









Inspirational octogenarian trekker Erlinda Biondic "felt great joy" when informed of her enshrinement in the Aurora Sports Hall of Fame

World record-setter Erlinda Biondic is a bundle of boundless positive energy—an inspirational octogenarian who walks seven kilometers daily from Aurora to Fairy Lake in Newmarket.

During our phone interview, the 85-year old Biondic described quite vividly the joys and sorrows of conquering the coastline of PEI during June and July to raise money for food banks in Aurora and Charlottetown. Our conversation about her recent 700-kilometer trek around the coastal roads of Canada's picturesque Island Province was peppered by timely insights from her 73-year old husband, George Biondic.

The two voices blended seamlessly as they delineated the highs and lows of long distance running and trekking. George, who is a decorated long-distance runner in his own right and preparing for a big racing season in 2026, and Erlinda shared their insights with a refreshing degree of candor.

It became evident in our hour-long chat that this indomitable husband-and-wife team is dedicated to one another.

"I did my events this year. George will do his races in 2026. Next year, I will be there for him just as he was there for me this year. We alternate years. George will do a six-day race in New Jersey. It's at a really nice venue at a State Fair. It's a family-run race. We know most of the regulars—although there aren't too many Canadians competing and only one or two Europeans. I raced in May and set a new 100-mile record in New Jersey. I've loved completing popular treks along Ontario's Bruce Trail, Spain's Camino de Santiago, and the Appalachian Trail"

Tackling tough terrain is a familiar challenge for the eternally-youthful Biondic and she described the factors that moved and motivated her along the rural roads encircling PEI.

"What kept me going was the fact that people were relying on us to raise funds for the Aurora Food Pantry and local foodbanks on the island. We were committed to completing the task and battle food insecurity. I just can't see myself as a quitter. Luckily, we came home in one piece. It was a really good experience. It's so satisfying that we helped other people both in PEI and back in Ontario. People have been so thankful for our efforts. I'd recommend a trip to PEI. The people were so helpful and nice. They greeted us when we were walking and the Islanders were very friendly. It's so beautiful along the coast—the greenery and the wideopen spaces. Everything is so clear. At night, we could hear the lapping of the ocean waves. We were lucky to have good weather, too, but there was a big drop in temperature between daytime and night time even in July."

Despite the kindness of the Islanders and the scenic beauty of PEI, George Biondic offered insights into the practical challenges of the trek that Erlinda faced and the behind-thescene duties she committed to on a daily basis.

"This was one of the toughest treks we've done—as tough as the Sierra Madre trek. We stayed at the Provincial Parks and we slept in the car for two months. Our car became 'the kitchen' and we ate early every day at a picnic table before putting in a day that often lasted from 4 a.m. to 10 p.m. Erlinda did all the cooking and we had some travel challenges without GPS. Small spaces don't seem to affect Erlinda, so we managed. We also used shelters and the showers at the parks. We put two sleeping bags in the back of our van and we had two vehicles—one had to be driven to the end of the route. It was time-consuming to look after the other vehicle after a long day on the roads."

Despite the rigors and challenges



The 100th anniversary of the Aurora War Memorial

In 1928 students from Aurora Public School held a Victoria Day service at the Aurora War Memorial. Ms. Vera Clarke is seen reciting an unknown piece. (81.57.3b)

Following its 1925 unveiling and dedication, the War Memorial continued to be the site of annual remembrance pilgrimages for residents of Aurora, King and Whitchurch. The memorial became central to other commemorations such as Labour Day, Empire Day, and Decoration Day: a long-forgotten tradition that saw families visiting and decorated graves at Aurora Cemetery, including that of Herman Brown, the only soldier on the memorial to be buried in Aurora during WWI. Citizens celebrated around the War Memorial to include their 71 fallen as though they had never left their communities.

(Note: As we commemorate the 100th Anniversary of the Aurora War Memorial and Remembrance Day, we'll be regularly sharing excerpts from our exhibition In Their Memory: The Story of the Aurora-Whitchurch-King War Memorial, now on view at Peace Park.)

There's been a lot of talk of war memorials for the last couple months, and I certainly will not end that chatter here. We're all familiar with the Aurora War Memorial, a beautiful cenotaph which speaks to the mourning of our communities and the memory of the 71 men killed in WWI. But to build this momentous memorial, a call to action was needed – and this call to action was a memorial that never was.

I make a quick dash for the nearest puddle and back I travel to Aurora of 100 years ago. I'm not far at all; in fact, I stay right within the region!

York Region in 1919, then known as York County, was faced with calls by a public that wanted to see their war dead given the commemoration they deserved. I walk into the Council room unseen as I pick a spot to stand for the meeting.

It was in 1919 that a "Report of the Special Committee on Soldiers' Memorial" was received, read and adopted. I stand Humber River and York Mills. What invisible reading the report over the shoulders of the Councilmen.

Bond Lake was proposed as a location for the memorial, but it was the veterans of that Great War themselves who did not agree with the selected site. It was felt

that the lake was too secluded to make any meaningful impact of remembrance on the psyche of the everyday passerby.

Other sites proposed were along they wanted was prime real estate on the main artery of York North, Yonge Street. There were even plans drawn up for a huge three-sided arch-style monument, should a location be chosen.

puddle and whizz forward a couple years to 1920. I pick up a newspaper and find out that attempts to push the memorial through were made, and there were additional special committee reports up until that year.

Unfortunately for the veterans, there was never a location deemed appropriate for this regional memorial.

To add to this, the cost of the proposed memorial was \$1 million in today's money. Due to funds, lack of consensus, and location issues, the York County Memorial became lost in the purgatory of reporting on reports.

I puddle-travel back to October 2, 2025, a day before the 100th anniversary of the re-dedication ceremony for the Aurora War Memorial. I realize that it is the slowly turning wheel of bureaucracy that Aurorans, and citizens of King Township and Stouffville owe in part for their memorial.

It was the original striking of the York County Memorial in 1920 that drove Mr. H.W. Fleury and Sir William Mulock into action. Sometimes inaction on one part can ignite a fire, or in this case a 900w light I make quick work of finding another bulb, that may burn for 1,000 years.

In the roughly six months that have transpired since the federal election I have heard from thousands of people residing in our community. Listening to your concerns is a priority for me. It empowers me to act on your behalf and be a strong voice for Aurora and Richmond Hill in Canada's Parliament.

This monthly column, along with the mailings and correspondence you receive from me, are a reflection of the issues you raise, the challenges being faced by so many families and businesses in our electoral district, and indeed by Canadians across our great country. I take my responsibility as your voice in Ottawa very seriously and I thank you for continuing to reach out to me.

Canada should be a country where hard work is rewarded with a good job and a great life. That's the Canada we were promised—and the future we owe

to our children. After a decade of reckless and failed Liberal policies, Canada is facing an unemployment crisis.

Area has risen to 8.9 percent. Youth employment is at a point not seen in more than 25 years, outside of the pandemic. Even worse, youth unemployment in the Greater Toronto Area is hovering around 20%.

oversaturated job market continues to drag down wages—even for those who are employed. The cost of living continues to rise, but wages are failing to keep up. In particular, many of our youth feel trapped. They need jobs to start their families, buy homes and fulfill their dreams. Sadly, many of those jobs are given to temporary foreign workers.

Too many corporations are relying on foreign labour while Canadians pay the price. Companies that traditionally gave a first paycheque to countless Canadian teens, have hired an almost unimaginable number of temporary foreign workers. Not long ago, young Canadians could gain vital skills in entry-level jobs, earn by a separate, dedicated program to

enough to pay for school, and build a future.

what's been the Liberal Government response? Mark Carney has not only failed to meet his own already excessive immigration targets—he's now on track to issue the highest number of Temporary Foreign Worker permits ever in a single year— 105,000 new permits Unemployment in the Greater Toronto in the first six months of 2025 alone. His immigration policies have overwhelmed not just our job market, but also our health care system and housing market. In fact, Canada's population has been growing by 3% per year, while the number of homes has been growing by only 1% per year. Under the Liberal government, the cost of rent has doubled, the cost of mortgage payments has doubled and the necessary down-payment has doubled.

These Liberal policies are also unfair to people who move to Canada in pursuit of a better life, only to find themselves unable to get a job, a home or a family doctor. This isn't a question of whether to support immigration or not, it's a question of social responsibility to Canadians and to folks we welcome to our country.

Our Conservative Party has a plan to fix this. Under our plan, the Temporary Foreign Worker Program will be permanently abolished. It will be replaced address truly hard-to-fill agricultural ultra-low-unemployment regions, there will be a transition period of, at most, five years while the program winds down, but no new permits will be issued anywhere in Canada. We will also put a cap on the International Students Program, which has also contributed to similar issues.

It's time for a policy of Canadian jobs for Canadian workers. Conservatives will always fight to protect Canadian youth and workers from reckless policies that lock them out of opportunity and suppress their wages. Our immigration system must put Canada First. That means inviting the right people in the right numbers—numbers we can absorb into housing, health care and jobs. It means having a system that allows newcomers to

succeed as part of the Canadian family. Since the start of this Parliamentary sitting, I have raised these points several times in the House of Commons. I spoke about the impacts that Canada's broken immigration policies have had on unemployment and housing pricesincluding the strain that food banks and homeless shelters are facing. As a member of the Standing Committee on Citizenship and Immigration, I have had the opportunity to hear testimony from policy experts and stakeholders. These testimonies made it clear that the Liberal government did not consider the consequences of their actions when they recklessly implemented their openborders polices.

If Mark Carney is serious about fixing the immigration system his party broke, he should immediately enact reforms to Canada's immigration policies.

Conservatives will continue pushing to end to the Temporary Foreign Worker program in Parliament this fall. We will always stand on the side of Canadian

Small or big, new nuclear reactors are not climate solutions

Despite the efforts of industry and its supporters to convince us otherwise, coal, gas and oil are outdated, inefficient, polluting energy sources, especially compared to alternatives. Some people, including politicians, are touting nuclear power as a good alternative. Is it? Proponents argue it's "clean," because it doesn't generate greenhouse gas emissions. But considering its entire life cycle, it's far from clean, and it's rife with problems — from uranium mining and transport to building and eventually decommissioning nuclear power plants to geopolitical issues around fuel supply and site security to radioactive waste disposal and weapons production. Of course, renewable energy also comes with impacts, which is why reducing energy and materials use is critical.

Besides environmental and other issues, building nuclear power plants - even largely untested small modular reactors, or SMRs — is expensive and time-consuming.

As Andrew Nikiforuk writes in the Tyee, "Due to its cost and complexity, it will not provide cheap or low-emission electricity in timeframe or scale that matters as climate change continues to broil an indifferent civilization." He notes, however, "That is not to say that nuclear technology won't play a minor role in our highly problematic energy future."

Nikiforuk points to a recent study of 401 nuclear electricity projects built between 1936 and 2014 in 57 countries. It found the average time to build them was 70 months, and average cost overruns were close to US\$1 billion (on top of massive projected expenditures). Because nuclear only supplies about nine per cent of global energy, and many reactors are nearing the end of their average life spans, it's unlikely to play a major role in bringing emissions down as quickly as needed.

The 2025 "World Nuclear Report" says that, "In 2024, total investment in non-hydro renewable electricity capacity reached a record US\$728 billion, 21 times the reported global investment in nuclear energy. Solar and wind power capacities grew by 32 percent and 11 percent, respectively, resulting in 565 GW of combined new capacity, over 100 times the 5.4 GW of net nuclear capacity addition. Global wind and solar facilities generated 70 percent more electricity than nuclear plants."

Consider that much of the push for SMRs is coming from people like Alberta Premier Danielle Smith, to fuel increased oilsands production, and tech billionaires, to provide the enormous amounts of power required for data centres and artificial intelligence. Canada is already set to pay more than \$1 billion for SMRs and other nuclear projects. But the "World Nuclear Report" notes that the few SMR projects now in play are "in serious financial trouble."

Nikiforuk writes that "to achieve an economy of scale would require the production of thousands of SMRs, which is not happening anywhere any time soon." He also notes that "SMRs are not small (they occupy the area of a city block), cheap or, for that matter, any safer than large reactors." Studies show they can actually produce more waste overall than conventional reactors.

Energy Mix reports that costs for renewable energy and battery storage are dropping rapidly while nuclear plant prices continue to increase.

The "World Nuclear Report" states that renewable energy technologies "are evolving towards a highly flexible, fully electrified energy system with a decentralized control logic, outcompeting traditional centralized fossil and nuclear systems."

That's a clue as to why so many hypercapitalist forces are pushing nuclear over renewable energy: Centralized power systems are easier to control, monopolize and profit from than systems based on energy sources freely available everywhere. And it's easier to shift costs of fossil fuel and nuclear power plants to



Community Gardens in Aurora and Newmarket help York Region Food Network fight the scourge of local hunger

Paul Lubberts peers over the London and Main Community Garden in Newmarket and loves what he sees.

He points to one of the leafy sections of the repurposed Town land and notes admiringly: "It's tended to by a 90-yearold stroke survivor. She grows her plants together with the others who drop in regularly to tend to all our crops. We have 25 registered gardeners and they come here to grow everything from raspberries to strawberries to string beans, peas, carrots, herbs, and potatoes. We have apple trees that need to be looked after. Most of all, they come here to connect. We also keep the community going over the Winter when we do our planning for Spring planting and crop rotation."

The York Region Food Network has been coordinating multiple community gardens since 1993, including the Community Garden Industrial Parkway South, and the Mulock Community Garden located off Fernbank Road in Newmarket.

Lubberts, an Urban Agricultural Coordinator for York Region, says he feels connected to the local gardeners who grow a rich array of produce and flowers on the plots provided. He also feels connected to local schools who have introduced gardening initiatives as part of their curriculum.

"We want to amplify for the Town by the York Region Food Network. what the kids are doing to help. We

Elementary School who have committed to help with the garden. We're pleased that the SPHERE program students from Pickering College are designing a drip line system for irrigating our plants more efficiently. We also have a group from Denison Secondary School that is helping our Community Garden through 'Innohive' which is part of the STEM program.

"The school has gained access to a government grant program for high school students. There is an element of technology to the program as the students design and build our garden beds and there is a community service element to it as well in that the garden produce is given to the York Region Food Network so people with food insecurity can have fresh fruit and vegetables. The kids are picking up valuable job experience and resume items, they'll be able to get a letter of reference from us, and, most importantly, they can see the change they make and the positive impact a garden like this has on their community."





The students chose seaweed as their primary material because it grows quickly, requires no farmland, fresh water, or fertilizers, and absorbs carbon dioxide, making it an ideal renewable resource. Recognizing the growing global market for seaweedbased materials, the team aimed to create a substitute for petroleum-based plastics in packaging and disposable products. In lab testing, their prototype decomposed significantly faster than conventional plastics under soil and water conditions. They framed this innovation within a circular economy model, designing a product made from renewable resources that naturally returns to the environment without leaving lasting waste. While broadly applicable, they emphasized its local impact by connecting upstream plastic reduction to improved water quality in Lake Simcoe, and in doing so, they showcased how green innovation can support both ecological and economic sustainability."





Seniors, watch out for these digital frauds

(NC) Did you know that fraud is the top crime against seniors, according to the Government of Canada? Fraudsters often target older victims, assuming they may be more vulnerable,

isolated or less knowledgeable about technology.

hat's a false assumption when it comes to many seniors, but we can all stand to learn more to be safer online. Here are a few of the most common scams to watch out for:

"THE GRANDPARENT SCAM"

This all-too-common fraud works by manipulating grandparents' emotions and putting them in a manufactured crisis. The victim gets a communication that their grandchild is in an emergency situation—stuck in a foreign country, been in an accident or even arrested—and needs money right away. Artificial intelligence has added an insidious twist to the scam, letting fraudsters change their voice on the phone to sound

more like the person they're impersonating, or even alter their appearance for a video call. One way to combat this scam is to create a private code word that can be used to confirm if it's really who they say it is.

RETAIL SCAMS

Also called telemarketing scams, this is when criminals call their victims posing as a service or some legitimate-seeming company. They claim to offer a special deal, or a refund for something the victim never ordered. These fraudsters often target seniors and use pressuring tactics once they have their victim on the phone. Their actual goal is to obtain money or sensitive data, including banking information, from their victim.

PHISHING

This is an older cyber attack, but it's as effective as ever. The scammer sends their victim a message—usually an email or text message, but sometimes a phone call—that appears to be from someone the victim trusts, like the CRA or their bank. The message usually pressures the victim: for example, "Immediate action is required, or your account will be terminated."

When the victim clicks a link to log in through the message, it takes them to a fake version of that organization's login page. The scammer gets their username and password when the victim enters it themselves into the fake login screen.

Staying aware is an essential step to avoiding being scammed. Cyber safety and good digital hygiene aren't just for the younger generation, they're for everybody. By getting informed and forming good habits, we can all stay safer in this digital world.



New food allergies after 50? What you need to watch for

(NC) It's one thing to be cautious about cholesterol and blood pressure after 50, but what if a favourite food suddenly leaves you gasping for breath or covered in hives?

urprisingly, adult-onset food allergies are more common than you might think, according to Dr. Harold Kim, an allergist and immunologist. "It's not unusual to see someone in their 60s react to shellfish or nuts. Your immune system evolves with age, and that can mean new sensitivities."

COMMON TRIGGERS AND SYMPTOMS

The most common food allergens include crustaceans, tree nuts, peanuts, milk, eggs, soy, wheat, sesame and fish. "Shellfish and fish are particularly common in adults developing allergies for the first time," says Dr. Kim. "You could have enjoyed lobster your whole life and suddenly develop an allergy at 58."

Symptoms can vary from mild to severe, typically appearing within minutes to two hours after eating. Watch for tingling or itching in the mouth, hives or rash on the face or throat, vomiting, or shortness of breath or wheezing.

If you've recently experienced these symptoms after a meal, don't shrug it off-experts recommend seeing your doctor promptly. "Don't wait for a second reaction," urges Dr. Kim. "The next one may be more severe."

WHAT TO DO NEXT

Diagnosis involves food history, blood tests and sometimes supervised food challenges. While avoidance is key, having an emergency plan is crucial, including carrying a safety device like an EpiPen, which delivers epinephrine used to treat a severe or life-threatening allergic reaction.

For anyone at risk of anaphylaxis, quick access to epinephrine is critical, but especially for older individuals with other health conditions.

You can also make lifestyle adjustments, including reading labels, wearing a medical ID and asking about ingredients when you eat out. You can find more tips and information at epipen.ca.



Hospall's "Nursing at Home" Program Brings Professional Health Advocacy to

hat happens when a loved one is discharged from the hospital but still needs V support with surgical drains, wound care, or complex at-home treatments? What if their family lives far away—or isn't sure where to turn for help?



the public in the form of subsidies, taxes and higher electricity bills.

Given the urgent need to quickly address global heating, it would be far better to put money into renewable energy and infrastructure, including a modern east-west renewable-powered electricity grid in Canada.

While energy from wind, solar and geothermal, along with storage, also comes with environmental consequences and requires mining and materials, it's still far cleaner, more efficient and quicker and easier to deploy than fossil fuel or nuclear power. To reduce impacts, we must, as Nikiforuk writes, "systematically reduce our energy and material consumption at an unprecedented pace."



What to ask before renewing your mortgage this year

(NC) Roughly 1.2 million Canadian mortgages are up for renewal in 2025, according to the Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC).

85 PER CENT OF THESE MORTGAGES were opened when the Bank of Canada's key lending rate was at or below one per cent.

As many Canadians prepare to renew in a higherrate environment, a recent survey found that more than a quarter of respondents don't have a strong understanding of how to make their mortgage more

Here are some questions to think about if your mortgage is up for renewal this year:

SHOULD I CHOOSE FIXED OR VARIABLE?

A closer look at your financial situation and any changes to your income can help you determine which type of interest rate is best for you ahead of renewal.

If you're carrying a lot of debt or your income is inconsistent, a fixed rate mortgage could be a good fit. A fixed interest rate won't change throughout the term of the mortgage, and neither will the payments. "It really comes down to the amount of flexibility in your debt service ability," says Gino Caputo, a senior real estate lending VP at TD. "But if a homeowner has increased their income, they might be open to choosing a variable rate mortgage and managing higher monthly payments or a longer amortization period if interest rates go up in the future."

AM I INTERESTED IN A MORTGAGE RENEWAL **OR REFINANCE?**

Renewing a mortgage isn't the only option. If you're looking to access more funds from the equity in your home, or thinking about consolidating debts, you might choose to refinance your mortgage instead of renewing it.

If you're planning to sell the home soon, it could mean choosing a shorter term and an open mortgage. Having flexibility with your mortgage products can be important when considering a sale.

Surprising hidden costs of home ownership

The following are some of the unexpected expenses that come with living the homeowner dream.

• PROPERTY TAXES: Depending on where you live, property taxes can comprise a large portion of monthly expenses. Some people pay their property taxes separately from their mortgage payments. Others wrap the tax burden into their mortgage bill. Zoocasa reports that annual property taxes in Canada can cost anywhere from \$2,500 to \$10,000, depending on the province's property tax rate and average cost of homes.

• HOME INSURANCE: CNN Business reports that home insurance premiums have surged in recent years, in large part due to extreme weather. In the U.S., insurance rates jumped 11.3 percent nationally last year, according to S&P Global. Severe storms, including hurricanes and wildfires, cost homeowners insurance agencies nearly \$101.3 billion last year, and those losses have been passed on to policyholders through higher prices.

• MORTGAGE INSURANCE: Many people do not have the standard 20 percent down payment necessary to buy a home. To circumvent this, lenders will require borrowers to take out mortgage insurance, also called PMI, to offset their risk. Credit Karma says PMI depends on factors such as down payment and borrowers' credit scores, but typically it's around 0.2 to 2 percent of the loan amount per year. You can remove PMI from your monthly payment once you have 20 percent equity in your home.

 MAINTENANCE: Even a brand-new home will require some measure of maintenance and routine upkeep. Bankrate indicates that one of the biggest costs of owning a home is maintenance, coming in at roughly \$3,018 a year and an additional \$3,300 for improvements. Lawn care, home cleaning, pest prevention, replacing smoke alarms and batteries, roof repair, and clearing rain gutters are some of those costs.

• HOA AND CDD FEES: Some communities impose homeowners association fees on those who live within the neighbourhood. Such fees cover items like maintenance in and around the community and snow removal. A Community Development District Fee is imposed by the developer of a neighbourhood or subdivision to finance the cost of amenities in a neighbourhood. Homeowners should be aware of these fees before buying in an HOA community.

Apart from these expenses, annual utility payments can be quite expensive. Utilizing utility plans that offer a fixed cost per month can help homeowners budget for utility expenses more readily.

As part of your winter prep, turn off the water supply to all outdoor taps and faucets, then open the taps to drain them completely. Leave the taps in the open position until spring. Disconnect garden hoses and drain them completely. Store them in a warm location so any residual water won't freeze.

5 PUT AWAY SEASONAL ITEMS

If you haven't already, put away your patio tables and chairs, as well as your barbecue, if you're not planning to use it through the winter. Wash them with soapy water and dry them before storing. To avoid rust on barbecue grills, brush them with vegetable oil and place a grill





It uses a trench drain and a slight slope to contain water in the shower area without the need for a curtain, shower door or lip to enter it. It has the advantage of being more accessible than other types of showers, while also giving your bathroom a clean, minimalist look.

Never want to shovel snow again? The next time you have your driveway resurfaced, consider having a heating element added below it. As an extra upside, it also means cutting down on pouring road salt all




