully insinuates himself with Mrs. Bramson, while her niece, Olivia has suspicions about him.

But he is invited to join the household as a type of nursemaid to Mrs. Bransom, who gets her medicine, her shawl when she's cold and takes her for an outing in her wheelchair and very soon she is calling him "dear".

A few days later, while out for a walk on the property, Dora sees a hand sticking out of a rubbish pile and Inspector Belsize from Scotland Yard arrives to investigate.

A dismembered body is found and the tension starts to rise, culminating in a dramatic

conclusion to the play as darkness falls a few days later.

Diana Ryan, the director of Night Must Fall, is a relative newcomer to Theatre Aurora as this is her first production for the local group, but had considerable experience directing in the United States before moving to Aurora two years ago.

She has assembled a very strong cast, as they create and build on the drama of the events as they happen.

The producer is Anne Currie O'Brien and the Stage Manager Christine Randl.

Bill White, a veteran of local community theatre, is Inspector Belsize of Scotland Yard.

Brian Farrar is Hubert Laurie, a young man on crutches and a neighbour who is in love with Olivia but she ignores his advances.

Dora, the maid, is played by Nadia Paliga, who sees her so-called lover making advances to Olivia.

Zara Stuart-Jones, another veteran of local theatre, is Mrs. Terence, the sassy house-

keeper who adds laughter to the play with her actions and quick remarks. Lori Moritz is the visiting nurse who makes weekly visits to see Mrs. Bramson.

The more challenging roles are those of Danny, Mrs. Bramson and Olivia. Beverly Sotropa plays Olivia, the dutiful niece who looks after her aunt but is troubled and suspicious of Danny.

Kay Valentine is well known to local theatergoers and as always provides a strong performance in her role of the tyrant, Mrs. Bransom.

Paul Howley, as Danny, gives an outstanding performance as the psychological killer who is charming one moment, in tears another and evil at the same time.

As always the set by Peter Kelly is a highlight and the lighting and sound effects add to the drama.

Night Must Fall is well worth seeing.
