Mrs. Hillis was joined at the main table by her daughter Carole, an Aurora resident, son Ross, and their spouses. While waiting for their mother to make her grand entrance, they said they were very happy to be there, although it might have been hard to wrap their heads around the fact their mother was celebrating a very vibrant century.

?She has been a great mum, she has a great sense of humour, and I have never thought of my mum as being old, even now when she is 100!? said Carole. ?She is a tower of strength, and she's a worrier on top of that. She says that is probably what has kept her going, and it hasn't killed her yet. She is very patient, and I think that has helped. She can relate to everyone, carry on a conversation with anyone, and they enjoy talking to her.?
