Recount date November 16

Aurora will go into recount mode Tuesday, November 16 at 9 a.m. following council's approval last week of a recount request brought forward by Stephen Granger.

Mr. Granger missed getting the last council seat by 21 votes, a seat won by newcomer Paul Pirri.

His request for a recount was approved 5-2 with Councillors Evelyn Buck and Alison Collins-Mrakas voting against it.

Councillor Bob McRoberts was not present and Mr. Granger declared a conflict and did not participate in the

discussion. Tuesday's decision to go ahead with the recount followed nearly two

hours of discussion and hearing the views of certain members of the public, with much of the discussion focusing on the process itself, including the accuracy of the vote tabulators.

Although not previously on the agenda, procedure was suspended at the request of Councillor Evelina MacEachern to hold an open forum, which is rarely held in a special council.

First to come to the podium was Rebecca Beaton, who asked questions she had posed to Clerk John Leach via email earlier in the day. Her first question related to cost of a recount.

claims recount "orchestrated"

Winter may come in like a lion and go out like a lamb, but as the temperatures dropped last week, Aurora's outgoing council appeared to have no intention of following suit.

Tempers flared at the council table during Tuesday's discussion on whether to grant Councillor Stephen Granger's request for a recount.

Approximately 45 minutes into the discussion, Councillor Evelyn Buck raised her hand to express her frustration with the evening's meeting.

"We are here tonight with a single item on the agenda, and that is a request for a recount," she said. "It's 7.45 and yet we have no resolution on the table and yet we've had round the table and a public forum of questions which seem to me to have absolutely nothing whatsoever to do with the simple request for a recount.

Frustrated Councillor Buck

The word "orchestrated" rubbed several councillors the wrong way and Councillor Evelina MacEachern quickly called a point of order. Mayor Morris then asked Councillor Buck to apologize for her statement, which she refused to do.

"Councillor Buck has accused us of orchestrating this and planning this before we came into this room, which is completely untrue on my part, so I would like her to apologize or I would like her to be asked to leave the room."

"What we're trying to do is very serious and for you to accuse the members of council of orchestrating this and refusing to apologize I think that speaks volumes, and I for one am going to call the meeting to a recess so we can at least consider how we are going to proceed with or without you."

Shortly after Mayor Morris called a recess, Councillor MacEachern, who was still sitting at the council table proceeded to turn her microphone back on and speak loudly to Bill Hogg, who was seated in the audience.



would have come forward to the podium. I'm sorry we care about a recount and the next time we hear about this crap! I'm sorry!"

Mr. Hogg and Councillor MacEachern proceeded to discuss the matter further in the lobby.

"This is like nursery school," said one audience member during the recess.

Following Tuesday's meeting Mr. Hogg said he was "shocked" Councillor MacEachern would "start yelling at a resident in the audience with unfounded comments.

"I was not involved in the discussion between her and Councillor Buck," he said. "I was just sitting there.'

"The point I did make [in the lobby] is Rebecca Beaton is a friend of hers, Walter Mestrinero is a friend of hers, both of them arrived with pre-written notes and she opened up the procedural bylaw at her request to allow the public input."

On her part, Councillor MacEachern said Mr. Hogg "loudly accused [council] of 'orchestrating'. I heard him from my seat. That was the reason I addressed 'Mr. Aurora Citizen'."

"Ms. Buck and Mr. Hogg...objected to providing residents with the opportunity to address council. They went further and accused council and the participating residents of wrongdoing. As we moved into recess, Mr. Hogg and Ms. Buck's daughter continued with the accusation."

Council resumed shortly after 8 and Mayor Morris afforded Councillor Buck "the opportunity to reconsider the comments she made".

"My comments were that it appears to me," Councillor Buck explained. "I believe I have

the right to make that reference without having to apologize for it. I will not apologize for a perfectly reasonable observation." Mayor Morris then decided

to continue the meeting with Councillor Buck still at the table. "I am going to ask that if you feel you want to impugn council's reputation that you really consider what purpose it would serve, and I would ask that you keep comments to what is

> The following facts will allow readers to judge for themselves.

The 10-year lease provides for a yearly rent of \$131,911 with a CPI adjustment for each of the last seven years.

If there is mutual agreement the lease can be extended for a five-year period.

DND will be paying a yearly \$25,000 operating and maintenance fee to the town.

DND is also planning to invest \$370,000 in upgrades to the building.

Contrary to Councillor Buck's claim that "the building has been neglected", the facts are that Town staff have been routinely checking on the facility and performing any repairs and maintenance when needed.

Staff advise that the facility is structurally, mechanically and electrically sound.

Although it is true that Aurora will not gain any new jobs at the moment, this may change as ongoing discussions with DND take place.

Thank you to town staff for their excellent work that enabled Aurora to keep a valuable asset, for negotiating a respectable rent from a stable client intending to invest in the building and for turning the liability of an empty building into a financial win for the community.

Campaign lawn signs, Part II

I produced a column a few weeks back regarding campaign lawn signs.

I had written, in part, that "the one thing that surprised me, however, was that a couple of the council candidates said that in order to save the environment, they would not be using lawn signs.

"In my estimation this is a huge mistake.

"Unless you have a couple of thousand close friends, a council candidate needs to reach out beyond their normal sphere of influence.

"Apart from the reasons for seeking public office, the other important aspect of campaigning is name recognition; I would kindly suggest to those that have not done any advertising, to either get some brochures printed and then distribute them around town or get some signs done, pronto!"

My column elicited a letter from one of the council candidates. It read:

"Mr. Somerville, I read your front porch perspective. As a candidate who has chosen not to use lawn signs, I would like to provide you with my "front lawn perspective".

"I agree that signs are a part of a campaign advertising strategy. Having said that, signs are kin of T-shirts, buttons, balloons and bumper stickers -- they act to reinforce a sense that the candidate has support and remind people of a name, but in themselves, they don't convince people to vote one way or the other."

"Many residents would be happy in a world that was without election signage on PUBLIC property. Not being able to pepper a boulevard with signs may encourage people to look at the issues and not who's got the biggest sign army. It turns our election process into a voting process based on name recognition. What is worse is when one sign goes up there is often a mushrooming effect from the other 20-plus candidates vying for a better exposure on the same corner.

"I have been asking voters to make their vote a vote of substance, not based on signs and free BBQ.

"When I check my mailbox, it's stuffed full of election material. I wouldn't mind if it contained thoughtful and detailed treatises of a candidate's platform, views, and plans. Instead, for the most part, my mailbox is stuffed with election fluff: postcards, flyers, fridge magnets and brochures containing safe umbrella statements; little of which has constructive information other than to shout the candidate's name.

"I spoke for almost 20 minutes to a constituent, not just about the C2 lands, growth, economic development and integrity commissions, but other issues, snow removal and road work. As we parted, he told me why he had asked me all of these questions...He wanted to judge my character.

"What we are offering as service to the public on council is our character, we are asking them to have trust and confidence in us. I believe this trust can only be achieved by talking to people one on one, and not by "vote for me" signs, fluffy brochures or having campaign volunteer teams phoning or door knocking at dinnertime." I wrote back:

"Good morning and thank you very much for your letter."

"I agree with your statement that signs "act to reinforce a sense that the candidate has support and remind people of a name, but in themselves, they don't convince people to vote one way or the other"

"However, I stand behind what I wrote that "Apart from the reasons for seeking public office, the other important aspect of cam-

paigning is name recognition...

"People have to know who you are before they will vote for you. A candidate could have an incredible resume of achievement and community involvement, but if voters don't know who they are, then they won't vote for them.

"Character, trust, intelligence, experience, community involvement, among others, are important factors in most people's decision as to who they will vote for. However, with 18 people seeking one of the eight council seats, name recognition is important; name recognition will hopefully cause voters to seek information about a candidate, through reviewing a candidates' brochure or visiting the candidates' website or better yet, maybe even phoning a candidate and ask them questions.

"And at the end of the day, the candidate wants the voter to remember their name when they are in the voting booth.

"Thanks again for the letter and good luck next Monday evening!"

This candidate, and the other one who did not employ any lawn signs or place any ads in the local newspapers, were both ultimately unsuccessful in their council seat quests.

These two candidates spoke well at the candidate forum I was at and from talking to others in the community both of these individuals would have been fine additions at Town Hall.

But not utilizing lawn signs and brochures to get the message out in a crowded field doesn't increase one's chances for electoral success.

Inside Aurora

KO-D's last flight

The twin engine Wellington bomber flew through the night towards its home base at Marham, England.

Only an hour earlier, it had avoided search lights and flak batteries as it joined other RAF bombers in a raid on the industrial factories on the outskirts of the German city of Munster.

Although the plane was flying westward over The Netherlands, at this stage of 1941 the Third Reich controlled much of Western Europe, and this was still deep within enemy territory.

On board the Wellington was a crew of six young men from England, Canada, and New Zealand.

In the rear gun turret was Sergeant Stanley Edwards, a Canadian from Woodstock, and at 19 years of age, the youngest in the crew.

As the bomber edged closer to England, it was detected on German ground radar.

Not far away, a German pilot and his two crew members scanned the sky in their Dornier night fighter.

Shortly after 2 a.m. they received a radio message with directions to the bomber.

A few minutes later, peering through the black sky over the Friesian Islands, the crews of both planes saw each other.

In the rear of the Wellington, Sgt Edwards called out over the intercom: "Skipper, we have a night fighter on our tail!"

The gunners in the bomber immediately opened fire, as did the men in the Dornier.

The captain threw the less agile Wellington into an evasive manoeuvre, but the fighter dove after it.

In the frantic minutes that followed, the Wellington was mortally hit, as shell after shell found its mark.

With one engine lost and the other damaged, the bomber would never make it back across the North Sea to England. There was only one option left.

Choking back the thick smoke that filled the darkness, the captain warned his crew to prepare for crash positions.

At 2.17 a.m. on July 7, 1941, bomber number KO-D radioed a final message to its base at 115 Squadron; "Am landing in the sea".

Despite search efforts over the next few days, no word was heard in England of the fate of the bomber crew until a few weeks later, when a report came through that Sgt Edwards was a prisoner of war.

The elation of his family back home in Ontario was short-lived, as eventually the truth came out; a mis-identification had been made, and there were no POWs.

The Wellington had crashed into the sea with no survivors. In early August, the bodies of three of the bomber crew washed ashore in The Netherlands, but no trace of Edwards, the other two men, or their plane was ever found.

This true encounter was by no means an isolated incident, and happened literally every day throughout the six years of the war.

RAF Bomber Command suffered by far the highest percentage casualty rate in World War II of any Allied part of the armed servic-

Fifty per cent of all crews lost their lives, and of the survivors, half of them were either wounded or taken prisoner.

So on November 11, spare a few minutes for all of the men and women killed on both sides of this, and every other war, and to think about our brave soldiers currently serving overseas.

Or if you can, join your fellow Aurorans for the services at the cenotaph.

And remember.

And if you see me there, you know I'll be thinking about all of my family members who were involved in both World Wars, including my Uncle Stanley, who I never had a chance to know, but to whom along with his colleagues, I owe so much.

Mr. Leach responded that the cost for a recount would be in the range of \$6,500, which would account for the use of the tabulating equipment including new memory cards and having technical support on site.

This number does not account for staff time.

Following open forum, Mayor Morris and Councillors MacEachern, Al Wilson, and Wendy Gaertner questioning the process followed by Mr. Leach and his staff.

"If we're going to do this, let's do it right and let's make sure there is no second guessing and no questions," said Councillor Wilson regarding the number of people that will be allowed in the room to observe the recount.

Councillor MacEachern then asked of problems with recounts in the past. Mr. Leach, who was Town Clerk during the problematic 2006 election in Vaughan, said he was not aware of any problems with past recounts that would be anticipated in Aurora's case.

Voters did experience problems at the polling stations, however, argued Councillor Wilson, including those who "had difficulty getting their ballot processed.'

Mr. Leach said he had not received a single phone call from any voter that experienced a problem having their votes tabulated by the machine at the polling station.

If someone had an overvoted ballot, the machine would initially reject the ballot and poll clerk could ensure this was the voter's intention, he said. If it was, the poll clerk could then override that feature and feed the ballot through.

"There are two options here - we need to get this done, but we need to have all doubt removed," said Mayor Morris, following a discussion on the recount process. "We don't want disputes after the recount has been ordered and then concerns raised about the process later on."

Councillor Alison Collins-

Mrakas pointed out, however, upheld". that it is not within council's purview to direct the process over the Town Clerk.

"You cannot have a motion that directs them to undertake a specific process," she said.

"A number of residents indicated to me that it was a very well run election, they had no complaints, which I thought was probably a first. I have every confidence that Mr. Leach will draw upon his decades of experience and put forward a process that is appropriate."

Before the vote was taken, however, several attempts were made by Councillor MacEachern and Mayor Morris to include in the final wording of the motion something that would indeed direct the process, including the provision that the recount would only be supported if all the ballots were run through one machine with candidates and scrutineers being allowed to review the ballots.

"That. I believe, is outside the jurisdiction of this council and contrary to the [Municipal Elections] Act," said Aurora Counsel Christopher Cooper.

"Could we put in the words of the act itself to be in compliance with, so that we can still allow the public, candidates and their scrutineers the ability to look at the ballots?" asked Mayor Morris. "The act isn't saying they can't look at them."

"I don't believe it is necessary and in fact it would be redundant," countered Mr. Cooper.

At the end of the night, councillors voted in favour of going ahead with the recount and that "Section 61 (5A) of the Municipal Elections Act be

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This section states that candidates, their lawyers, and scrutineers will be permitted to review the ballots before they are processed by the tabulation machine.

While Mr. Leach said at Tuesday's meeting that 61 (5a) pertained to manual recounts, it emerged later in the week, however, that sec-

tion 42 (3) of the Municipal Elections Act, which deals specifically with electronic tabulation supersedes the other section.

Individuals cited would only be allowed to review ballots that had been rejected by the machines.

Town staff said they are of the opinion that Tuesday's vote remains valid.



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


Hilton will forever be remembered by his longboarding family as the guy who was always ready to shred on a moments notice, always grinning from ear to ear on his longboard.
