Five games into the regular season, the Jays' run support is second only to the New Lowell Knights, who have revamped their game play and boosted their pitching this year to become the early powerhouse in the NDBL. Since their loss to New Lowell in the first game of the season, the Jays have scored an incredible fifty runs over the last four games ? all wins.

?We've always been a pretty balanced team, but to put up the numbers we've had has been a good sign,? said Wilson, who called the NDBL a ?hitters league.?

?While we want our pitching and our defense to be tight, it's nice to know we can keep pace if we have a slow start or an error with the mitts.?

A number of veteran players have stepped into a more prominent role this season, including the likes of Stephen Vallee.

?Vallee is seeing beach balls right now,? said Wilson. ?He would admit last year was not his best, but he's worked hard to get back on track and it's paid off so far.?

Though the season is young, Vallee and Rettie are the early league leaders in batting so far, each hitting over the .500 mark.

Defensively, the effort and the skill is certainly also there for the Jays. In their matchup with Ivy, two separate plays at the plate were crucial in the winning effort.

Following a home game against the Midland Indians and a road matchup with the Clearview Orioles earlier this week, the next chance to catch the Jays in action will be when they host the Bolton Dodgers on Tuesday.
