

Christmas Tree Lighting will also light a flame for peace: Mrs. Claus

MC: This is a great opportunity for people to see them because they are social animals, but they can't be seen on Christmas Eve. This is a great chance to see some of the kids firsthand, especially those whose houses they will be stomping on while Santa does his tricks on December 24!

BW: Is there any one particular thing you're most looking forward to this year?

MC: I understand from organizers that not only will the big tree be lit by the Aurora spirit, but there will be a new tradition incorporated into the ceremony - a peace candle lighting. There will be one candle lit and that candle will be shared with all the people in attendance. They will all have their candle lit as a continuum from the original and then someone from the audience will be chosen to actually light the peace candle. The season of Christmas, regardless of what background you have and what part of the world celebrates it, the fundamentals of it are about peace. It is time - and nice - that peace gets its own singular focus.

BW: So, what's left on your To Do list before you make the trip?

MC I always pack my travelling packages of hot cocoa because you never know when you're going to need a cup. I always pack extra mitts and extra earmuffs because the weather really does change - especially with the blessing of being able to visit Canada, I always want to prepare for any surprises along the way, like the rain Santa had Saturday's parade!
