More Jays offence followed in the bottom of the third, with Chris Rettie hitting a double to the fence right down the centre, followed by almost an identical hit triple from Chris Fafalios to score him.

Another great piece of base-running came one walk later when Fafalios stole home on a double steal.

Crosby and Ted Beadle also hit doubles in the game, with the home team eventually taking a 7 ? 4 win.

Bukovec had a solid outing, giving up four runs over six innings of work before being relieved by Zach Wiseman for the seventh.

Thursday's win on the road in Midland was almost blown, after the Jays took a commanding 7 ? 0 lead in the top of the third. The Indians were able to bring the score back to 8 ? 6, but were met by a great closing effort by Crosby who shut them out in the final two innings.
