

Simple Christmas wish marks Tree Lighting Ceremony

Moderate rain at the start of the evening led to many families huddling inside the lobby of Aurora Town Hall on Wednesday night to await the start of the Town's annual Tree Lighting Ceremony.

While they waited for the rains to dissipate and the crowd to form, however, those seeking shelter didn't waste any time; some of them took the opportunity to slip in a wish to the Big Man In Red through his wife, Mrs. Claus.

"I just wanted my family to be together," said 10-year-old Rachel Howe.

It was a simple wish, but one which struck a chord with Mrs. Claus.

"I think that is just lovely," said Mrs. Claus, reflecting on the ask. "Children often come up to me, and Christmas cookies are usually a big thing.
