?We have a highly skilled team, but with the newer guys, and the younger guys, the thing we're going to have to improve on is getting everyone to play a full 200-foot game and get everyone working hard and doing what it takes to come out with a win,? he said.

?I think we just need to keep it simple. I think we get in a little trouble when we try to make an extra pass or force a play that's not there, but tonight we just played hard, kept it simple and came out with a victory.?
