

Late call sends Tigers packing in 2-1 loss to Colts



Access Storage Aurora Tigers captain Luc Reeve was harshly penalized for a high-sticking call late in the third period last Wednesday, a game which saw the Colts knock out the boys 2-1.

The officials, who were simply letting the boys play all game long, penalized Reeve for a high-sticking incident which he did not commit.
