



#### Community members "asked for patience" as local hospitals upgrade record systems

On October 28, 2025, Oak Valley Health, Southlake Health, and Stevenson Memorial Hospital will go live with an upgraded electronic medical record system. Community members are asked to please be patient as teams adjust to the upgraded system that integrates new digital care processes, significantly reducing paperbased protocols. All three health care organizations will continue to deliver safe, high-quality care throughout this important

The three health care organizations are partners in the Shared Health Information Network Exchange (SHINE) which helps connect care across York Region, Durham Region, and Simcoe County. Over the past year and a half, they have worked closely with their technology vendor MEDITECH to strengthen their shared electronic medical record system. The upgraded system will transition from mostly paper-based processes to a more electronic system for clinicians and staff, supporting more streamlined, coordinated care. Patients will benefit from improved communication between care teams and enhanced safeguards designed to support patient safety at every step.

While the upgraded system will deliver long-term benefits, its implementation will involve important workflow changes that will require teams to adjust.

All emergency departments (EDs) will remain open during the transition. However, patients, families, and visitors may experience longer wait times as hospital teams adapt to the changes.

In Ontario, patients can also receive care in several other settings. Patients who are not experiencing life-threatening or serious conditions can visit an urgent care centre, a walk-in clinic, or their primary care provider depending on their symptoms. Some communities may also have access to virtual care options and community health clinics.

While hospital emergency departments are open 24/7 and always here to support patients when needed, they are best for life-threatening or serious conditions such as chest pain, stroke symptoms, difficulty breathing, severe trauma, and high fever in infants under three months old. Choosing the right option can help reduce wait times and ensure the emergency department is available for those who need it most.

#### "Can you believe it?" Not really.

"Can you believe it?"

I don't know about the rest of you, but when I hear that question pointed in my general direction, I usually think I'm about to be on the receiving end of a real fast one – or, at the very least, the attempted fast one zipped by so quickly I didn't even see it.

It's a phrase that's often used to express some sort of incredulity, underscoring the ridiculousness of whatever they've relayed. If they call attention to said ridiculousness, is it a question of looking for affirmation of their perspective or affirmation that whatever they're saying has more basis in reality than it actually does?

On Friday night, Canadians took a momentary break from baseball fever to react to the news that the U.S. President had abruptly ceased trade negotiations with our country. The reason? Offence at a commercial produced by the Provincial Government to challenge the very idea of tariffs in the country – using the words of the oft-lionized Republican President Ronald Reagan to make their point.

for this message to reach its intended audience and, regardless of the price tag, it seems to have hit its target sometime over the course of the week that was.

"They cheated on a commercial," said the President in a scrum. "Ronald Reagan loved tariffs and they said he didn't. And I guess it was AI or something. They cheated badly. Canada got caught cheating on a commercial. Can you believe it?"

What is it going to take for just one person he's addressing to answer one of his favourite queries with firm and resounding no?

But, wait, there's more.

Amid the manufactured furore, the Ronald Reagan Presidential Foundation, which is, at the end of the day, run under the auspices of the U.S. Federal Government, released a statement, trumpeted out by the President, of course, that they're reviewing their legal options. On a commercial. Directly using the words of the man in question.

"The ad misinterprets the Presidential Radio Address [where Reagan's words originated], and the Government of Ontario did not seek nor receive permission to use and edit the remarks," "The Ronald Reagan they said. Presidential Foundation and Institute is reviewing its legal options in this matter. We encourage you to watch President Reagan's unedited video on your YouTube channel."

On the one hand, hopefully more people took to the 'tubes to watch the video from start to finish, even just to see how ridiculous these complaints are. But, on the other, for some members of

their intended audience, they might have encountered some inconvenient truths... which may or may not inspire more "nos" to join the chorus against the "Can you believe it?" crowd.

Yes, the speech was made to justify Reagan's imposing tariffs on Japan, an action he said he was "loath to take," but worker and consumer."

"For those of us who lived through the Great Depression, the memory of the suffering it caused is deep and searing," analysts and historians argue that high tariff legislation passed back in that period, called the Smoot-Hawley tariff, greatly deepened the Depression and prevented economic recovery.

"You see, at first, when someone says, 'let's impose tariffs on foreign imports,' it looks like they're doing the patriotic thing by protecting American products and jobs. And sometimes, for a short while, it works. But only for a short time. What eventually occurs is: first, homegrown industries start relying on government protection in the form of high tariffs; they stop competing and stop making the innovative management and technological changes they need to succeed in world markets. And then, while all this is going on, something even worse occurs. High tariffs inevitably lead to retaliation by foreign countries and the triggering of fierce trade wars. The result is more and more tariffs, higher and higher trade barriers, and less and less competition.

"So soon, because the prices made artificially high by tariffs that subsidize inefficiency and poor management, people stop buying. Then the worst happens. Markets shrink and collapse. Businesses and industries shut down. And millions of people lose their jobs. The memory of all this occurring back in the '30s made me determined when I came to Washington to spare the American

people the protectionist legislation that destroys prosperity."

Did Ontario somehow cheat?

No; not only were the words in context, but the footage and audio in question is public domain, by design, and free to use.

Did Ronald Reagan love tariffs? To hear him tell it, absolutely not.

Did "they" (Ontario) say he didn't? No, Reagan said it himself.

Did Canada cheat badly? First of all, it's an Ontario matter, and unless there was an unspoken agreement between any of the players in this drama that we would not defend our perspective, then, once again, that answer is no.

Can we believe it?

No – for the aforementioned reasons and so much more.

Amid the ongoing trade battle between the two countries, I have to hand it to the Federal and Ontario governments for continuing to act and negotiate in good faith - because it's clear that these acts of good faith are exclusively travelling down a one-way street.

For every one step forward we, as Ontarians, whether they wanted to at the heart of the message was trade Canadians are knocked back at least two or not, paid an eye-watering \$75 million barriers like tariffs "hurt every American more, due to the increasingly frivolous and ridiculous whims of one man, which makes any negotiation impossibly unpredictable.

It sounds ridiculous, but it doesn't seem all that far removed from the world we're living in today.

> > It is impossible to work towards a deal when one party keeps moving the goal posts and, as apparently he's a "builder at heart", it's no sweat on his brow to dig them up and plant them again.

> > "Living next to you is in some ways like sleeping with an elephant," said Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau, addressing the Nixon government. "No matter how friendly and even-tempered is the beast, if I can call it that, one is affected by every twitch and grunt."

> > That oft-repeated quote is more relevant now than ever before as the twitches and grunts make way for kicks and falsehoods.

> > As important as these relationships are, will there come a point where our leaders simply throw up their hands and decide to take our business elsewhere rather than stepping up time and time again, hoping for the best, only to get kicked in the teeth?

We probably can't afford to lay off being gluttons for punishment, but it's nice to dream.

#### **Time Travellers Diary**

#### A Trick too Far

This year's warmer weather has me longing for one of those crisp autumn mornings, where your breath precedes you with a cloud, the morning sunlight makes a church window of the maples, and there's a spring (rather than a fall!) in your step.

Fortunately, exactly 100 years ago, the weather was perfect for me, vacillating between overnight frosts and brisk but comfortable days. I defrosted the porthole on my time machine and peered out into the night. It was Hallowe'en evening, and even in 1925, so many familiar traditions were well-established. Young people were marching door-to-door, crunching through fallen leaves, past jack-olanterns, and entreating homeowners to satiate their sugary appetites.

A few parties were being held, open windows pumping steam and the screams of well-spooked partygoers into the night. In some ways, I thought, things have barely changed: much of the way we celebrate Hallowe'en remains analogue and full of natural materials. Our propensity to startle and scare, as well as our desire to experience those fleeing feelings, seem ingrained and an enduring element of human nature.

After quietly infiltrating a dwindling party to abscond with a candy apple, I returned at the end of the night to my time machine, which I had left hidden behind the United Church.

I materialized the stairs and climbed in. I settled for the night, letting the frost creep over the machine, and slept rather well.

I awoke to a loud clatter, the sound of metal and wood, the whinny of a horse and the cry of a young man in

I quickly sneaked out of my machine, and in short order I was part of a small crowd on Temperance Street gathering around a tangled pile of wheelbarrows and young Kenneth McClenney, who had been thrown from his horse and was clearly suffering from a broken leg.

"What happened?" was the question floating through the group.

Kenneth was able, between laboured breaths, to describe his horse being spooked by the pile of wheelbarrows that had been left in the street, throwing him to the ground.

"Is Ranger ok? The deliveries?" he inquired.

Someone was, at that moment, walking the horse and carriage back to the scene, they described seeing "wheelbarrow tracks from yards all along this street. Must have been hooligans doing their Hallowe'en best to cause trouble".

A murmur of discontent swelled in the crowd. Harmless pranks were one thing, but this kind of scare was unacceptable.

Once Kenneth had been taken to a doctor, I returned to my machine and took it a few hundred metres up. From there, I was shocked to see the other side of Hallowe'en in 1925 down Yonge Street, especially just south of Aurora, there was an abundant amount of outdoor furniture that had been somehow hung on power lines across the road! Numerous farm gates were torn down, and I saw a police car investigating a home with broken windows.

A rural Hallowe'en was in fact quite different from what I am used to – I prefer the treats to the tricks, and parties over pranks. Stay spooky but safe this Hallowe'en!

## Hockey Coach, Skills Instructor, Administrator, and "Never Too Late" Program Co-Founder Heather Morning to be enshrined next month in the Aurora Sports Hall of Fame

Heather Morning is regarded by the Aurora Sports Hall of Fame nomination panel as "a driving force behind the growth of women's hockey" and she takes these earned compliments in stride as we chat about her exemplary coaching, instructional, and administrative career.



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for over twenty years, has served as an Aurora Panthers coach, clinic instructor, and on the Central York Panthers' Board of Directors, as well as a skills development coach with the Aurora Junior A Tigers, and she co-founded the "Never Too Late" hockey program for women who want to embrace hockey later in life.

The "Never Too Late" initiative is one of Morning's fondest accomplishments and her excited tone permeates her anecdotes, especially when discussing the number of moms and grandmothers who have embraced hockey in the later stages of life.

"There were a lot of women who grew up in an era where hockey was for boys. I just got back from a 60+ tournament where the ladies will be able to tell their grandchildren that they spent the weekend playing in a hockey tournament. Most of them started when they were 40 or 50 or 60 and it's so inspiring to see mid-life women taking this kind of risk and being vulnerable. It's also been cool to see them take their tentative steps on the ice. They have an incredible thirst to understand the game and get more skilled. Then they share their experiences with their own children and grandchildren, which is especially useful when their own kids or grandkids face similar challenges when tackling something new."

In addition to encouraging a multitude of Canadian women to embrace the game of hockey, Morning discusses the satisfaction of seeing the connections that form between the new players: "It's made a community—they've found a bond and they bake sourdough bread together."

Coach Morning shares her feelings of pride regarding the success of the Central York Panthers program, especially given the Junior Tigers' excellent 11-1-0-1 start to the 2025-26 season.

"The Central York coaching staff—Steve Dempsey and his team at the U22 level - does such a great job teaching the game."

When I mention the shooting skill that is demonstrated throughout the Junior Panthers lineup, the skills instructor's voice lights up: "Shooting the puck—lots of technical skill goes into it. Guys can get away with muscle and strength. Women don't have the same muscle mass so they

Morning, a resident of Aurora have to be technically better. The Panthers have to trust their bodies and not think about mechanics. At Central York, it's always been skillsfocused. I know the girls love playing for Steve and they work hard for the coaching staff. I ran the hockey camp that Central York uses to this day. They've done a really good job at bringing their scholarship players back to the skills camps as models for the younger players. Passion breeds more passion for the sport."

Seeing the authentic mentoring that goes on in the Panthers' organization is also pleasing for Coach Morning to see.

"There is a steady building up of the organization—it's great to see how Mark [Dubeau] and his team encourage the older Panthers to look after the younger Panthers. Sports are so important for life skills—learning about resilience and dealing with what life throws at you. What they accomplish on the ice and how they're also excellent students dedicated to their schoolwork shows what kind of student-athlete is being developed. It's so nice to see the Panther players coming back to coach and mentor at this point in their lives. It's a cyclical process that's great to see. I think it extends the players' joy for the game when they come back and instruct and coach-- and it's super-satisfying for

Morning adds, "I had the pleasure of seeing authentic mentoring at the training camp I ran for fifteen years. As it grew, when we moved it to SARC, I wanted it populated by all-female instruction. My daughter enjoyed the camp and, years later, she helped run the camp. Players who are now USports athletes in Canada or at Ivy League hockey schools in the States were in these camps as seven-year-olds. They're such amazing role models—really."

veteran hockey reflected on the most enjoyable part of being a bench boss and Morning's affection for the sport is evident: "I always loved the game, loved being at the rink, loved the people at the rink. Athletes are a special breed of people. Helping hockey players with a skill set and to see them enjoy the game more—nothing was more satisfying."

Also satisfying for Morning is the success and expansion of the PWHL.

## Construct anniversary is milestone for "collective hope and determination"

Aurora-based social enterprise was founded five years ago

The fifth anniversary of Construct, a social enterprise of Blue Door, last week was not just a celebration of staying power, but recognition for the "collective hope and determination that made it possible."

So said Emmy Kelly, Interim CEO of Blue Door, as she welcomed dignitaries to celebrate both the anniversary of Construct itself, and the announcement across the country.

Construct provides in-class training, on-the-job work experience, and members of the community, helping in the trades.

The foundations for Construct Looking back over the last five years, brilliant peers, and a deep determination

she says the program "was born from a bold idea that meaningful, well-paid work can be one of the most powerful ways to prevent homelessness."

"Construct was born from the recognition of three urgent challenges: Rising homelessness, a shortage of skilled tradespeople, and a housing market that leaves too many people behind," she told clients, community members and dignitaries - including Aurora Councillors John Gallo, Rachel to their base on Earl Stewart Drive Gilliland, and Ron Weese – at last week's ceremony. "At Blue Door, we believed we could not only address these issues, that the initiative is now set to spread but also prove a model that could ripple far beyond York Region. Five years later, that belief has become reality.

Addressing the range of supporters in the audience, from all three levels of government, to foundations that provided funding, Kelly said "you didn't just fund a program, you fuelled possibility."

As The Auroran reported last week, following pilot programs in Niagara Falls, ON, and Halifax, NS, Construct is now ready to spread its program nation-wide, creating a template for community partners to follow.

Kelly said the new "Construct Canada" offers two ways organizations to either add to their existing program, or replicate their model from the ground up, and Paul Robertson, Executive Director of their Niagara Falls partner, the West Niagara Employment Help Centre, outlined why his community jumped at the chance to pilot Construct's expansion.

"When I first heard about Construct Canada, I immediately knew it was something we needed to bring to West Niagara. This partnership has opened doors for job seekers across the region, offering not just hands-on training in trades, but also mentorship and wraparound supports that help people truly thrive. Working with Construct Canada has shown us how impactful collaboration can be," he said. "From recruitment to curriculum to participant support, this program leaves nothing to chance. ## Councillor calls for new rules on dust mitigation, citing health concerns

Aurora is a growing community and construction is happening all around us, but one local Councillor is calling for greater awareness of the health impacts that cutting stones and pavers can have on health.

This week, Council is poised to sign off on a motion from Ward 6 Councillor Harold Kim calling on Aurora to undertake an education campaign on the risks of cutting stones and pavers without proper precautions, and look at ways to mitigate dust from these construction projects and builds.

"The cutting of stones and concrete pavers for interlock patios, driveways and other landscaping projects can release respirable crystalline silica into the air," said Councillor Kim in his motion, which was first introduced at the October 14 Committee of the Whole meeting. "Prolonged or repeated exposure to silica dust is known to pose serious health risks to workers and the general public, including respiratory illnesses such as silicosis and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD).

"The Town of Aurora, while not a regulatory authority or subject public health and safety through education and awareness. The Town's be a "good idea." Bylaw Services team has acknowledged

informing importance tradespeople, contractors, and residents about the risks associated with silica dust and the availability of safer cutting practices and protective equipment."

When the matter was discussed earlier this month, the motion received the broad support of Council, but Ward 2 Councillor Rachel Gilliland said she didn't want staff to "reinvent the wheel" on an education campaign, but draw upon existing resources to impart information to residents.

Marco Ramunno, Aurora's Director of Planning, told Council that the current Building Code doesn't regulate dust created by cutting concrete or performing masonry work but is covered through the Occupational Health and Safety Act under the Ministry of

He said, however, that his department "occasionally receives complaints from residents who are complaining about another neighbour or builder cutting stone and creating dust," and when such complaints are received, the Town "typically" sends out inspectors or bylaw enforcement out there to investigate and advise them "to perhaps use some water to keep the dust under control."

bylaw enforcement, public education and advocacy to higher levels of government."

It is in the Town's interest, he said, to The Town should strike a task force to review the impacts of these stores in a social, economic and community context and "identify potential strategies or advocacy opportunities to address any issues that have

Should Council vote this week to strike both positive and negative – surrounding concerns related to public safety, land use, business clustering, signage, community perception, and economic development, while also exploring best practices from other municipalities.

The two appointed Council members, licensing and operation of retail cannabis up to seven resident representatives, stores within the municipality following and two staff members, along with a representative from the York Regional Police would be tasked with providing Council with recommendations to "address identified challenges and support balanced community outcomes" within six months of their first meeting in 2026.

While the motion was approved at the residents expressing both support and committee level, it was given the tentative green light in the fourth hour of the October 14 Committee of the Whole meeting and discussion was limited.

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

Lately my life has been very stormy, but one thing I know about waves is you have to move with them and ride the wave. If you try to fight it, it will take you under and pummel you. You have to catch it at the beginning and move with it, and there's always that terrifying moment when you're not quite sure that you'll make it, but then you go over the crest, and with the wave of your back, you go forward."

"Interestingly enough, a few years ago, we actually started to offer a sort of art workshop and Audry led them," said Marrett. "You can imagine that many individuals feel, 'Well, I'm not an artist, I can't paint, I can't do this,' and miracle of all miracles, everybody can do it in some way, shape or form. Now we have clients who always ask us, 'When's the next art workshop?'

"There are all sorts of different ways in which they do art and it is one of the ways in which individuals affected by addictions can actually relax, have a cup of coffee or a cup of tea, and leave having produced something that's theirs and theirs only – and that they're

of how art can actually be one of the healing powers for the individuals."



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
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
