We're also very fortunate to have lots of student volunteers from the community. I understand there are over 40 of them alone coming in, so it is great to have that much support because that also adds to ensure that the kids who are doing activities will have that much more fun because everything runs smoothly. There are some familiar faces, so it is always nice to see the faces of kids' whose homes I've visited on Easter Morning; seeing them older now and out volunteering is very rewarding for me.

BW: How do you make sure you get to meet and greet the hundreds and hundreds of people who come out for this?

EB: I think I have the best seat in the house because they're placing me in the luxurious? I think? Petch House. People can walk through Petch House at the Christmas Tree Lighting and the Easter Egg Hunt, but there is a lot of curiosity about what it looks like inside. So, yes, I've got one of the best seats in the house.

BW: Aurora is a growing community, so there might be a few people spending their first Easter in Aurora. What would you say to encourage the newbies to come out and meet you for the first time?
